

**CAPSULE SUMMARY
Susan Wright House
48 Fleet Street

The Susan Wright House, a modest frame residence at 48 Fleet Street, was built between 1897 and 1903, along with 50 Fleet Street, on the site of an older 19th-century building. The two semi-detached houses are of similar form and massing to other two-story rowhouses found on this side of Fleet Street. Unlike the majority of the Fleet Street houses that were erected and owned by whites who then leased to working-class African Americans, these two houses were actually owned and occupied by African Americans from the time of their construction. The Susan Wright House contributes to the understanding of the cultural and social evolution of African-Americans on Fleet Street and in Annapolis.

Located on the northeast side of the street, the building is a two-story, two-bay-wide frame dwelling with a side entry and covered by a sloped roof. The roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles and features a boxed wood cornice. Retaining little of its original exterior materials or detailing, the building has suffered from cosmetic alterations and rear additions.

Between 1897 and 1903, African American Susan Wright built the house, occupying it with her family. Although inherited by her son Joseph Wright in 1928, it was inhabited by Susan McGowan, Susan Wright's daughter. McGowan is listed as a cook with a private family in the 1920 census, while her husband is documented as a domestic at the U.S. Naval Academy. The Susan Wright House continues to be owner-occupied by members of the McGowan family.

The semi-detached Susan Wright House at 48 Fleet Street was built between 1897 and 1903 on the northeast side of the street.¹ Similar in size, scale, form and detail to the late 19th-century, modest, rowhouse dwellings that characterize Fleet Street, the building is a two-story frame dwelling with a side entry and a sloped roof. Although it suffers from cosmetic alterations and rear additions, the building retains its original rectangular form.

EXTERIOR

Set on a narrow lot and fronting directly on Fleet Street, 48 Fleet Street is separated on the southeastern end from 46 Fleet Street by a side yard closed to the street by a wooden gate. It is attached on the northwest elevation to the building at 50 Fleet Street, which was constructed during the same period.

Set upon a parged brick foundation, visible on the southeast side elevation only, the wood frame building is clad with aluminum siding. Below the first story windows on the front elevation, the building is clad with a false stone veneer. It is covered with a sloping roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles and features a boxed wood cornice. A two-story rear ell, originally one-story, spans the northeast elevation. The ell is clad with aluminum siding, matching that of the main block of the house.

The three-bay facade (southwest elevation) features on the first story a side entry door in the southeastern bay and two single window openings in the northwestern bays. Accentuated by a low concrete step flanked by concrete block balusters, the entry is filled with a six-panelled wood replacement door and aluminum storm door. The opening is surmounted by an elongated single-light transom. The northwestern bays are fitted with 1/1 replacement windows trimmed by narrow, single-beaded surrounds recessed from the aluminum siding. Wooden flower boxes are attached below the first story windows. The second story has two single 1/1 windows, symmetrically aligned above the first story window openings.

The southeast side elevation has a single 1/1 window on the second story. Although the eastern elevation was not entirely surveyed, it appears to have at its eastern end a cutaway porch on the first story. The rear and the interior were not surveyed.

The Susan Wright House at 48 Fleet Street is one of only a few dwellings known to have been erected by African-American owners between 1897 and 1903 on the northwestern end of Fleet Street. The dwellings located at 48 and 50 Fleet Street were constructed on the site of a mid-19th-century building and are similar in form and massing to the other two-story rowhouses found on this side of Fleet Street. However, unlike the majority of these rowhouses that were owned by whites and rented to working-class African Americans, the two dwellings at 48 and 50 Fleet Street were owned and occupied by African Americans from the time of their construction until well into the 20th century. The building is currently owned and occupied by the McGowan family, descendants of the original owner Susan Wright.

SITE HISTORY

The land on which 48 Fleet Street stands was originally a portion of the land surveyed and set aside for Governor Francis Nicholson in 1696. Nicholson, influential in the town planning of Annapolis, directed that the newly established town of Annapolis be "surveyed and laid out in the most commodious and convenient parte of the said Towne six acres of Land intire for the erecting a Court House and other buildings as shall thought be necessary and convenient."² The land located to the south of the State House, encompassed by State Circle, Main, Francis, and East streets, was specifically set aside for Nicholson, who intended to use the property for a garden, vineyard, and site of a summer house.³ In 1699, Francis Nicholson left Maryland to serve as the Governor of Virginia, but retained part of his Annapolis properties until his death in 1728.

