

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**  
**105 Charles Street (AA-1716)**  
**Annapolis, Maryland**

The modest building at 105 Charles Street, although reading as part of a continuous row, was the final structure erected in the series of single-family dwellings between 101-109 Charles Street. The wood frame dwelling was erected for property owner John P. Crusnach in the years between 1897 and 1900. By 1928, the Crusnach heirs conveyed the property. Largely unaltered on the exterior, the building represents a phase in the development of Charles Street, on property historically associated with the Adams-Kilty House at 131-133 Charles Street.

A vernacular interpretation of the Italianate style, the single-family dwelling is constructed of wood frame clad in German siding on the facade. The rear of the building, and its one-story ell, are clad in asbestos shingles. It is rectangular in form with a brick foundation. The sloping roof is pierced by a single interior brick chimney and has an overhanging boxed cornice with scrolled brackets and modillions. It has an ogee-molded return above the side gable roof of the attached dwelling at 103 Charles Street. The rectangular lot is accessible from the exterior via a narrow common alley. Known as Morehouse Alley, the common space is reached from Cathedral Street and runs along the rear of 101-109 Charles Street.

The two-story dwelling at 105 Charles Street was the last structure erected within the continuous row of buildings between 101 and 109 Charles Street. Erected between 1897 and 1900, the single-family dwelling is constructed of wood frame clad on the facade with German siding. The rear of the building, and its one-story ell, are clad in asbestos shingles. It is rectangular in form with a brick foundation. The sloping roof is pierced by a single interior brick chimney and has an overhanging boxed cornice.

The building appears as part of an intact row from Charles Street. The rectangular lot is accessible from the exterior via a narrow common alley. Known as Morehouse Alley, the common space is reached from Cathedral Street and runs along the rear of 101-109 Charles Street.

Exterior

The facade of the building, facing southeast on Charles Street, is three bays wide with a side entry. The two courses of brick foundation visible at the facade are pierced with openings that are set below grade and currently obstructed from view by plywood covers. The first story of the symmetrically pierced elevation has two 2/2 elongated windows and a narrow entry. The entry, located in the easternmost bay, has a six-paneled replacement door with a granite stoop. The second story has three equally spaced 2/2 windows. All of the openings on the facade have square-edged casings with wood sills and projecting ogee-molded lintel caps. The lintels of the second story windows abut the plain frieze of the entablature. The overhanging boxed cornice has scrolled brackets and modillions. It has an ogee-molded return above the side gable roof of the dwelling at 103 Charles Street.

The rear elevation of the main block, obscured at the first story because of a one-story ell, is pierced on the second story by a 6/6 replacement window and a single entry. The openings, surrounded by square-edged casings with wood sills, are sheltered by a shed roof porch. Supported by square posts with chamfered corners, the porch has square balusters.

The first story of the ell has a single entry on the northwest elevation that holds a nine-light aluminum door with very narrow square-edged casings. The side elevations of the ell have paired casement windows with a single light.

The form and siting of the adjacent single dwelling at 103 Charles Street has created a narrow gap between the two buildings that is

not visible from Charles Street. The gap allows for a number of single window openings on the southwest elevation of the house at 105 Charles Street. Each story has two openings, holding either 6/6 or 1/1 replacement windows. All of the windows have square-edged casings, wood sills, and lintels flush with the asbestos cladding.

The interior of 105 Charles Street was not accessible for survey.

The modest building at 105 Charles Street, although reading as part of a continuous row, was the final structure erected in the series of single-family dwellings between 101-109 Charles Street. The wood frame dwelling was erected for property owner John P. Crusnach in the years between 1897 and 1900. By 1928, the Crusnach heirs conveyed the property. Largely unaltered on the exterior, the building represents a phase in the development of Charles Street, on property historically associated with the Adams-Kilty House at 131-133 Charles Street (AA-393).

**Site History: Lot 53**

The property on which the dwelling at 105 Charles Street now stands was historically owned and surveyed in 1718 for William Gresham. Residing in Kent County, Gresham owned Lots 52, 53, and 55 along Charles Street in Annapolis. The property was conveyed to planter William Adams of Somerset County in two separate deeds of sale dating from December 1772 and May 1773. Chancery Records document that Thomas Gresham, then owner of the lots, died prior to the completion of the sales. Consequently, the conveyance was not decreed until November 1789.

