

LANDIS BRICK HOUSE

ca. 1865

The Landis Brick House consists of a two and one half story, two bay wide rectangular shaped facade. The building is constructed of stone on the first story while the upper story and a half is built of brick laid in American Common Bond. During the post Civil War period through the turn of the century, agriculture played an important role in the county economy. Wheat, oats, potatoes and corn were the main crops and most farming was done in the valleys and low adjacent hills.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Landis Brick House is located on Rt. 135 in McCoolle, Alleghany County.

The Landis House is a two and a half story (including the basement), three bay wide, rectangular building which is constructed of brick laid in American Common Bond with four to one variation. The building rests on a high stone foundation. The roof is gabled with a boxed cornice and returns and is covered with replaced asphalt shingles. Windows in the structure were originally double hung, pegged, wooden sash frames with pediments and one over one lights. Two main entrances are located on the south facade and feature replaced doors and hardware. A two bay, hipped roof entrance porch is also located on the south facade. It is supported by scrolled brackets and turned columns. A second, partially enclosed shed roof porch is located at the rear of the building. A single, original corbeled brick chimney is located in the interior of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Landis Brick House is believed to have been built circa 1865 as a residence for a simple farm stead. During the post Civil War period through the turn of the century, agriculture played an important role in the county economy.¹ Wheat, oats, potatoes, and corn were the main crops and most farming was done in the valleys and low adjacent hills.² Even during the national depression of the mid 1870's farmers fared well in a subsistence nature, and after the depression prospered even more. Through 1920 the number of agricultural units increased, however the amount of acreage under production started to decline slightly.³

Of particular interest in the construction of this house is that the entire first story is made of stone while the upper story and a half is laid in American Common bond brick. To date on the survey this is the only example in Allegany County, of such peculiar wall construction.