In 1704 following the destruction of all Annapolis land records, a portion of the Nicholson land was claimed by Thomas Bordley. In 1770, Charles Wallace purchased, from the Bordley family, a large tract of this land which stretched from the foot of Church Street up to State House Circle. Charles Wallace, by then a prominent member of the merchant community, was born in Annapolis in April

1727 to John and Anne Wallace.⁴ He began his career in the 1740s as a staymaker⁵ and in 1771 joined forces with Joshua Johnson and John Davidson, creating the mercantile firm of Wallace, Davidson, and Johnson. In addition to his business, Wallace involved himself in real estate and building ventures in the city. In 1771, Wallace began the construction of the third State House and provided the supplies necessary in the building's construction. Unwilling to continue to work on the building for lack of what he considered to be adequate financial compensation, Wallace resigned as principal contractor in December 1779.⁶ Wallace died in 1812, leaving personal property appraised at \$23,774.20 and extensive real estate in Annapolis Anne Arundel County.⁷

PROPERTY HISTORY

Immediately following his 1770 purchase of the large tract of land between the State House and Church Street, Wallace established Fleet and Cornhill streets and laid out building lots which he then sold or leased. The land currently improved with houses at 42-50 Fleet Street was leased in January 1771 for 99 years to William Hewitt. By 1773, Hewitt owned the property, mortgaging it for over L100. John Hammond and Eleanor Hewitt conveyed the property in 1824 to Walter Cross. The sale included the land which corresponds with the present properties at 42, 44, 48 and 50 Fleet Street.⁸ The deed specifically mentions a dwelling located on the site of the present 46 Fleet Street, which was excluded from this transaction.

Immediately following his purchase of the land, Walter Cross sold that portion which is currently known as 48-50 Fleet Street to a Vachel Sevier who retained ownership until 1840. Between 1840 and 1867, the property changed hands several times; in 1867 it was purchased, along with other adjacent properties, by Solomon Phillips. Solomon Phillips was born about 1819 and worked as a grocer.⁹ When Phillips died in 1870, his estate was divided between his daughter, Mary Bigelow, and his niece, Amanda Payne. In 1878, a deed of partition was executed, granting Mary Bigelow the properties at 51 Pinkney, 32 and 34, and 48 and 50 Fleet Streets.¹⁰

Waldo Orville Bigelow, the husband of Mary, was originally from South Framingham, Massachusetts. After serving in the Civil War as a Major, Bigelow was appointed postmaster of the City of Annapolis, serving from 1869 to 1880.¹¹ Near the end of his term as postmaster, he became delinquent in his accounts. In 1883, his estate and his wife's property, which had been put up for security, was placed in equity and auctioned for sale to settle his debts. Frank Stockett and John Randall were appointed trustees, selling 48 and 50 Fleet as well as other adjacent Fleet and Pinkney street properties. According to this equity case, the property at 48-50 Fleet Street was described as containing "two, one-story frame houses." Though it appears as a single dwelling on the 1885 Sanborn Map and not two individual dwellings, it is clearly shown as a 1-1/2-story frame building on the site and is undoubtedly the same one referred to in the equity case. As a result of the equity case, the parcel now designated as 48 Fleet Street was sold to Susan Wright in 1889 and that designated 50 Fleet Street was sold to Anthony Wilson in 1884.

According to the 1880 U.S. Census Records, Susan Wright, an African American working as a housekeeper, lived at 48 Fleet Street prior to purchasing the house in 1889. She lived at the house with her family, including her husband Joseph, listed as a laborer, and a

total of three children and step-children. In 1900, according to the U.S. Census, Susan and Joseph's son, Joseph Wright, age 22, lived at the house with his 20-year old wife. Joseph Wright is listed as a waiter and his wife as a clerk.

BUILDING HISTORY

In 1890, Susan Wright was assessed \$180 for a lot, 15 feet by 30 feet, and frame house on Fleet Street. Similarly in 1886, Anthony Wilson, owner of 50 Fleet Street next door, was assessed \$180 for a lot, 15 feet by 30 feet, and a house on Fleet Street. Based upon these assessments and the Sanborn Maps, it seems that the two, 1-1/2-story frame dwellings stood on the site until at least 1897. By 1903 according to the Sanborn Map, the 1-1/2-story dwellings had been demolished and were replaced by the two-story frame structures presently on the site. It appears, therefore, that the two dwellings at 48 and 50 Fleet Street were constructed between 1897 and 1903 by the individual owners, Susan Wright and Anthony Wilson.

Unlike most of the similarly scaled and designed rowhouses found on Fleet Street which were built by white owners in the mid-to late 19th century and rented to African Americans throughout much of their 19th- and 20th-century history, it appears that 48 Fleet Street was erected by an African American. Evidence of other African-Americans building their own house on Fleet Street has been found next door at 50 Fleet Street and at 36 Fleet Street; however, 36 Fleet Street was built in 1931, while 48 and 50 Fleet Street were built between 1897 and 1903--a time when documented African-American ownership is not common in Annapolis.

Susan Wright continued to live at the house with her daughter, Susan McGowan and her family, including four young children. Susan McGowan is listed as a 24-year old servant in the 1910 U.S. Census, while her husband is listed as a caterer at the Naval Academy. In 1920, Susan McGowan is listed as a cook with a private family and her husband is shown as a domestic at the U.S. Naval Academy. In 1928, Joseph Wright, who had inherited the property from his mother, sold it to his sister's family, the McGowans. The Susan Wright House continues to be owned and occupied by the McGowan family today.






