

### **Capsule Summary for 109 Market Street (AA-1642)**

The building at 109 Market Street occupies an important corner site at the intersection of Market and Union Streets and provides insight into the development of this intersection. The property was originally part of a larger tract of land which became increasingly smaller as the land was subdivided and cut through, first by Conduit Street, between 1877-1878, and then by Union Street in 1890. The building at 109 Market Street was built at the corner of Market and Union Streets immediately following the laying of Union Street in 1890.

In 1880, the tract of land now occupied by 109-123 Market Street was purchased by William Butler, who subdivided the land into seven parcels. Butler sold two of the parcels, unimproved, while holding onto and improving the other five parcels with the row of houses now designated 111-119 Market Street. The lot upon which 109 Market Street now stands was sold, unimproved, by Butler in 1884 to William Williams.

William Williams, who bought the unimproved corner lot in 1884, built the existing dwelling on the site between the laying of Union Street in 1890, and 1891, when the house appears on the Sanborn Fire Insurance Map.

Built in a vernacular mode typical of the late 19th century for this area of Annapolis, the house at 109 Market Street is a small, two-story frame structure covered with a gable roof and sheathed with a stucco finish. The front elevation is three bays wide and features a side-passage entry door. A screened-in, single-story front porch, set upon a brick pier foundation, is supported by segmental arched openings and square wood columns. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A small brick chimney projects from the ridge of the gable roof.

Located at the corner of Market and Union Streets, the building at 109 Market Street was constructed 1890-1891 as a freestanding single family residence. The two-story house is similar in size and scale to the other residential buildings on the block and was constructed in the same time period. The front elevation faces Market Street, while one side elevation extends along Union Street. The other side is separated from its neighbor at 111 Market Street by a three-foot passageway leading to the rear yards. A two-story ell with a one-story screened-in side porch extends approximately 30 feet from the rear of the dwelling.

Built in a vernacular mode, the house at 109 Market Street is a small, two-story frame structure covered in stucco with a gable roof. The front elevation, approximately 15 feet wide, is three bays wide and features a side-passage entry door. A screened-in, single-story front porch, set upon a brick pier foundation, is supported by segmental arched openings and square wood columns. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A small brick chimney projects from the ridge of the gable roof.

The front elevation features, on the first floor, a side passage entry door on the left side with two single window openings. The second floor is pierced by three single window openings. All of the windows and the entry door have architrave surrounds with a slightly projecting cornice. The windows are all 2/2 with shutters on the second floor. The front entry features a single-light transom above a wood and glass replacement door with an outside louvered door that was added in 1992.

The west elevation of the main section of the house, which is approximately 30 feet long, is two bays deep. The 2/2 windows have the same architrave surrounds that appear on the front elevation. Two narrow openings, measuring approximately five inches in height, with lattice coverings puncture the basement level.

An original two-story ell with a shed roof extends from the main gable of the house towards the north. The ell, originally two bays deep, was enlarged between 1903 and 1908 to its present three bays. This is evident in the slight change in the slope of the roof. The 1/1 windows have simple surrounds, lacking the architrave surrounds of the main house. Set in the ell is a one-story screened-in porch with a shed roof, supported by square wood columns. This porch was added between 1897 and 1903. The porch entry is to the rear on the north elevation. The north elevation of the ell has a single entry

door on the first floor, with two single windows on the second floor. The first is a small 2/2 window while the other is a full size 1/1 window.

The east elevation of the house, which faces the narrow three-foot passageway between 109 and 111 Market Street, presents an unfenestrated wall surface with a stucco finish. The passageway is closed to the street by a vertical wooden plank door with a rounded top.

The interior of 109 Market Street originally consisted of a side-passage, double-pile-plan that has been slightly altered. The entry door originally opened onto a narrow hall off of which opened the front and rear parlors. The wall between the front hall and the front parlor has been removed.<sup>1</sup> The opening from the hall onto the rear parlor remains intact with original frame molding with a beaded and fluted relief. The remainder of the windows and door openings on the first floor have a plain, flat board surround. The hardwood floors are mid-20th century replacements laid prior to the 1962 sale of the house. A modern double door opening appears on the rear wall of the front parlor to the right of the chimney. No fireplace opening occurs on this side of the chimney.

The rear parlor, presently the dining room, contains a quarter-turn stairway leading to the second floor. The boxed stairway, located in the northeast corner of the room, has no balustrade or newel post. The chimney has been enclosed by a closet with built-in shelves. Evidence of a flue for a wood-burning stove can be seen in the chimney. The dining room opens onto the kitchen located in the ell. The flat trim appears throughout the kitchen, with the beaded and fluted relief molding surrounding the entry to the dining room. The two bay deep kitchen has a door leading to the screened-in side porch. To the rear of the kitchen is a storage room in the addition.

