

CAPSULE SUMMARY
George Branzell House
67 East Street
AA-1794

The George Branzell House was built between 1852 and 1855 near the intersection of East and Pinkney streets on land that was, during the 18th century, part of a larger parcel of land owned by Charles Carroll. The two-story, three-bay house, with its side-passage entry, gable roof and end chimney, follows a mid-to late 19th-century residential building form that is common to the Fleet and East streets area and that contributes to the architectural significance of the Annapolis Historic District.

The George Branzell House is a freestanding residence located on the south side of East Street near its intersection with Pinkney Street. It is a two-story, three-bay, side-passage frame dwelling with weatherboard walls. It is covered with a gable roof, clad with standing seam metal, and features a parged brick interior end chimney. Though freestanding, the house is built up against the house next to it at 65 East Street, but remains unattached on its west side. A two-story ell with a single-story addition attached to it projects from the rear of the dwelling and fronts directly on Pinkney Street.

In 1852, George Branzell purchased an unimproved lot of land on East Street for \$100, and by 1855 when he sold the property for \$800, erected the present two-story frame dwelling on the site of 67 East Street. The property passed through the hands of various owners in the late 19th and 20th centuries.

The George Branzell House, located at 67 East Street¹, was constructed in 1852-1855.² The two-story, three-bay frame dwelling with its side-passage entry and gable roof, follows a common residential building form from the period that can be found along East and Fleet streets in Annapolis.

EXTERIOR

The George Branzell House is a freestanding residence located on the south side of East Street near its intersection with Pinkney Street. It is a two-story, three-bay, side-passage frame dwelling with weatherboard walls. It is covered with a gable roof, clad with standing seam metal, and features a parged brick interior end chimney. Though freestanding, the house is built up against the house next to it at 65 East Street, but remains unattached on its west side. A two-story ell with a single-story addition attached to it projects from the rear of the dwelling and fronts directly on Pinkney Street. A tall vertical board wood fence surrounds the triangular-shaped property.

The facade (north elevation) of the house is divided into three bays with a side-passage entry and two windows on the first story and three windows on the second story. The entry is fitted with a four-panel wood door with a single-light transom above and a wood sill below. The entry door is reached by a brick platform or stoop and is recessed into the frame walls with no exterior trim. Two enlarged³ window openings next to the door are fitted with 6/1 replacement windows. The second story of the dwelling has three 6/6 windows with wood sills.

The west side elevation consists of the side wall of the main block of the house and the side wall of the rear ell and its addition. Both the wall of the main block and the ell are clad with weatherboard siding. The main block has no openings, save for a

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two-light casement in the gable end of the attic level. The two-story rear ell and its one-story shed wing extends from the rear of the main block of the house to Pinkney Street, actually projecting one-bay wider than the main block of the house on this west side. The west elevation of this ell has a 6/1 window on both the first and second stories. The west elevation of the one-story shed addition at the rear of the ell is similarly lit with a 6/1 window.

The south (rear) elevation consists of the rear wall of the two-story ell and the rear wall of the one-story wing abutting it. The second story of the rear ell, exposed above the addition, has two 6/1 windows with shutters. The shed addition also has two, 6/1 windows with shutters.

The interior of the building was not accessible for survey.

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The George Branzell House was built between 1852 and 1855 near the intersection of East and Pinkney streets on land which was, during the 18th century, part of a larger parcel of land owned by Charles Carroll. The two-story, three-bay house, with its side-passage entry, gable roof and end chimney, follows a mid-to late 19th-century residential building form that is common to the Fleet and East streets area and that contributes to the architectural significance of the Annapolis Historic District.

SITE HISTORY

The large tract of land on which the building at 67 East Street was constructed was originally a portion of Lot 83 surveyed by Stoddert in 1718 for John Navarre. In 1720, Navarre defaulted on the mortgage held by Charles Carroll. Having obtained ownership of the property located to the northwest of present-day East Street, Carroll leased the "improved" tract of land to numerous tenants for the next 40 years. In 1759, Catherine Jennings bought the land for 250 pounds in currency from Carroll. Jennings died in Frederick, Maryland in 1765, and an Act of Assembly transferred title of the land, specifically mentioned as Lot 86, to Thomas Jennings, a later owner of the William Paca House.⁴ This same Act of Assembly changed the path of East Street to extend along the boundary between Lots 86 and 85, instead of through the center of Lot 86.⁵

