

CAPSULE SUMMARY
242 King George Street (AA-1142)

The building at 242 King George Street was constructed in 1927 by the heirs of prominent property owner James Andrews, who lived at 16 Maryland Avenue (AA-625). The modest single-family house, the central unit in a row of three attached dwellings, was constructed on the site of three rowhouses erected by Andrews himself in the mid-19th century as rental property. The property, improved by two phases of rental housing, remained in the Andrews family for over eighty-five years before being sold in 1938 to the First Church of Christ, Scientists. By 1952, ownership of the row was divided, with 242 King George Street being purchased by Adelaide N. Fullinwider, the first owner-occupant.

The entire complex is two stories tall, seven bays long, and is covered with a continuous side gable roof with brick end chimneys. A single-story, hipped roof porch with Doric columns spans the full width of the row, while individual porch railings divide the three separate dwellings. The walls of the entire wood frame structure are clad with a rough stucco finish. The roof is sheathed with continuous slate on the front slope and standing seam metal on the rear slope. The two end units are two bays wide, while the central unit spans three bays.

The house at 242 King George Street is one of a row of three attached dwellings built in 1927. The row is located on the same site as a mid-19th-century row of three dwellings demolished and replaced by the present structures. The entire complex is two stories tall, seven bays long, and is covered with a continuous side gable roof with brick end chimneys. A single-story, hipped roof porch with Doric columns spans the full width of the row, while individual porch railings divide the row into three separate dwellings. The walls of the entire wood frame structure are clad with a rough stucco finish. The roof is sheathed with continuous slate on the front slope and standing seam metal on the rear slope. The two end units are two bays wide, while the central unit spans three bays.

The house numbered 242 King George Street stands as the center of the row and is the widest of the group. The entry is reached by wood stairs leading to the porch. The deep porch has wood floorboards and a beaded board ceiling. The southwest (front) elevation is divided into two bays on the first story and three bays on the second story. The first story consists of a side-passage door and tripartite window opening; the second story has three 6/1 windows. The side-passage entry retains its original door; it has two vertical panels below small-paned eight-light windows. The group of three windows, with square-edged trim and wood sills, includes a central 6/1 sash flanked by 4/1 sash. The three single openings on the second story hold 6/1 windows with square-edged trim and wood sills.

The northeast (rear) elevation is intact to its original configuration. It is three bays wide with one of the three bays located in a one-story, shed-roof wing that projects from the rear wall and is shared with 244 King George Street. On the first story, the three bays consist of a 15-light door located in the central bay of the house, a pair of 6/1 windows to the northwest, and a six-light casement window located in the shed-roof wing. The second story has three 6/1 windows. A brick chimney is located on the rear slope of the roof towards the east. A bulkhead entrance is located under the 15-light door, which is reached by wooden steps.

The interior of 242 was not accessible for survey.

PROPERTY HISTORY

The property on which the dwelling at 242 King George Street stands was historically associated with Charles Hammond and Richard Harwood. Colonel Charles Hammond (1693-1772) purchased the unimproved land in 1725 from Thomas Larkin. Following the death of Hammond, Nathan Hammond received ownership, retaining the one-acre parcel until 1785 when it was sold to William Paca. The deed of sale indicates the parcel measured 168 feet by 269 feet and included what is designated today as 12-16 Maryland Avenue and 238-248 King George Street. William Paca, who owned an improved section of property extending from King George Street to Prince George Street to the south of the Hammond-Harwood property, devised the property to John P. Paca of Queen Anne's County. In 1821, John Paca conveyed it to Benjamin Harwood for \$145. According to the deed of sale, the property contained "no dwelling of consequence."

Harwood transferred the property to Adjutant General Richard Harwood of Thomas and Henry Hall Harwood. Henry H. Harwood had obtained ownership of the Chase-Lloyd House (begun 1769) at 22 Maryland Avenue in 1826 from his wife's family. By 1829, the Harwoods sold the property to Thomas S. and Priscilla Alexander for \$1970. Denoted as Lot A in the deed, the unimproved property measured 120 feet square.

On April 9, 1852, Thomas Alexander of Baltimore sold the unimproved Lot A for \$840 to James Andrews. An immigrant from Ireland, James Andrews was a dry goods merchant on Main Street, who proceeded to erect the present brick dwelling on the property at 16 Maryland Avenue. In 1876, James Andrews was assessed for a lot (74' by 110') at the corner of Maryland Avenue and King George Street which contained a single brick house. The total value was assessed at \$5280. Andrews was also assessed for two lots and four frame

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houses on King George Street, a lot and brick storehouse on Main Street, and a lot and brick storehouse on Francis Street. His estate was assessed at a total value of \$13,456.¹ The four wood frame dwellings, on property now designated as 238, 240, 242, and 244 King George Street, had been constructed by Andrews as rental property between 1852 and 1858, simultaneous to the construction of the brick dwelling house at 16 Maryland Avenue.² Andrews was assessed in 1876 for the three frame dwellings on a lot measuring 58 feet by 160 feet, total value of \$3,696.

The census records for 1880 document that Andrews, his wife Katherine (Merryman), and their eight children resided in the dwelling at 16 Maryland Avenue. One of a row of three dwellings, the house at 242 King George Street was leased to H.O. Rittenhouse, an officer in the United States Navy originally from New York. Following the death of James Andrews in 1884, the brick dwelling house and its adjacent rental housing was devised to Katherine and their six surviving children, who remained there until 1929. Andrews' will devised ownership of the adjacent rental to three of his daughters, although title was not to be granted until the death of his wife, Katherine Andrews. Katherine D. Andrews was to have 240 King George Street; Mary Ann Andrews received 242 King George Street; and Fannie M. Andrews obtained 244 King George Street. Upon the death of their mother, Katherine M. Andrews, in 1904, full title to the property was conveyed.

The census records for 1900 show that 242 King George Street was leased to carpenter Edmund P. Banks of New Jersey and his eight children. By 1910, widow Jane Peltie and her son-in-law Lieutenant Carlston Kear were resided in the dwelling. In 1920, Naval Academy employee Marinus Anderson of Norway leased the building, which, by 1928, was occupied by the last tenant, D.E. Cummings.

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BUILDING HISTORY

In 1927, as documented by the tax assessments and historic maps, the historic row was replaced by a new group of three dwellings, having similar scale and massing to the 19th-century structures, and similarly built for rental purposes. The new building was assessed at \$9,936, not including the land on which it stood.

In 1938, the rental property was conveyed out of the Andrews family for the first time since the construction of the original tenements between 1852 and 1858. Together with 240 and 244 King George Street, the dwelling at 242 King George Street was purchased by the First Church of Christ, Scientists. Continuing to be utilized as rental property by the church, 242 King George Street was leased in 1949 to Mrs. Betty S. Myers.

By June 1952, the church released title to the property, individually conveying the three single-family dwellings that constituted the row. The dwelling at 242 King George Street, located at the center of the row, was purchased by Adelaide N. Fullinwider, the wife of Naval Captain Aimon Pendleton Fullinwider, Jr. Based on city directories, the building appears to have been owner-occupied for the first time by the summer of 1952.

In August 1988, Fullinwider conveyed the building in which she had resided for over thirty-five years jointly to Alexander B. Warrick, Jr., Sally S. Warrick, Graham E. Caldwell, and Mary W. Kersell. During this period, the dwelling was returned to its historic use as rental property. Jane M. Zinober, Moses R. Zinober, and Pearl Zinober purchased the building as their primary residence in June 1993.


