

CAPSULE SUMMARY
32 East Street
AA-1808

The pair of buildings at 32 and 34-36 East Street are located on property that was originally part of the large tract of land associated with the Brice House. The dwellings, constructed between 1903 and 1905 atop a stone retaining wall enclosing the eastern edge of the 18th-century Brice House property, illustrate the subdivision of the once large and prominent 18th-century Annapolis estates into smaller parcels in the 19th century, and the subsequent development of these subdivisions.

The 2-1/2-story, three-bay, frame dwellings are identical in form and detail to one another and, though distinct for their raised configuration, reflect a two-story, three-bay form of architecture that is common to the residential buildings on East Street. Presented in a vernacular manner and set upon a raised stone and brick foundation, the dwelling is clad with a smooth stucco finish and is covered with a gable roof with a central dormer window and central chimney. A two-story ell, original to the house, spans almost the entire rear elevation of the dwelling, while a single-story porch addition, raised upon a high foundation, extends across two of the three bays of the facade.

The house at 32 East Street has been owner occupied for most its history and remained in the same Irish family hands from 1912 until 1974.

The pair of attached dwellings located at 32 and 34-36 East Street were constructed between 1903 and 1905¹ atop a stone wall enclosing the eastern edge of the 18th-century Brice House property. The 2-1/2-story, three-bay, frame dwellings are identical in form and detail to one another and, though distinct for their raised configuration, reflect a two-story, three-bay form of architecture that is common to the residential buildings on East Street.

EXTERIOR

The dwelling at 32 East Street is one of a pair of attached dwellings located on the northwest side of East Street at the intersection of Martin Street. It is a 2-1/2-story, three-bay, side-passage frame structure, clad with a smooth stucco finish² and set upon a raised stone and brick foundation. The stone portion of the foundation appears to be part of a stone wall that bordered this edge of the Brice property. The dwelling is covered with a gable roof with a central dormer window and central chimney. A two-story ell, original to the house, spans almost the entire rear elevation of the dwelling, while a single-story porch addition, raised upon a high foundation, extends across two of the three bays of the facade.

The south facade of the dwelling is divided into three equal bays on the first and second stories. The raised foundation level is constructed of brick laid in five-course American bond on the facade. Only the east end of this foundation level is exposed, as the foundation supporting the porch abuts the foundation and extends across the two western bays of the house. A small, two-light fixed window is located at the corner of the exposed portion of the foundation wall directly under the first floor.

The first story, raised upon the high foundation and reached by the porch set upon a parged concrete block foundation, consists of a

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side-entry and two 6/6 windows.³ The entry is fitted with a six-panel wood door with a single-light transom above. The two-bay porch, added during the early to mid-20th century, has a hipped roof, supported by turned columns and balustrade with square balusters.⁴ The porch itself features a beaded board ceiling and a wood floor.

The second story has three 6/6 windows. All of the windows and the front entry door share identical square-edged casing and a molded lintel.

A boxed wood cornice with an ogee cap is visually supported by four equally spaced wood brackets. A central pedimented dormer is located on center of the south slope of the gable. The dormer is fitted with a 2/2 window.

The east side elevation of the dwelling extends along Martin Street and includes both the side wall of the main block of the house and the side wall of the rear ell. The main block of the house is two bays deep, and is here raised upon a foundation of rubble stone with brick at the top edge and back bay. Based upon the stone in the foundation wall and historic maps which show a stone retaining wall bordering the eastern edge of the Brice property, it appears that 32 East Street was built atop an existing stone wall.⁵ This side wall is clad with a smooth stucco finish and is lit by a single 6/6 window⁶ in the north end bay on the first story, by two 6/6 windows on the second story, and by a central 2/2 window in the gable end at the attic level. The windows on the first and second stories of this elevation have the same square edged casing and molded lintel as those on the facade. The attic-level window has square edged casing and square-edged lintel above.

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The east side wall of the rear ell of the house is raised upon a high brick foundation and has three windows on the first story and two windows on the second story. Although this ell is original to the house, the windows here are all 2/2 as opposed to the 6/6 windows of the main block. The square-edged window casing and molded lintel is identical, however. It is most likely that the 2/2 windows are original and were replaced with 6/6 on the front of the house.

The north (rear) elevation of the house includes the north wall of the rear ell and a narrow, exposed bay on the main block of the house. Both wall surfaces are clad with a smooth stucco finish. The exposed bay of the main block has a 6/6 window on both the first and second stories with identical casings as found elsewhere on the house. The rear ell has two bays of 2/2 windows on the second story and a door and window on the first story. The rear entry is fitted with a four-panelled wood door with a single-light transom above. The door and window surrounds similarly have square-edged casing with molded lintels.

The rear yard of 32 East Street is raised above street level and is bordered, along Martin Street, by a stone wall--a continuation of the stone wall forming the foundation of the house.

The interior of the dwelling was not accessible for survey.

The history of the attached dwelling illustrates the subdivision of the once large and prominent 18th century Annapolis properties into smaller parcels in the 19th century, and the subsequent development of these subdivisions. The house at 32 East Street has been owner occupied for most of its history and remained in the same family from 1912 until 1974.

