

CAPSULE SUMMARY
209 Hanover Street (AA-1104)

The Italianate-style dwelling at 209 Hanover Street was constructed in 1879 by then-owner Peter Schoff. The property, historically associated with the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street (AA-724), was subdivided by Charles Welch in the late 1860s and sold to individual owners. One of a pair of semi-detached structures (209-211 Hanover Street, AA-2187) erected on the last of the subdivided parcels on the block, the two-story brick dwelling retains much of its original exterior and interior architectural detailing. Leased for nearly seventy-five years, the building was first owner-occupied in 1954 and stands as an example of late 19th century rental property.

Designed in an urbane Italianate style, the house is characterized by wide overhanging eaves, a bracketed cornice that continues around all four elevations of the structure, and long narrow 2/2 windows. It is set upon a full, raised basement and is covered by a low hipped roof with a pair of interior end chimneys. The brick walls are laid in an all-stretcher bond on the facade and a seven-course bond on the side walls. The two-story house is set back slightly from the lot line, offering a small front yard surrounded by an original and ornate, wrought iron fence.

The two-story, brick dwelling at 209 Hanover Street is one of two attached townhouses built in 1879. Designed in an urbane Italianate style, the house is characterized by wide overhanging eaves, a bracketed cornice that continues around all four elevations of the structure, and elongated 2/2 windows. It is set upon a full, raised basement and is covered by a low hipped roof with a pair of interior end chimneys. The brick walls are laid in an all-stretcher bond on the facade and a seven-course bond on the side walls. The house is set back slightly from the lot line, offering a small front yard surrounded by the original ornate, wrought iron fence.

The facade (northeast elevation) facing Hanover Street is divided into three bays. The raised first story, or piano nobile, is the most highly articulated and clearly stands out as the principal story of the house. The entry door, set within a distinctive round-arched opening, is located on the inside bay of the three-bay facade and is reached by a long, straight flight of stone steps with a contemporary iron railing. The four-paneled wood door is original and features a pair of long, arched panels in the upper 3/4 segment of the door and rectangular panels at the base. A semi-circular transom is separated from the door by a transom bar, and is set within an arched opening articulated with brick voussiors. Next to the door are two elongated 2/2 windows with jack-arched brick lintels, stone sills, and original wrought iron window guards.

The three second story window openings are shorter than the first story windows, but are similarly articulated with jack-arched brick lintels and stone sills. However, they lack the window guards found on the first story below. The basement level includes two 2/2 windows with jack-arched lintels and stone sills and, under the stairs to the principal entry, an English basement entry with a six-paneled replacement door.

The southeast elevation faces a driveway separating this property from the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street and leading back to the garages within the property of the Peggy Stewart House. The wall is not symmetrically fenestrated and has some modifications to the original openings. The basement level of the house includes three single windows basically occupying the central part of the wall surface, located between the paired interior end chimneys. The opening in the far bay is blocked, but retains its original jack-arched brick lintel and exterior louvered shutters. The central opening is bricked in and the opening in the near bay is an original 2/2 window, but has been altered in the upper sash.

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The first story has two windows, including a 2/2 window on center with a jack-arched lintel and a four-light casement window next to and slightly above it, which was added at a later date. The second story has two single 2/2 windows on center of the wall surface.

The southwest elevation, facing the rear yard, is divided into two bays. The basement level, partially sunk on the front elevation, is at grade and has altered openings. These include a sliding glass door and a 2/2 window that was shortened, but retains its splayed brick lintel. The first story opens onto a non-historic wooden porch set upon metal columns. It has a single fifteen-light door opening onto the deck and a single 2/2 window, both capped by splayed brick lintels. The second story has two 2/2 windows with splayed brick lintels and wood sills.

INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

The interior of the house has a side-passage plan with a transverse stair hall dividing the front parlor from what was originally a rear parlor or dining room. This rear room has since been arranged into two rooms, the kitchen and bathroom, and retains almost no original fabric. The front parlor, however, retains its historic configuration and much of its original trim and other details. The basement of the house, which most likely accommodated the kitchen, has been remodeled, leaving little of the original fabric intact or exposed.

The side-passage is reached via an entry vestibule from the principal entry. The vestibule is square in plan with a high ceiling. An interior four-paneled door with glazed upper panels opens from the vestibule, down a step from the main floor and into the side-passage. The side-passage opens onto the front parlor via a single door opening and then continues to the transverse stair hall or straight into the kitchen.