The second floor retains all original beaded and fluted trim on the windows and doors with the flat board trim in the rear ell bedroom and bathroom. The master bedroom extends across the front of the

house and is one bay deep. The hallway opens onto the second bedroom on the west side of the house with the stairway on the east wall. A simple balustrade of square posts surrounds the stair opening. The original pine floorboards still exist. To the north the hall opens onto a rear bedroom. The only bathroom in the house can be reached through the bedroom in the rear addition.

The half-basement, reached by a narrow straight flight of stairs under the stairway has a cement floor and contains the water heater and gas furnace.

The building at 109 Market Street was built at the corner of Market and Union Streets, immediately following the laying of Union Street in 1890.<sup>2</sup>

The lot on which the house at 109 Market Street now stands was, in the 18th century, part of a much larger tract of land that was designated Lot 36 on the Stoddert Map of 1718 and was owned and "dwelt upon" by William Bladen.<sup>3</sup> Following Bladen's death, the land was inherited by his son Thomas, who, in 1721, sold Lot 36 along with other adjoining lots to Benjamin Tasker. Benjamin Tasker retained ownership of Lot 36 until his death in 1768, at which time his will devised, to his wife Anne, "my dwelling house and the lotts thereto adjoining."<sup>4</sup> At Anne Tasker's death in 1775, she left Lot 36 as well as the adjoining land to her grandson, Daniel Dulaney, Jr. In 1781, the year Dulaney official inherited Lot 36 and 37, he turned around and sold it to Col. John Stewart, a nominal purchaser for Nathaniel Ramsey. John Stewart also bought, that same year, half of Lot 35. At that time, a dwelling, most likely the Tasker residence, stood on Lot 36 and two stables stood on the adjacent Lot 37.

In 1793, Nathaniel Ramsey sold Lot 36 as well as the adjacent Lot 37 and half of Lot 35 to Charles Wallace, who retained ownership of the property until his death in 1812, at which time a Chancery

Court litigation over payment of bequests in Wallace's will ensued. In 1817, Nicholas Brewer, trustee in the Chancery case, sold Wallace's property to Edward Williams. In 1824, Edward Williams sold Lots 35, 36, 37, and 38 to Richard Ireland Jones, who two years later, sold the land to Brice Brewer. Brewer gave the land to his six children in 1843. In 1846, John Duvall surveyed the property and divided it into six parcels of land, designated Lot 1 through 6. Each of the six children were then given a specific lot. Lot 2, which corresponds with parts of Lots 35 and 36, was conveyed to Brice Brewer, Jr. In 1860, Brewer acquired Lot 1 from his nieces and nephews who had inherited the land from their mother, Brewer's sister. Lots 1 and 2 correspond with part of Stoddert Lots 35 and 36. In 1863, Brewer, Jr. sold both of his lots of land to George Wells. George Wells, a prominent local resident who was state senator in 1854 and 1856, President of Farmers Bank of Annapolis, chief head of the Annapolis and Elkridge Railroad and Warden of St. Anne's church, retained ownership of the property, as well as other adjacent and non-adjacent land, until 1880, when Well's fell into debt, and this property, amongst others was sold by the bank.

When George Wells fell into bankruptcy his estate went into equity.<sup>5</sup> In order to pay Wells' debt, Alexander Randall, designated Trustee of George Wells' estate, sold Wells' land at public auction by order of the court. Wells' estate was subdivided into smaller tracts and parcels and sold off individually. In 1880, William Butler purchased the lot of ground now designated as 109-123 Market Street.<sup>6</sup>

During his ownership of the land, Butler subdivided it into seven parcels and sold two of the parcels, unimproved, while holding onto and improving the other five parcels. The lot upon which 109 Market Street now stands was sold, unimproved, by Butler in 1884 to William Williams. The following year, Butler also sold the lot of land now occupied by 121-123 Market Street, to the Maryland Colored Baptist Congregation, which subsequently built a church on the site (now demolished and replaced by the duplex at 121-123 Market

Street). Butler sold these two lots of land located at the extreme ends of his tract, but retained the remaining five lots of land and improved them with the erection of the present row of five attached dwellings.

William Williams, who bought the unimproved corner lot in 1884, built the existing dwelling on the site between the laying of Union Street in 1890, and 1891, when the house appears on the Sanborn Fire Insurance Map.<sup>7</sup> William Williams sold the house and land in 1893, shortly after the construction of the dwelling, to Samuel Wood who owned and the residence until his death in 1926, when the property was deeded to his widow, Bertha Shannon. Prior to her death, Bertha Shannon turned the property over to her son William Morris Shannon. William Shannon transferred the property to his daughter Margaret Baker, who on the same day in 1962 sold it to its current owner and resident, Nancy C. Kramer.


