

Capsule Summary for 2 Randall Place (AA-18)

Built in the period between 1900-1903, the three attached houses at 1, 2 and 3 Randall Place are located on property that was originally part of the large tract of land associated with the Bordley-Randall house. The history of the properties designated 1, 2 and 3 Randall Place illustrates the subdivision of the once large and prominent 18th century Annapolis estates into smaller parcels in the 19th century and the subsequent development of these subdivisions. In addition, the three houses occupy an important site at the intersection of Randall Place, State Circle and Maryland Avenue and are good local examples of the shingle style of architecture.

The three separate, but attached residences were designed together to appear as one large and imposing dwelling. Originally set back from Maryland Avenue, the buildings were altered during the mid-20th century to accommodate individual storefronts that project from the Maryland Avenue elevation of the houses and face this commercial strip.

The second floor and attic level of 2 Randall Place currently serves as a rental apartment entered from Randall Place. The original first floor of the dwelling and store front addition are occupied by a bookstore.

Constructed in the period 1900-1903, the buildings at 1, 2 and 3 Randall Court are three separate, but attached residences that were originally designed together to appear as one large and imposing dwelling. The three buildings, which occupy an important site at the corner of Maryland Avenue, State Circle, and Randall Court (historically Randall Place), originally fronted Randall Place and were set back from Maryland Avenue. During the mid-20th century, however, individual storefronts were built to project from the Maryland Avenue elevation of the houses. The second floor and attic level of 1 and 2 Randall Court are currently rental apartments entered from Randall Place, while each of the three stores has a Maryland Avenue entrance and address.

Designed in the shingle style of architecture, the attached houses at 1, 2 and 3 Randall Place are 2-1/2-story frame structures which share a common roof and offer the symmetry and balance of one structure. The three buildings, clad with stucco on the first floor and weathered shingles above, are joined together with undetected seams and appear as a single, long, and horizontal building covered with a cross gable roof. The original Maryland Avenue elevation of the buildings features a central projecting pavilion flanked by end wings, while the Randall Court elevation more clearly defines the three individual structures by three projecting cross gable roofs, each with a projecting brick chimney on center.

The house designated 2 Randall Place is the center building, sandwiched between the two end dwellings. Like 1 Randall Place, this house has been altered to accommodate a store on the first floor and an apartment on the second floor and attic level. Despite floorplan changes and additions, 2 Randall Place retains much of its original door and window trim and moldings.

Because of its central location in the row of dwellings, 2 Randall Place originally had only two exposed elevations: the northwest elevation facing Randall Place and the southeast elevation facing Maryland Avenue. Today, the original Maryland Avenue elevation is obscured by the storefront addition, while the Randall Court elevation remains intact and visible.

Like its neighbors, the northwest (Randall Place) elevation of 2 Randall Place is primarily characterized by the overhanging projecting gable found on each of the three Randall Court elevations of the three houses. This projecting gable, clad with fishscale shingles at the attic level and rectangular shingles on

the second floor, is located at the north end of the elevation and hangs slightly over the stuccoed first floor below. The south end of this elevational wall originally had a recessed exterior wall on the first floor with a single-story porch, set upon brick piers, extending slightly beyond the projecting gable. This porch supported the all-encompassing gable roof that is so typical of the shingle style, along with its dormer window. Today, the first floor porch on this south end has been enclosed and a second floor addition, which obscures the dormer window, has been built atop the original sweeping gable roofline.

The northwest elevation features pairs of 4/4 windows with plain architrave surrounds on the first floor in both the projecting gable and enclosed porch area. Next to the windows in the enclosed porch is a wood and glass door approached by modern brick stairs and covered by a shed roof which is supported by wood brackets. The second floor of the projecting gable has a set of three 4/4 windows, while the second floor addition above the enclosed porch has a single 4/4 window. The attic level of the projecting gable has a 6-light casement and the dormer window has a 6/6 window.

The original southeast, or Maryland Avenue elevation has been obscured on the first floor by the addition of a storefront, added between 1921 and 1930, but the second and attic floors are still visible. The character-defining feature of this elevation is the central projecting gable meant to unite the three dwellings and have them appear as one. Like the rear projecting gables, this gable hangs over the first floor stuccoed walls and is clad with rectangular shingles on the first floor and fishscale shingles in the attic level. The attic level has a single 8-light casement window on center, while the second floor has two 4/4 windows and a 6-light casement between them.

The interiors of 1, 2 and 3 Randall Place were originally identical, but have been somewhat altered to accommodate new use of space. Like 1 Randall Place, 2 Randall Place has been converted into a store on the original first floor and into an apartment on the second floor level. Originally, the first floor of the dwelling featured a four-room plan with two large front and rear parlors, off of which were a smaller room (probably the kitchen) and stair hall towards the rear. The original entry door opened directly into the front parlor with a corner fireplace, while large double doors provided access to the rear parlor, also with a corner

fireplace. Today, the front exterior wall of the front parlor has been removed and the room enlarged by the addition of the storefront. Ghosting on the northeast side wall of the room indicates the placement of the original exterior wall. The front parlor retains the corner fireplace, but the original mantel has been replaced with a brick mantel and the original bullseye trim around the door leading into the rear parlor has been replaced by plain molding. Although the rear parlor retains its original bullseye molding around the windows against the back wall and the door leading into the front parlor, the corner fireplace has been covered over and the mantel removed.

Although the original front side room survives relatively intact, the rear stair hall has been altered. This rear stair hall, which provides access to the second floor apartment, has been closed off from the store.

The second floor apartment is reached through Randall Court, via the enclosed porch area and stair hall which have been combined to create a first floor entry vestibule. Quarter-turn stairs in the original location ascend to the second floor apartment, which consists of three rooms: a living room, dining room and kitchen.

The living room and dining room extend from the front to the rear of the house and are connected by a single door opening. This opening is flanked by modern shelves and closets built into the dividing wall. The dining room is located along the southeast front of the house and overlooks Maryland Avenue, while the living room overlooks Randall Court. The living room windows have the original beaded and fluted moldings, while new wood floors have been laid atop the original in all three rooms. The baseboards are original with the half-round shoe molding intact. A small study which opens off of the south side wall of the living room (above the entry vestibule) occupies the second floor addition built atop the original gable roof.

The kitchen, located off of the south wall of the dining room, features a small pantry against the south wall that is set down approximately eight inches from the floor of the kitchen. The pantry has beaded board walls and is the only original feature of this room (original use unknown).

An addition containing an extension to the kitchen and a bath off

of the dining room was added to the southeast front of the house on this second floor in recent years.

Enclosed stairs lead to the finished attic level which consists of three small rooms set within the cross gable roof. Unlike the second floor, the attic level retains its original 2-1/2" floorboards which run from the front to the back of the house at this level. Fluted and molded window trim like that on the second floor occurs in the attic level.

No access was gained to the basement to 2 Randall Place.