The front parlor is square in plan with openings on two of the four walls and a ten-foot-high plaster ceiling. A plaster medallion from which a gas light fixture originally hung is located on center of the ceiling. A rebuilt chimney breast and fireplace with a contemporary wood mantel is centered on the southeast wall of the room, while two large windows let light in through the northeast wall. To either side of the chimney breast are built-in book

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shelves. The floors are laid with the original, 4-5" random-width wood floorboards and eight-inch-high wood baseboards. The window and door trim features a large interior bead, found in other Annapolis houses from this period. The crown molding has a cavetto profile with a molded picture frame below. The major changes in this room include the construction of shelves to either side of the chimney breast and the mantel.

The transverse stair hall contains the original straight-flight stair from the first story to the second story (the flight to the basement is a new stock stair selected for its sympathetic styling). This original stair is typical of the period and features a heavy, turned main newel post, turned balusters (two per tread), and scroll-sawn stringer brackets that similarly ascends to the second floor.

The kitchen and bathroom, formerly the dining room or rear parlor, were renovated in 1997. The fireplace was removed, though ghosting of the hearth is visible in the wood floorboards. Although all of the furnishings are new in these rooms, the original interior bead window trim survives, as do the original wide floorboards and baseboards.

The second story of the house has three bedrooms and a bath. The front bedroom occupies the full width of the three-bay wide facade and features a fireplace on its side wall with an original mantel having an arched opening with a keystone above. The slate mantel is painted white. The room was enlarged or deepened, the location of the original back wall to this room being visible in the floor boards. Two closets have been built into the enlarged room. The larger closet has re-used trim surrounding the opening, while an original window opening, located next to the fireplace, lacks the typical window trim and is instead encased by square-edged trim similar to that found elsewhere on the second floor.

The two back bedrooms are reached from the hall via single openings with original four-paneled doors (new hardware) with two-light transoms having a central pivot. These rooms retain their original floorboards and molded baseboards. The typical window trim is square-edged with a large interior beading. The bathroom is modern and contains an air shaft leading to the roof.

The basement of the house has been heavily altered, but does retain

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its original windows with original molded trim and interior shutters. The majority of these alterations occurred when the dwelling was converted into two apartments. It was returned to a single-family dwelling in 1997.

One of a pair of semi-detached structures (209-211 Hanover Street) erected on the subdivided portion of the block in 1879, the two-story dwelling retains much of its original exterior and interior architectural detailing. Leased for nearly seventy-five years, the building was first owner-occupied in 1954 and stands as an example of late 19th century rental property.

Property History

The property on which the building at 209 Hanover Street is sited was historically associated with the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street. As early as 1742, Thomas Rutland began to purchase property in Parcel 25 fronting on Maryland Avenue where the Colonel McLane Tilton House at 9 Maryland Avenue (AA-621) now stands. By 1761, Rutland had increased his holdings within the parcel to include those lots fronting on Hanover and King George streets.

Born in the early part of the 18th century, Thomas Rutland was a prominent Annapolis merchant and planter, who was also known as the builder of the Willing Tom, the only known ship to have been built in Annapolis during the Revolutionary War.² Known for living slightly beyond his means, Rutland began to erect the imposing dwelling at 9 Maryland Avenue as early as 1760 with construction of the equally impressive Peggy Stewart House commencing the following year. By the early part of the 1780s, Rutland was responsible for the construction of another one of Annapolis' major townhouses at 142-144 Prince George Street (AA-653).

The Peggy Stewart House was leased soon after its completion in 1764 to William Thomas. In January 1772, the property which

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partially extended to King George Street was conveyed to Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer. That same year, it was sold to local merchant and importer, Anthony Stewart.

Believing his future destroyed following the burning of his cargo ship, the Peggy Stewart, Anthony Stewart left Annapolis for Nova Scotia. His wife and children remained, eventually defaulting on the mortgage and transferring the Hanover Street property back to Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer in 1779. In May 1783, Thomas Stone became the owner and occupant of the house and its vast lot. One of the four signers of the Declaration of Independence from Maryland, Stone died only a few years after obtaining ownership. Consequently, the vast parcel was ordered to be sold by the executors of the estate, M.J. Stone and G.R. Brown. Purchased by William Harwood, and confirmed by Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer in 1801, the property remained in the hands of the Harwood family until 1864. At the time, Alexander Randall and Joseph H. Nichols were appointed trustees by the Chancellor to sell the real estate of General Richard Harwood of Thomas to Robert Welch of Ben. The vast property, which stretched from Hanover Street to King George Street, was then immediately reconveyed by Welch to his son Charles for \$4,000.

Residing in the Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street, Charles Sellman Welch was an alderman and Judge of the Orphans Court for Anne Arundel County. By the late 1860s, Welch and his wife Ann Rebecca Welch began to subdivide and individually convey portions of the property fronting on Hanover and King George streets. Having conveyed all of the subdivided parcels to the southeast of the Peggy Stewart House in the 1860s, Welch began to sell the lots to the northwest of his dwelling and along King George Street in the latter part of the 1870s.