By the mid-18th century, the property was occupied by Samuel Chase, one of the four Maryland signers of the Declaration of Independence. In 1769, Thomas Jennings agreed to sell the lot, which included a house constructed by Navarre, to shoemaker Charles Bryan for 500 pounds current money. Living in the house constructed by Navarre, Bryan reputedly operated a tavern in the building in addition to a shoemaker's business. Bryan leased the lot to John Warren in 1772. Warren operated a tavern, called the "Rose and Crown" on the site. When Warren sold his business in 1774, the lease was purchased by John King, a former coachman to Governor Eden. According to numerous articles in the *Maryland Gazette*, it is known that King operated stables and an ordinary on the property. Although King bought the lease with eight years remaining from Bryan, he went out of business by 1775 and the

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property reverted back to the Jennings family. According to a Provincial Court Deed, King sold his tavern equipment to Allen Quynn and Francis Fairbrother. Since no information has been located regarding the Navarre house after 1775, it is believed that the building either burned or was demolished.

At the early part of the 19th century, East Street existed only in part. A segment of the street ran from State Circle to its intersection with Fleet Street (approximately). The street resumed after Prince George Street and ran to King George Street. By 1820, the City of Annapolis decreed an "Act to Open and Extend East Street...and to close up that part of said street leading to Prince George Street." The property owners for that segment, Charles Carroll and Delilah Holland, were awarded damages for the confiscation of their unimproved property to extend East Street through to Prince George Street.⁶

Having inherited the tract of land from his father, Thomas Jennings, Jr. sold it in 1801 to John Sands, Jr. for 1000 pounds. John Sands, Jr. (1762-1807) was the son of mariner and sailmaker John Sands (1731-1791), who lived at 130 Prince George Street. Following the death of Sands, Jr., the property was inherited by Washington Sands⁷, who also owned the adjacent tract of land at 59-63 East Street. In 1837, Washington Sands conveyed the property at 65 East Street, along with his adjacent land at 59-61 East Street to his brother Thomas Sands. Thomas Sands (1808-1883), a carpenter, erected the late Federal dwelling at 61 East Street by 1877.⁸

PROPERTY HISTORY

Between 1837 and 1852, the ownership history of the property at 67 East Street is not fully understood. In 1852, it was conveyed to George and Elizabeth Branzell by Trustee Alexander B. Hagner. Hagner had been appointed trustee by order of the Circuit Court in the case, Philip Wesley Whitwright versus John Thomas Parrott,

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dated 1851. The undeveloped lot of land was sold to Branzell for \$100. Branzell erected the present two-story frame dwelling on the site. The dwelling, which follows a typical mid-to late-19th century dwelling form found along East and Fleet streets in Annapolis was purchased by Levi Phillips for \$800 in 1855. The deed of sale indicated that Branzell had "erected a new frame building" on the site.⁹ The property extended 75'6" on East Street and 77' on Carrolls Alley. Phillips conveyed the lot and dwelling to Thomas J. Jones for \$1200.00 in 1864.

By 1882, Thomas J. Jones defaulted on the mortgage. Erasmus Clausen purchased the property in November 1883 at a public auction for \$750. Clausen, born in Denmark in 1851, was a retired Warrant Officer for the United States Navy. Together with his wife, Elizabeth and daughter, Cecilia, Erasmus Clausen lived in the dwelling at 67 East Street until 1900. Edward T. Veazey purchased the property for \$600.

Edward Thomas Veazey was born in Wilmington, Delaware in 1861. According to the census records of 1910, Edward T. Veazey had served three years in the Navy during the Civil War. Elizabeth, Veazey's wife, was born in Germany in 1870 and immigrated to the United States in 1882. While residing on College Avenue, the Veazey family originally leased 67 East Street to laborer John Freeman. By 1910, Veazey had moved his large family to 67 East Street.

Carmine Ristaino purchased the property in 1919 from Veazey. Carmine Bristano Ristaino, born in Sorbo Serpico, Avellion, Italy in 1883, immigrated to the United States in 1907 and became a citizen in 1912. When Ristaino, a tailor at the United States Naval Academy died in June 1969, the property was inherited by his five surviving children. The Ristaino heirs sold it to George Perkins and Jack R. Mills that same year.

After standing vacant, the building was sold in 1971 to Frank B. and Judith Z. Lawson. The Lawsons sold it in 1975 to Carolyn L. Amm, who retained ownership until 1977. Owned by Philip F. Sheats from 1977 to 1979, the building at 67 East Street was sold to Nancy H. Noyes. Noyes resided in the dwelling until 1986, when it was sold to the present owner-occupant, Edward F. McLaughlin.






