

**CAPSULE SUMMARY
88 East Street
AA-1813**

The single-family residence at 88 East Street was built between 1908 and 1913 as one of a pair of dwellings. The property at 86 and 88 East Street was originally part of a larger tract of land associated with the residence of the Honorable Charles Calvert, Governor of Maryland from 1720 to 1727. During the early-to-mid 19th century, this large tract of land was subdivided and developed with both residential and commercial buildings. The two dwellings at 86 and 88 East Street, not built until the first decade of this century, were two of the later buildings erected on this side of the street, filling in two of the few remaining lots of the original tract. Though built later than the typical rowhouse on Fleet or East streets, the frame dwellings follow the same two-story, two-bay, side-entry pattern found throughout the neighborhood and illustrate the enduring quality of this modest house form.

Located on the north side of the street and constructed together, the two, two-story frame dwellings are vertically massed and are characterized by their two-bay facades and their gable roofs. 88 East Street is the westernmost of the pair. It is set upon a brick foundation, has walls clad with contemporary beaded weatherboard siding and vertical board siding, and is covered with a gable roof, sheathed with standing seam metal.

The two dwellings were built under the ownership of Alice V. Jewell, who lived at 88 while renting out 86 until her death in 1950. The building is presently owner-occupied.

The single-family residence at 88 East Street was built between 1908 and 1913 as one of a pair of modest-sized and attached dwellings.¹ Presented in a vernacular manner, the dwellings follow a pattern found throughout the Fleet and East street neighborhood. The two-story frame structures are built on narrow lots, have vertical massing, and are characterized by their two-bay facades with side entry doors. The gable roof of this pair recalls the earlier Federal form of the two-bay dwelling type as opposed to the flat or sloped roof that usually supplanted it in the later 19th century.

EXTERIOR

The attached and modest-sized dwellings at 86 and 88 East Street are located on the north side of the street just opposite where Fleet Street converges onto East Street. Constructed together and having a party wall, the two, two-story frame dwellings are vertically massed and are characterized by their two-bay facades and their gable roofs. Separated on the west from 90 East Street by a narrow passageway that is closed to the street by a wooden gate, the building at 88 East Street is the westernmost of the pair. Recently renovated, it is rectangular in plan with a 1-1/2-story rear ell. The building is set upon a brick pier foundation which was infilled with brick at a later date. The front walls of the house are clad with contemporary beaded weatherboard siding and edged with cornerboards, while the exposed side elevation is covered with vertical board siding. The roof, sheathed with standing seam metal, features a corbel capped interior brick chimney that is located slightly off center and a boxed wood cornice.

The facade (south elevation) of 88 East Street is divided into two bays with a side entry door and window on the first story and two bays of windows on the second story. The front entry, located in the eastern end bay, is reached by a contemporary, raised brick stair with contemporary iron railing. The entry, filled with a replacement six-panelled wood door, is ornamented with a two-light transom and plain wood surrounds. The 6/6 window is finished with paneled shutters, a slightly projecting cornice, and square-edged surrounds with back banding.

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The second story has two, 6/6 windows with identical, multi-beaded surrounds and paneled shutters. The shutters are all contemporary replacements.²

The west (side) elevation, facing the narrow passageway, includes the west wall of the main block of the house and the rear ell. The first story contains two windows and the second story has three windows. Although the number of lights is not visible, the windows are double-hung. The attic level of the building contains a contemporary triple lancet window with square-edged surrounds.

The north (rear) elevation has a one-story shed roof addition with an inset porch on the western end. Clad in weatherboard, the addition has one, eight-light casement window with a single wood shutter. The opening appears to have originally contained a double-hung window, and is now partially enclosed. The inset porch has a double entry filled with 15-light wood and glass doors. The second floor, covered with vertical board siding, has two single openings with 6/6 windows. All of the window has square-edged surrounds with a molded cap trim.

The interior of the building is two-rooms deep with a side entry. Recently renovated, the interior is finished with contemporary detailing. The front parlor has square-edged surrounds capped by a lug trim, square-edged baseboards, and an ogee-molded mantel shelf on the chimney. The rear parlor has the identical surrounds and baseboards in addition to a contemporary ogee-molded crown molding and beaded chair rail. The enclosed stair is located on the northwest wall in the rear parlor. The rear addition, containing the kitchen, has the identical lug trimmed surrounds as the original portion of the building. An exposed brick chimney breast, located on the northwest wall, has a jack-arched brick opening.

The second floor of the building has the same detailing as the first floor. The stair is finished with square balusters and a tapered wood landing newel. The attic has been partially finished, providing two connected rooms.

