The Paul House was constructed in approximately 1810 by John Mattingly, one of the original settlers to the Mt. Savage area. Since that time the house has had two stone additions, the most recent having been completed in 1878. At present the building is a 24' by 30' structure constructed of stone laid in coursed rubble bond. In addition to the main house, three original outbuildings are also located on the property. These include a small log cabin which was used as a looming house, a slave quarters and a spring house.

The Paul Stone House is located west of Hinkle Road in the Arnold's Settlement area north of Mt. Savage. The farm consists of a two-story stone farmhouse, two log outbuildings, and a timber-framed bank barn.

The original section of the random-rubble stone house faces south. Its gable roof was raised in 1878 to incorporate a stone addition to the north. A one-story stone kitchen addition adjoins the west side of the original cellar.

As the land slopes to the north, the cellar on this side of the main addition is fully exposed.

The building's owner believes that a chimney once heated the east gable end of the original section. A fireplace heats the northeast corner of the rear addition. A brick stove-flue chimney heats the center of the original section. Another chimney heats the west gable end of the kitchen.

The original section exhibits two bays on each side. An enclosed porch covers the facade. The addition measures three bays long across the north side. Entrances appear in the western bay of the original facade, the northern bay of the original cellars east side, the center bay of the rear facade of the addition, and the western bay of the rear facade of the kitchen. Modern 1/1 sash windows framed in plain flat boards light the building.

Each of the two main sections is divided into two rooms laterally. The stair currently rises along the north wall of the original section, but it originally was located in the west end.

A central beaded board partition divides the second floor of the original section into two chambers. The doorway is trimmed with ogee molding. Ovolo trim appears on the first floor. A fine early 19th century metal box lock remains on the main door.

A small gabled log outbuilding on a stone foundation stands northwest of the house. A one-story, gabled log building, which was used as a loom house, appears to the east. This two-bay structure stands on a stone foundation and is heated by an exterior stone chimney. The entrance appears in the western bay of the south facade. Double hung 6/6 windows light the structure.

A frame bank barn located to the east was built in 1902. The property was owned by a Mr. Helbig, a carpenter, who probably constructed the barn himself.

The original portion of the Paul House was probably constructed circa 1810 by John Mattingly,<sup>1</sup> one of a small group of Catholics who settled in the Mt. Savage area during the period of the French and Indian War.<sup>2</sup> Since that time the house has had two stone additions on the northeast and northwest sides, the latter having been completed in 1878.

Although the original section of this house has been somewhat altered, it retains its basic form and some interior detailing. The kitchen position on the cellar level and the arrangement of the stone addition are two unusual elements.

The outbuildings at the Paul House are of special interest. Located approximately 14 feet to the east of the main house is a small log cabin with a stone end chimney. Oral tradition in the area dictates that it was used as a "looming house" by the Mattingly family.<sup>3</sup> In addition to the looming house, two other log outbuildings, including a purported slave quarters and a spring house are located near the main house. A barn constructed in 1902, presumably by a Mr. Helbig, is also noteworthy.

The Paul Farm is in good condition and although the buildings are essentially utilitarian, the attention to detail especially on the main house, indicate the original owners cultural awareness and the importance of farming to his life.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Paul Stone House is located on the northwest side of Hinkle Road north of Mt. Savage, Allegany County near the Pennsylvania Line.

The Paul House is a two story, three bay wide rectangular building that is constructed of stone laid in coursed rubble bond. A small, one story, two bay wide square addition abuts the main block on the northwest side. The entire structure rests on a low stone foundation with no apparent water table. The roof is gabled with a wide soffit and frieze and is covered with tin sheeting. The house appears to have been constructed in three separate sections and time periods. The central portion appears to have been constructed first, then a stone addition on the front northeast side, and finally a frame addition with weather boarding and fish scale trim on the rear southwest side. Windows in the structure feature replaced double hung frames with one-over-one lights. and plain trim. Entrances to the house are on the north-east and southeast sides, and feature the original six paneled doors and plain trim. Two original corbeled brick chimneys are found within the facade. One is located centrally to the main block and the other is located on the flush end of the side wing.

Several interesting outbuildings are found on the farm property. A coursed rubble stone springhouse is found to the west of the main house, and this building is covered with a gabled tin roof. Two larger log outbuildings, with "V" notching are also found close to the main house. These outbuildings are claimed to be the loom house and slave quarters respectively. Both log structures are supported by stone foundations; the said slave quarters having a high foundation. Both structures are covered by gabled tin roofs. An original corbeled stone chimney is found on the outside end of the loom house.

The farm is structurally very sound and retains most of its original appearance and remains a working farm.




