

### **Capsule Summary of 178 Main Street (AA-1328)**

Constructed between 1921 and 1930, the store at 178 Main Street was built on one of the few remaining vacant lots along Main Street. The long and narrow building was specifically built to fit within the space, confined by more substantial 19th-century buildings to either side. The building is similar in design to early to mid-20th-century commercial buildings on the street, such as 220-222 Main Street, and stands as a good example of an infill structure from that period.

The small-scale, single-story detached store building is constructed of hollow tile with a brick veneer forming a frame around the storefront on the front elevation. The side elevations are covered with stucco. The building is rectangular in plan and is covered with a sloped roof with a parapet wall facing Main Street.

Constructed between 1921 and 1930, the one-story commercial building at 178 Main Street is a small infill building located between two 19th-century structures. The small-scale, detached store building is constructed of hollow tile with a brick veneer forming a frame around the storefront on the front elevation. The side elevations are covered with stucco. The building is rectangular in plan and is covered with a sloped roof with a parapet wall facing Main Street.

The southwest elevation of the building faces Main Street and consists primarily of a storefront. A brick frame surrounds the storefront show windows on the first story, while a brick parapet wall tops the storefront. The storefront features a recessed entry with canted, plateglass show windows. The show windows, positioned with thin mullions, are set upon a masonry foundation, clad with a red terrazzo. The door is a commercial, all-glass door with a metal frame; it is surmounted by a single-light transom and flanked by single-light sidelights.

Above the storefront is an awning and metal cornice upon which is attached the store signage. A recessed panel is located against the wall of the building, behind the signage. Above this panel and separating it from the parapet wall is a copper cornice. This copper cornice extends from the inside of the brick end piers, or storefront frame, and features a stepped molding profile culminating with a cyma recta profile. The parapet wall rises directly above this cornice; it has a recessed panel and a concrete cap.

The northwest elevation extends along a narrow alley separating this building from the one to its northwest. The wall surface is clad with stucco, has a corbelled brick cornice and a ventilator shaft at the upper level of the wall, towards the middle. The parapet rises 11 brick courses above the side wall.

The southeast elevation extends along the alley separating the building from the one to the southeast; it is closed from the street by a beaded board wood door extending between the two buildings. The side wall extends to the top of the parapet wall on this side elevation.

The interior of the building has been extensively renovated to provide commercial shelving units and hanging clothes-rods for the current occupant. No historic architectural elements survive.

Constructed between 1921 and 1930, the store at 178 Main Street was built on one of the few remaining vacant lots along Main Street. The long and narrow building was specifically built to fit within the space, confined by more substantial 19th-century buildings to either side. The building is similar in design to early to mid-20th century commercial buildings on the street, such as 220-222 Main Street, and stands as a good example of an infill structure from that period.

At the request of William Bladen, the owner of the property in 1718, Lot 72 was surveyed and documented on the Stoddert Map of 1718. William Bladen was born in 1673 in Yorkshire, England.<sup>1</sup> Within months of purchasing Lot 72, Bladen died, bequeathing his property to his son, Colonel Thomas Bladen. Thomas Bladen, born in 1698, served as Governor of Maryland from 1742 to 1747. Bladen died in England in 1780.<sup>2</sup>

Thomas Bladen had his agents convey Lot 72 along with the brick house constructed by Benjamin Fordham to Thomas Bordley in 1721 for L30.<sup>3</sup> Thomas Bordley, born in Yorkshire, England about 1682, came to Kent County, Maryland in 1694. Educated as an attorney, Bordley served as Attorney General of Maryland from 1715 to 1726. Following his death in London on October 11, 1726, his land holdings in Annapolis were devised to his son, Stephen Bordley.<sup>4</sup> Stephen Bordley, born about 1710, was the eldest surviving son of Thomas Bordley. Stephen, also an attorney, served as Commissary General of Province. He died in December 1764.<sup>5</sup>