The parcel now designated as 209-211 Hanover Street was purchased by Professor Edward A. Roget and his wife, Eugenia A. Roget in May 1876. Born in France about 1801, Roget was a French professor at the United States Naval Academy by 1850. Historic maps indicate that Roget did not improve the Hanover Street property, which contained two wood frame sheds in 1878. Rather, Roget resided two blocks to the north in Lockwoodville, being assessed in 1860 for a single dwelling valued at \$2,825.

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BUILDING HISTORY

In September of 1878, Roget conveyed the property to Peter and Cecelia Schoff. Although little is known about Peter Schoff, the land records have documented that he was responsible for the construction of the semi-detached brick dwellings at 209-211 Hanover Street (AA-2187) in 1879, stating, "...the two story and basement brick dwelling house thereon erected being the southeasternmost of the two semi-detached erected by the said Schoff."³ Schoff was charged in 1879 for one lot (measuring 35' by 200') and two brick houses, jointly valued at \$3,630. He utilized the dwellings as rental property, immediately leasing them individually by 1880. The dwelling at 209 Hanover Street, designated then as 30A Hanover Street, was leased to a fifty-six year old professor at the United States Naval Academy, who had immigrated from France.⁴

In 1894, Schoff sold 209 Hanover Street separately to Hugh McCusker for \$3,000. According to the deed, the property measured 19'6" by 107'8," resting along the ten foot wide alley created in 1879 by Schoff, Louisa Terry, and Charles Welch. McCusker was assessed in 1895 for a single lot on Hanover Street (measuring 17.5' by 200') and one brick dwelling, valued at \$1,815.

As early as 1868, Irish immigrant Hugh McCusker (1832-1907) had purchased a narrow urban lot at 197 Hanover Street (AA-1102) from Charles Welch. Residing on Prince George Street, McCusker worked at the steam heating plant of the United States Naval Academy, where he was employed for over fifty years. Based on historic maps, McCusker appears not to have improved 197 Hanover Street until the period between 1878 and 1880, instead residing at 195 Hanover Street (AA-1101), which he had purchased in 1867. Land records also indicate that McCusker owned the property at 203 Hanover Street.

Following the death of Hugh McCusker in 1907, all of the Hanover Street property was divided equally among his surviving children. Eldest daughter Mary McCusker received full title to the single-family dwelling at 197 Hanover Street; 195 Hanover Street was

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conveyed to Ellen McCusker Smith; and 209 Hanover Street went to John J. McCusker.

A machinist residing in Baltimore, John McCusker continued to utilize 209 Hanover Street as rental property. The 1920 census shows it was occupied by George A. Webster of Connecticut. Webster, born in 1880, was employed as the organist for St. Anne's Church. The city directory indicates a turn-over in tenants, with C.V. Fowler as the occupant by 1928.

In April 1931, John J. and Alice W. McCusker transferred title of the property to their son, Joseph Hugh McCusker. By October 1939, Howard Hayman had purchased title to the dwelling. Originally from Norfolk, Virginia, Hayman was a professional photographer and real estate agent. Based on the city directory, it appears that Hayman also employed the building as rental property, leasing it in 1949 to A.D.A. Crawford. By 1954, Hayman is listed as occupying the dwelling, making him the first owner-occupant of 209 Hanover Street since its construction seventy-five years earlier.

Although Hayman continued to reside in Annapolis with his family, he sold 209 Hanover Street in April 1965 to J. Pierre Bernard and Sibyl M. Bernard. The sale, which included the main dwelling and rights to the alley, contained 2,074 square feet of property that extended from Hanover Street to the center of Parcel 25. Several years earlier, in 1950, Bernard had purchased the early 18th century Peggy Stewart House at 207 Hanover Street from the heirs of Ridgely Melvin.

Jean Pierre Bernard, the son of George Richard and Jeanne (Wogan) Bernard, was born in New Orleans in 1901. Bernard attended the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating with the class of 1923. He served as commander of the U.S. Naval Reserve and as president, then chairman, of the Annapolis Bank & Trust.

The single-family dwelling was leased in 1967 to Mitchell A. Kapland, while Bernard resided next door at 207 Hanover Street. The late-19th century brick dwelling was renovated by 1974 to serve as two separate apartments, designated as 209A and 209B. The first and second floors were 209A, occupied by Kapland, while the basement level of 209B that fronted the street was leased to K. Fisher in 1974.

Bernard sold both 207 and 209 Hanover Street in January 1989 to Donald R. and Elaine Zuchelli. Retaining the Peggy Stewart House,

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the Zuchellis sold 209 Hanover Street in 1997 to present owners, William L. and Karen S. Kranzer. Occupying the building as their residence, the Kranzers have restored the single-family dwelling.




