

AL III-C-031 Hess Brick House
Hillcrest Dr.

This distinctive two-story brick house is believed to have been built about 1910. The south-facing structure includes a four bay long main section with parapet gable ends with chimneys, and a two bay western section with battlements. A one-story one bay square addition is located at the east end. The house was built in all stretcher bond. It stands on a concrete foundation and the roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The irregularly spaced windows are mostly 6/1 sash topped by brick straight arches and supported by cast concrete sills. A hip-roofed porch with a low central pediment shelters the facade. Four large fluted columns support the porch roof. The main entrance appears east of center. It is flanked by sidelights and topped by a transom.

The Hess Brick House appears to be an early 20th century revival of regional late Federal era vernacular brick houses from the mid 19th century such as AL-VI-A-007 Frost Brick Farm House. The Frost House near Pinto was built circa 1850. The six bay brick structure also has parapets. The Hess Brick House is in very good original condition and represents a well-designed example of early 20th century revival styles. It is recommended as eligible for the National Register of Historic Places due to high integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, and feeling.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hess Brick House is located along Hillcrest Drive just east of Cumberland, Allegany County, on the north side of the road near the intersection of the National Highway.

The house basically consists of a two story, five bay wide, rectangular shaped block. A one story wing abuts the main block on the northeast side while a two story wing with battlements abuts the main block on the southwest side. The building is of common stretcher bond construction and is supported by a poured concrete foundation with a plain water table. The roof of the structure is gabled and is covered with the original slate materials while the gabled ends feature parapets. Windows in the structure include double hung, wooden sash frames with six over six lights and cement cornices at the bottom of the frames. The main entrance is located on the front southeastern side and features the original horizontally paneled door with transom lights and side lights. The main entrance is covered by a three bay end porch with hipped roof which is supported by Roman Doric Capital columns. The one story wing, on the northeastern side, exhibits a flat roof-patio feature which is made available by a door on the second story of the main block. Two original, corbeled brick chimneys are located on the flush end of the principal facade.

The building is structurally very sound and is very similar in construction to the Frost Brick House, which is located on Route 220, south and was built in the mid nineteenth century.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hess Brick House is believed to have been built around 1910 as a fashionable residence for a more affluent family of Allegany County. The significance of this site lies in the similarities of construction between this site and the Frost Brick House, (AL-VI-A-007), built in the mid 19th century and located along Route 220 south. Similarities between the structures include the general rectangular block brick construction, the gable ends, and the parapets extending above the roof line of the gables.

The house is in near original appearance and remains an architectural reminder of the fashionable style of life of the more affluent members of Allegany County in the early 20th century.
