(18B.) Butler Furniture

There were several furniture manufacturers in Cumberland in the late 19th Century and perhaps the most famous of these was the Butler Furniture Company. Its intricate pieces were sold all over the East Coast. The furniture was of such high quality and design that some of its benches still remain in the Halls of Congress in Washington, D. C. The factory is no longer in operation and its buildings are now used as warehouses by various businesses.