Stephen Bordley resurveyed all 22 of the Annapolis lots that he inherited in 1726.<sup>6</sup> By 1753, Bordley conveyed lot 72 to James Maccubin for L350, in currency. The conveyance included a "brick house and lot, late in occupation, Hugh Kennedy, innholder, since

in occupation, John Jordon, hatter, now occupied by Stephen Bordley, and pew on west side of church."<sup>7</sup> Maccubin owned the property until his death about 1788 when his heirs relinquished claim to James Lingan.<sup>8</sup>

James Lingan was the son of Dr. Thomas Lingan and Ann Maccubin. A General in the Revolutionary War, Lingan was killed by a mob during the Anti-Federalist riot in Baltimore on July 28, 1812.<sup>9</sup>

In 1790, Lingan conveyed the southeastern portion of the lot to Absalom Ridgely for L1000 in currency.<sup>10</sup> Ridgely, born in May 1747, worked as a merchant in Annapolis.<sup>11</sup>

The Federal Direct Tax of 1798 charges Absalom Ridgely as owner of a two-story brick dwelling (50x20) and a brick stable (20x30) on Church Street, with James West as tenant.<sup>12</sup> Ridgely leased, for 99 years, a portion of the lot facing Francis Street to Isaac Holland with an option to buy. In 1801, Ridgely conveyed the portion of lot 72 fronting on Church Street, where 178-182 Main Street were eventually constructed, to William Glover for \$3000.00.<sup>13</sup>

In 1859, the Holland Heirs, involved in an Equity Case over the ownership of the property, empowered Alexander Randall and Alexander Hagner to sell the property to John and Eliza Randall for \$3150.00. Following his death in February 1861, the property was bequeathed one-half interest to his wife, Eliza, and one-third each to his nephews, John R. Magruder and Richard Randall Magruder.<sup>14</sup>

In 1864, Eliza Randall leased her one-half interest in "all that lot of ground lying on the north and east side of Church Street between the premises now occupied by Mrs. James H. Inglehart and those occupied by Mr. Vollineyer, running back to State House Circle" to John and Richard Magruder for a fee of \$75.00 per month. The Magruders occupied the brick building on the site "carrying on business as merchants...co-partners under the name style and firm of Magruder and Brother."<sup>15</sup> By 1871, the Magruder brothers had incurred tremendous debts and, with the participation of Eliza Randall, conveyed the property to Alexander Hagner. The deed of conveyance stated that there was "...mutual consent to dissolve the co-partnership...indebted to diverse persons."<sup>16</sup> Under the arrangement to sell the property, the Magruder brother agreed to pay Eliza Randall \$700.00 annually for life, but Randall discharges the debt.

In 1879, Alexander Hagner conveyed the property at a public auction to Christian Boessel for \$2035.00. The property contained "two frame houses on State Circle, excepting part held by Magruder and afterwards sold to Vollmer."<sup>17</sup> Christian Boessel, born in Saxony, Germany on September 8, 1842, was a jeweler by trade. In 1864, he married Margaret Dolch, daughter of John E. Dolch.<sup>18</sup>

By 1891, Boessel constructed the three-story, Late Victorian Italianate building at 180-182 Main Street. In 1919, the Boessel heirs conveyed the property located at 178-182 Main Street to Peter and Rose Corosh.<sup>19</sup> Peter Corosh, born in Russia in 1876, and his wife Rose, born in Russia in 1892, owned and operated the brick building at 180-182 Main Street as a jewelry store until 1938. During the ownership of Corosh, the one-story commercial building was constructed at 178 Main Street. According to the city directory for 1928-1929, the building was occupied by the A & P Tea

Company and Edward Jewell grocery.

Both 178 and 180-182 Main Street were bequeathed by 1938 to their daughters, Mildred Lipps and Frances Edwards.<sup>20</sup> Mildred Corosh Lipps was first married in New York City on October 18, 1930 to John B. Samuels. Frances Corosh, born October 21, 1919, served as a sergeant in the United States Marine Corp in World War II. She married William A. Edwards of Princeton, North Carolina in October 1943.<sup>21</sup>

Since 1938, both of the buildings have been owned by Frances Edwards. The city directory for 1949 and 1954 indicates that 178 Main Street contained Herbert's Mens Shop. Currently the building contains the Giant Peach, a children's clothing store.