² The paneled shutters and beaded weatherboard wall are replacement parts that reflect a Federal period of construction, which preceded the erection of these dwellings by over 100 years. Though these parts are not out of character to the Federal architecture of the street, they do not accurately represent the original architecture of this specific house.

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The basement of the dwelling has a brick floor that is covered with poured concrete. The bricks of the foundation, and the vertical-sawn wood beams of the ceiling, are exposed. The window openings have original square-edged surrounds.

SITE HISTORY

The land on which the pair of dwellings at 86 and 88 East Street is located was originally occupied a portion of Lot 83 on the Stoddert Map of 1718. In 1727, the property was purchased by Charles Calvert, Governor of Maryland from 1720 to 1727, who also purchased a portion of the adjoining Lot 82. In 1728, Governor Calvert erected a one-story brick dwelling at 56-58 State Circle (AA-692; now the Governor Calvert Hotel) on the foundations of a ca. 1720 frame structure. The 1728 house, which subsequently underwent several major additions and building phases, as well as its surrounding property, remained in Calvert family hands until 1810. That year, Governor Charles Calvert's grandson, Edward Henry Calvert sold it to Robert Denney. Following Robert Denny's death in 1812, all of his property was sold by his heirs at public auction. Denny's father-in-law, Jonas Green, who was grandson to the celebrated Jonas Green, who revived the *Maryland Gazette* and was printer to the colony of Maryland, purchased the property for \$2,110.00 in 1818. At that time, the property included a house, stable, smokehouse and other outbuildings.

PROPERTY HISTORY

Between Green's purchase of it in 1818 and the mid-19th century, he sold off the property fronting East Street and State Circle in increments. In 1826, Green sold the parcel of land on which 86 and 88 East Street stand to Samuel Parrott. The following year, John

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Basil (1788-1869), a merchant and employee of the *Maryland Republican*, purchased the still undeveloped site of 86 and 88 East Street. Following John Basil's death, the property was acquired by his oldest son, Washington D. Basil (born 1816). In 1875, presumably after the death of Washington D. Basil, the property came into the possession of John Basil's third son, Nelson Basil (1828-1904), a merchant. Washington D. and Nelson Basil were the older brothers of Joseph S. M. Basil, lumber and hardware merchant who purchased a parcel of land at the foot of Fleet Street in 1880, and between 1885 and 1889, erected the two pairs of dwellings at 6 and 8 and 10 and 12 Fleet Street.

BUILDING HISTORY

Upon the death of Nelson Basil in 1904, the undeveloped property was inherited by his three daughters, Lily Brink, Rosa B. Brink, and Margaret Morgan. In 1908, the Basil family defaulted on the mortgage and the property was sold to Alice V. Jewell at public auction. No biographical information has been found on Alice V. Jewell; however, based upon the dates of ownership and the Sanborn Maps, it appears that Alice Jewell was responsible for the construction of the pair of dwellings on East Street sometime between her purchase of the undeveloped property in 1908 and the year 1913, when the pair appears on the 1913 Sanborn Map.³

According to the 1920 census records, Jewell initially leased both dwellings. By 1928-1929, Alice Jewell resided in 88 East Street, but continued to lease out 86 East Street.

The census records show that Henry Olsen, and his wife Elizabeth, leased the dwelling at 88 East Street. Olsen, born in Norway in 1880, worked as a sail maker. According to the city directory for 1928-1929, 86 East Street was leased to Mrs. Jamie Elliott, while Alice Jewell resided in 88 East Street. By 1949, 86 East Street was occupied by tailor J.R. Russillo and 88 East Street was vacant. Upon Alice V. Jewell's death in the 1950s, the property was willed to Julia J. Sarles. Julia Jeannette (Taylor) Sarles, the daughter

³ According to the 1904-1910 assessment records, Alice Jewell was assessed \$150.00 for a house and lot on East Street in 1909. This low assessment seems to indicate that the pair of dwellings was not yet built on the site.

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of Charles Nelson Taylor, was born in 1904.⁴ She married Myron Alcade Sarles, an electrical contractor born in 1901. Both buildings were used by the Sarles as rental property.

In 1970, the buildings were conveyed jointly to Barry B. German and Roderick C. McNeil, who in 1974 divided the lots. Ray and Angela Anderson purchased 86 East Street, while 88 East Street was purchased by Glenn H. and Jeanne C. Lahman. The building is currently owned and occupied by the Lahmans.

⁴ Charles Nelson Taylor was a direct descendant of George Taylor, who constructed the Federal-style dwelling at 89 East Street (AA-489).




