Lashley Farmhouse was built during the earlier half of the nineteenth century by Robert Lashley. The land had been owned by members of that family from 1783, when John Lashley paid for it with slaves, until 1966, when Pluma Littlefield, Henry Lashley's daughter, sold it to the present owners. The Lashley family was a prominent family of the Flintstone area. Robert Lashley and his descendants operated the tannery that for many years was the only industry of the area.

This is one of several brick farmhouses of the "Pennsylvanian Vernacular" style built in Allegany County around the mid-nineteenth century. Architectural features of this building which are characteristic of the style include the five bay width, the "L" shape, the flemish bond principal facade, the flush end chimneys and windows treated with fine gauged flat brick arches and shutters on the principal facade.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Lashley Brick Farmhouse is located on the eastern side of the Chaneyville Road at the intersection with Gap Road.

The farmhouse consists of a two and one-half story, five bays "L" shaped structure, Wall construction is of brick laid in flemish bond on the southern facade and in american common bond in variations of five to one and three to one elsewhere. It rests on a high stone foundation of random rubble with a plain water table. The gable flank roof is covered with corrugated tin with snowbirds. Eaves consist of a boxed cornice, soffit, and frieze on the flanks with closepent eaves on the gable ends. Wall features include star shaped tie rod anchors. Of the three original flush end brick chimneys, two have corbeled caps and the other a stone cap.

The main entrance in the center of the southern facade includes a recessed three light transom with paneled jambs and a replaced nine light one panel door. Windows of the first floor are pegged nine over six lights with slightly radiating flat brick arches on the south. Second floor windows are pegged six over six lights with simple flat brick arches. Windows on the southern facade have louvered wooden shutters with original hardware. Six light casement windows are on either side of the chimney on the western facade. The eastern and northern facades are blank. A shed roofed porch on the south has six roman doric columns, two of them engaged. A shed roofed frame addition is located in the corner of the "L" shaped building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lashley Farmhouse was built during the earlier half of the nineteenth century by Robert Lashley. He sold the farm to George Lashley in several different conveyances during the 1860's and 1870's. (1) The farm, originally part of "Sugar Tree Camp", was purchased from John Combs Jones of Montgomery County by John Lashley in 1783. In exchange for this tract Lashley gave Jones four black slaves--all female. (2) Members of the Lashley family owned the farm until 1966 when Pluma Littlefield, the daughter of Henry Lashley, sold it to the present owners. (3)

"The Lashley family is one of old standing in Allegany County, Maryland, Robert Lashley... having conducted a tannery at Flintstone over one hundred years ago."(4) The tannery was the only industry in the large eastern part of the county other than farming and logging. (5)

This is one of several brick farmhouses of the "Pennsylvanian Vernacular" style built in Allegany County around the mid-nineteenth century. Architectural features on this farmhouse characteristic of the style include the five bay width, the "L" shape, the flemish bond principal facade, flush end chimneys and windows treated with fine gauged flat brick arches and shutters on the principal facade.