SITE HISTORY

The building designated 32 East Street is located on a small portion of property originally owned by Captain John Brice and designated as Lot 94 on the Stoddert Map of 1718. Listed as a gentleman, merchant, and planter, John Brice immigrated to Annapolis about 1698 from England. Following Brice's death in 1713, his will devised all land and improvements to his wife, Sarah Worthington Brice.⁷ When Sarah Brice died in 1729, the land was transferred to her eldest son, John Brice, Jr.

John Brice, Jr. (1705-1766) served as city alderman, vestryman for St. Anne's Church from 1758-1759, member of the Council of the Province of Maryland, and one of the Judges of Assize for the Western Shore.⁸ Having inherited the vacant property at the intersection of Prince George and East streets, John Brice, Jr. began planning the construction of the Georgian-style mansion known today as the Brice House at 42 East Street. The *Maryland Gazette* documents in 1761 advertisements placed by Brice for contractors to build a two-story dwelling with a stone cellar.⁹

When Brice, Jr. died in September 1766, Lot 94 "which came to me by descent from my father" and Lot 103 "plus bricks, lime, stone, timber for building a dwelling on those lots" was devised to his

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son, James Brice.¹⁰ James Brice (1746-1801) documented battles of the Revolutionary War in which he was engaged as an aide to George Washington.¹¹ Brice served as Mayor of Annapolis in 1782 and 1788, a member of the Maryland Council of Safety, and a lieutenant in the Anne Arundel County militia. He also served as Acting Governor of Maryland in 1791-1792.

Following John Brice Jr.'s death, James Brice proceeded with the construction of the 33-room mansion as planned by his father. James Brice kept detailed records of construction which took place between 1766 and 1774, detailing the cost of the shingles, planks, lathe, hair, stone, bricks, and nails. His accounts list the names and the wages of each bricklayer, mason, carpenter, joiner, and servant who worked for him during the construction period.¹² According to the Federal Direct Tax of 1798, James Brice was charged with a brick dwelling with two wings, a brick kitchen measuring 32 x 14 feet, a stable, and two small houses on two acres, assessed at \$1800.¹³

When James Brice died intestate in 1801, his nephew Nicholas Carroll Brice was appointed administrator. Prior to 1869, the Brice Family Heirs conveyed all of Lot 94, including the Brice House to William Martin.¹⁴ Martin died in 1869, leaving his Annapolis property to his son, Thomas E. Martin. Thomas Ennalls Martin (1811-1902)¹⁵ was the editor and publisher of the *Snow Hill Shield* and the *Maryland Gazette*. Martin served as Mayor of

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Annapolis from 1879 to 1783. Martin lived in the Brice House with his family until his death in 1902, at which time Lot 94 was divided among his two surviving children and granddaughter. At the time of his death, Lot 94 "consisted of a large brick house, consisting of two wings on East and Prince George streets and grounds attached, a new frame dwelling recently erected on Prince George Street for his son Charles, and four frame dwelling erected on Martin Street, with ground rents of \$192 per year."¹⁶ The gross value of the estate was assessed at \$165,000.

The heirs of Thomas Martin, who wished to divide the property equally, broke it up into a series of separate lots. Sarah Louise Martin Robb received the wings and colonnade of the Brice House on Lots 8 and 10, in addition to three lots on Martin Street. Claire Martin, the daughter of Charles Martin, received the frame dwelling on Prince George Street constructed for her father on Lot 7, and the four Martin Street dwellings. Robert E. Martin received the main block of the Brice House on Lot 9 and Lot 11 on East Street.

PROPERTY HISTORY

In 1903, the land on which the duplex at 32 and 34-36 stands remained unimproved. In 1905, Robert E. Martin conveyed Lots 9 and 11 to his sister, Sarah Louise Martin Robb. According to the deed of sale, the property included buildings. Although the deed does not clearly specify which buildings existed at the time of the sale, the *Map of Annapolis, 1905*, published by the Southern Map Company, indicates that at that time, the duplex at 32 and 34-36 East Street did in fact exist on Lot 94. It appears that the buildings were constructed between 1903 and 1905 by either Robert E. Martin prior to selling in 1905, or by S. Louise Robb immediately upon receipt of the land. The duplex was built atop a high foundation so as to incorporate part of a wall bordering the Brice property into the new buildings. Though sympathetic in overall form to the earlier mid and late-19th century dwellings found along East Street, this frame duplex is unique on the street for its high foundation--the result of incorporating an existing retaining wall into its structure. It is also distinguished by its prominent site overlooking East Street at its intersection with Martin Street.

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BUILDING HISTORY

S. Louise Robb immediately sold the Brice House in its entirety, while retaining all of Lot 11 until 1910, at which time the building at 32 East Street was sold independently. The lot upon which 32 East Street stands was sold to Margaret B. Bosley, who two years later defaulted on her mortgage. In 1912, Cornelius and Mary Gallagher purchased the lot and house. According to the 1920 U.S. Census, Cornelius Gallagher, a Naval Academy watchman, and his wife, both Irish immigrants, lived at the dwelling with their three adolescent sons. The property remained in Gallagher family hands until 1974. The house is currently owned by Alfonso E. Fallon and Jamie V. Fallon Vogel.


