

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**  
**Mary H. Casler House (AA-1103)**  
**199 Hanover Street**

The Italianate-style dwelling at 199 Hanover Street was constructed in 1882 by then-owner Mary H. Casler. The property, historically associated with the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street (AA-724), was subdivided by Charles Welch in the late 1860s and sold to individual owners who improved the land by erecting single-family dwellings. Owned and occupied by numerous residents since its construction, the single-family dwelling, which was erected for use as rental property, remained in the Casler family until 1921.

The tall urban, Italianate-style townhouse is one of two similar-styled houses erected side-by-side on the southwest side of the street. It is a two-story, side-passage frame structure raised upon a high brick basement and is now clad with wood shingles, though it originally had weatherboard walls. It is divided into three bays and is covered with a low hipped roof with exposed paired rafters extending beyond the wall plane and supporting a boxed cornice. The side-passage entry is ornately detailed, with a bracketed architrave surround, while the 2/2 windows lack the Italianate treatment expected. The small front yard is surrounded by an original wrought iron fence. The building retains much of its original exterior architectural detailing.

The tall urban, Italianate-style townhouse at 199 Hanover Street, built in 1882, is one of two similar-styled houses erected side-by-side on the southwest side of the street. It is a two-story, side-passage frame structure raised upon a high brick basement and is now clad with wood shingles, though it originally had weatherboard walls. It is divided into three bays and is covered with a low hipped roof with exposed paired rafters extending beyond the wall plane to support a boxed cornice. The side-passage entry is ornately detailed, with a bracketed architrave, while the 2/2 windows lack the Italianate treatment expected. The small front yard is surrounded by an original wrought iron fence.

The facade (northeast elevation) is divided into three bays and delineated at the edges by narrow wood cornerboards. The first story consists of a side-passage entry and two single 2/2 windows with square-edged trim and wood sills; the second story has three single 2/2 windows with similar trim. The front entry is reached by a steep flight of stone steps with an original wrought iron rail. The stone steps have a brick side wall with an arched opening cut into it; the voussoir of the arch and the side walls of the opening being delineated by bricks turned on end with a soldier-course pattern.

The door surround features a bracketed cornice whereby two end brackets and four interior modillions support a molded cornice having a boxed lower section and a cavetto profile at the upper section. The architrave surrounds double wood doors and the two-light transom with rounded top edges. A narrow frieze board with applied ornamentation is located on the rail between the doors and transom. The doors have recessed wood panels in the lower half and rounded, glazed sash with etchings in the upper half. The 2/2 windows have square-edged trim and narrow wood sills and window boxes on the first story.

The raised basement is brick laid in a predominantly stretcher bond, but with an occasional random header course added into it. A single entry with a four-paneled door is located under the steps of the first story door. Two single 2/2 windows with jack-arched brick lintels and stone sills are located next to the door and symmetrically aligned under the window bays of the principal floors.

The northwest elevation has no openings in the front bay, but three openings on both the first and second stories toward the rear of the building. These openings include a single 2/2 and a pair of 2/2 windows, all of which have the identical square-edged trim. At

the basement level, a single 2/2 window is located generally on center of the wall surface and is partially sunk into a window well.

The southeast elevation has single 2/2 windows with square-edged trim on both stories, though they are not symmetrically placed. The raised brick foundation on this elevation is laid also in a predominantly stretcher bond; however two random Flemish bond courses and one course of header bond interrupts the all-stretcher pattern. It is lit by two windows, including a single 2/2 in the rear bay, with a jack-arched lintel, and a three-light window on center of the wall. In front of this window is an iron coal chute. The door is round-arched with an air vent on center of the door. The name of the manufacturer, J VERNON CAMPBELL, is embossed on the arc of the top of the door, while its provenance, BALTIMORE, occupies the bottom of the door. The raised brick foundation has been parged along this wall surface, beginning under the coal chute and extending back and around to the rear of the dwelling.

The southwest elevation is similarly divided into three bays, consisting at the basement level of a single door and two 2/2 windows. The raised brick foundation on this elevation has been significantly parged, obscuring the extent of the changes which may have occurred at this level. The three openings, however, do not appear entirely original, since the splayed brick lintels of both the windows and door are not as well executed as on the side walls.

The interior of this building was not accessible for survey.

The Italianate-style dwelling at 199 Hanover Street was constructed in 1882 by then-owner Mary H. Casler.<sup>1</sup> The property, historically associated with the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street (AA-724), was subdivided by Charles Welch in the late 1860s and sold to individual owners. One of a pair of similar structures erected on the subdivided portion of the block between 1878 and 1882, the two-story dwelling retains much of its original exterior architectural detailing. Owned and occupied by numerous residents since its construction, the single-family dwelling erected for use as rental property remained in the Casler family until 1921.

**PROPERTY HISTORY**

The property on which the building at 199 Hanover Street is sited was historically owned by Captain Thomas Gassaway (1684-1739), who started his career as a storekeeper for Perkins, Buchanan, & Brown. At the time of his death in 1739, Gassaway owned only a portion of Parcel 25. The parcel, bounded by King George Street, Maryland Avenue, Hanover Street, and Governor Street, was divided into twenty equally sized lots denoted A through W. The Gassaway heirs retained ownership of six of the lots (B, H, I, G, L, and M) until the 1760s and 1770s. Now designated as 203-207 Hanover Street, Lot I was the first of the Gassaway tracts to be sold. Lot H, including the properties now known as 195-201 Hanover Street, was conveyed months later to Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer. This sale also included Lots G and D to the southeast (now property of the United States Naval Academy).