Documentary evidence indicates that the property remained unimproved through most of the 18th century, particularly while under the ownership of the Gresham family. A lease made by Adams to Thomas Brooke Hodgkins of Annapolis documents that a building did stand on the property by 1786, when the twelve year lease was filed. Denoted now as 131-133 Charles Street, documentary and physical evidence suggests the building was erected by William Adams sometime between 1772 and 1786. With the death of Adams in 1795, title was devised to his wife and children. Adams' brother, however, contested the will, prompting the court to order the entire parcel to be sold. In 1797, all three lots plus the brick dwelling were assessed at 1125 pounds. One year later, with the estate still unsettled, the property was valued at 900 pounds. While the estate was being reviewed, General John Davidson occupied the dwelling, and later served as trustee for the sale of the property.

On November 14, 1799, William Kilty purchased the land with its improvements for 775 pounds. Kilty, who later served as Chancellor of Maryland, lived in the dwelling for nineteen years. By 1818, Kilty had conveyed the three lots to Francis Hollingsworth for \$3,150. Hollingsworth, in turn, sold Lots 52, 53, and 55 to Thomas H. Bowie. Bowie died prior to the completion of the sale and the courts appointed title back to Hollingsworth. In 1824,

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Hollingsworth sold the two lots along with the building at 131-133 Charles Street to George Wells for \$3,025.

Born in 1800, George Wells, Jr. was a prominent citizen of Annapolis, serving as president of the Farmers National Bank and in the Maryland Senate, as well as manager of the Annapolis & Elk Ridge Railroad. Wells had begun purchasing property, both improved and undeveloped, throughout Annapolis in the 1820s. By the 1840s, he had accumulated all of the parcels fronting Charles Street, which included the Adams-Kilty House at 133 Charles Street and the Jonas Green House at 124 Charles Street.

By the third quarter of the 19th century, Wells had overextended himself financially. Consequently, he mortgaged his landholdings to the Farmers Bank of Maryland in 1877. Wells immediately defaulted on the loans and was forced to sell his property on Charles Street, Duke of Gloucester Street, Market Street, South Street, Cathedral Street, Carroll Street, North West Street, and Bladens Street. Alexander Randall was appointed trustee of the estate, and charged with overseeing the subdivision and sale of the land. The property along Charles Street, which included Parcels 28, 30, 31, and 32 was subdivided to create 25 individual lots to be sold at public auction. The sale, completed by 1881, yielded \$16,563 for Wells to pay his creditors. Lot 53 in Parcel 30 was divided into eight smaller plots, which were sold individually.

**Building History**

One of the last of the Charles Street lots to be conveyed, the property extending northeast from Cathedral Street included what is now designated as 101-109 Charles Street. The corner lot measured 111 feet on Cathedral Street and 76 feet on Charles Street. Charles I. Murphy purchased the property from George Wells' trustees in 1880. Murphy immediately subdivided it into five smaller building lots. The lot denoted as 105 Charles Street was conveyed in September 1880 to John Peter Crusnach. Crusnach immigrated to the United States from Germany in 1865, and was a member of the Naval Academy band for thirty-five years. Together with his second wife, German-born Martha Hahn, Crusnach had the modest dwelling at 105 Charles Street erected between 1897 and 1900.

Despite the 1918 death of her husband, Martha Crusnach continued to reside in the modest house on Charles Street. In 1928, she sold it to John and Ruth Kaadtman. Kaadtman, born in Copenhagen in 1892,

served in the United States Marine Corps and then as a guard at the Naval Academy. The city directory for 1929 shows that Kaadtman leased the Charles Street dwelling to Olin Wilson and F.W. Storton. The property was conveyed in 1938 to L. Kennerly and Ruth W. Taylor. Two years later, in 1940, Kennerly Taylor died. Ruth Taylor, however, continued to own and occupy the dwelling.

In December 1948, Taylor sold the property to Lewis N. and Mary Ellen Jones. The city directory for the period between 1949 and 1960 records that the Joneses lived in the dwelling. By 1961, it served as rental property, leased to Carla Feldmeyer until the 1970s. In 1977, Etta W. Richwine purchased the property, conveying it in 1985 to Joseph M. Oliver and his wife, Jo Ellen Freese. In 1989, the property was conveyed once again, purchased by William Miller, III and Elizabeth Darcy Miller. The Millers owned the house until December 1998, when they sold it to Andre C. and Anne Lessard of New Jersey. The Lessards currently use 105 Charles Street as rental property.