By the summer of 1772, Jenifer was in possession of Lots B, H, D, I, G, L, and M, thus, reuniting the lots originally owned by Gassaway in 1739. Jenifer was one of the most important individuals in the influential Province of Maryland prior to the Revolutionary War and, in the later events leading to the adoption of the Constitution of the United States. Jenifer, however, appears never to have resided in the Hanover Street property, selling Lots B, H, and I within months to local merchant and importer, Anthony Stewart.

Believing his future destroyed following the burning of his cargo ship, the Peggy Stewart, Anthony Stewart left Annapolis for Nova Scotia. His wife and children remained, eventually defaulting on

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the mortgage and transferring the Hanover Street property back to Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer in 1779. In May 1783, Thomas Stone became the owner and occupant of the house and Lots B, H, I, G, L, and M. One of the four signers of the Declaration of Independence from Maryland, Stone died only a few years after obtaining ownership. Consequently, the vast parcel was ordered to be sold by the executors of the estate, M.J. Stone and G.R. Brown. Purchased by William Harwood, and confirmed by Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer in 1801, the property remained in the hands of the Harwood family until 1864. Alexander Randall and Joseph H. Nichols were appointed trustees by the Chancellor to sell the real estate of General Richard Harwood of Thomas to Robert Welch of Ben. The vast property, which stretched from Hanover Street to King George Street and Maryland Avenue, was then immediately reconveyed by Welch to his son, Charles, for \$4,000.

Residing in the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street, Charles Sellman Welch was an alderman and Judge of the Orphans Court for Anne Arundel County. By the late 1860s, Welch and his wife Ann Rebecca Welch began to subdivide and individually convey portions of the property fronting on Hanover Street to the southeast of his dwelling.

#### BUILDING HISTORY

On January 1, 1869, George Heath of Onondaga County, New York purchased the unimproved rectangular lots at 199 and 201 Hanover Street from Welch for \$750. Born in 1802, Heath was the inventor of the tumble gates and patent locks used in the construction of the Erie Canal. Now a permanent resident of Annapolis, Heath devised ownership of the lot at 199 Hanover Street in 1876 to his eldest daughter, Mary. Born in Little Falls, NY, Mary Heath married Marcus Casler in 1830. Casler, also originally from Little Falls, NY, was a captain in the 121st New York Volunteers during the Civil War, later working as a clerk at the United States Naval Academy.

The Casler family was living in the Italianate-style, concrete dwelling at 201 Hanover Street (AA-524), which was constructed by Heath between 1869 and 1876. Casler's daughter, Nettie H. Casler, received ownership of 201 Hanover Street from her grandfather upon his death in 1879, however, Mary Casler continued to reside there. In 1884, Nettie deeded title of the property to her mother, "to have and hold...during her natural life and at her death, the said property to be equally divided between her three children, viz:

As documented by tax assessment records, Mary Casler had the fashionable Italianate-style dwelling erected at 199 Hanover Street in 1882 as rental property. She was charged with one frame dwelling, valued at \$1,200. Interestingly, the building was similar in form and style to the dwelling at 197 Hanover Street (AA-1102) that was constructed between 1878 and 1880 for Hugh McCusker.

The census records for 1880 and 1900 indicate that Mary Casler and several of her children lived at 201 Hanover Street. The 1882 dwelling at 199 Hanover Street was leased in 1900 to William Gibbs of Rhode Island, who worked as a freeman and bricklayer at the United States Naval Academy. Despite the death of Mary Casler in 1904, the Casler family retained ownership of the properties at 199 Hanover Street until 1921, and 201 Hanover Street until 1927. As many of the heirs had returned to live in New York, both of the dwellings in Annapolis were utilized as rental space.

Between 1901 and 1903, over half of the block on which 199 Hanover Street was constructed had been purchased by the United States Naval Academy for future expansions. All of the wood frame and brick dwellings, the majority of which had been erected between 1844 and 1891, were razed. By 1913, a security fence was constructed directly to the southeast of 195 Hanover Street (AA-1101) and 198 King George Street (AA-1130) to separate the town from the school, thereby obscuring the circa 1908 dwellings erected by the Naval Academy.

In May 1921, Clyde L. and Mary Bell M. Frear purchased 199 Hanover Street. Unfortunately within three years, the couple defaulted on their mortgage and the property was offered at a public sale. With Nicholas H. Green assigned to transferred title, ownership of the Italianate-style dwelling was granted to Robert L. and Anne L. Burwell. A graduate of Cornell University, Burwell worked as a city engineer. The Burwells owned and occupied the dwelling in Annapolis until 1943, selling it to Burnice L. and Jessie T. Rutt.

With the relocation of the Rutts to Madrid, Spain, the building at 199 Hanover Street was sold to Charles P. and Blanche M. Boyer. Blanche Boyer occupied the dwelling until 1967, when she conveyed

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it soon after her husband's death to William D. and Helen R. Wright. With the death of Helen Wright, William Wright verbally agreed to convey the property on September 8, 1970 to Roy B. and Annette B. Cowdrey. The executors of estate for Wright, who died just nine days later on September 17, 1970, honored the agreement.

In 1983, the property was conveyed to Alexander Reed Sarratt, III, who occupied the dwelling for only two years before selling it in June 1985 to present owner-occupants Matthew C. and Catherine R. Walsh.

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
