

**Capsule Summary for 61 Maryland Avenue  
AA-1829**

Built in the period between 1903 and 1908, the building at 61 Maryland Avenue is located on property that was originally part of the large tract of land associated with the James Smith family in the early eighteenth century. The history of the property illustrates the subdivision of the once large and prominent 18th century Annapolis estates into smaller parcels in the 19th century and the subsequent development of these subdivisions along the commercial route of Maryland Avenue. Additionally the property designated as 61 Maryland Avenue documents the development of a small parcel of land and the construction of the smallest vernacular building, with a strictly commercial use, on Maryland Avenue between Prince George Street and State Circle.

Constructed in the vernacular commercial mode, the building is wood frame with rough cut stone blocks on the facade. The flat roof has a two-and-a-half-foot parapet covered with metal sheets. The building is set upon a cut stone foundation, with a projecting round concrete foundation directly under the store window. The front elevation, measuring 15-feet in width, is two bays wide and features a slightly bowed multi-light window and a recessed entry. The overhanging cornice, projecting approximately three-feet, is ornamented by three hollow metal brackets. Between 1930 and 1954, a rectangular one-story addition was constructed on the rear of the building, housing the kitchen space for the restaurant. The building has an interior connection with 63 Maryland Avenue.

Located at the center of the block on the southern side of Maryland Avenue, the building at 61 Maryland Avenue was originally constructed on the site of a small one-story commercial building, dating from the late 1870s. Built in 1903-1908, the small commercial vernacular style building was historically constructed as office space and eventually converted into a restaurant. The building located at 61 Maryland Avenue, although currently connected on the interior to 63 Maryland Avenue, remains the only one-story commercial structure on Maryland Avenue between State Circle and Prince George Street.

Flanked by large commercial buildings, the one-story building provides space for the cocktail lounge and bar of the Little Campus Restaurant located at 63 Maryland Avenue. The front elevation faces Maryland Avenue, while the rear elevation faces a small rear courtyard that is accessible by a three-foot passageway to the west of 63 Maryland Avenue. The southeast elevation is connected to the three-story building located at 57-59 Maryland Avenue and is connected to 63 Maryland Avenue to the northwest, as well as on the interior. According to historic maps, deed research, and physical evidence, the building located at 61 Maryland Avenue retains its original configuration and currently stands in good condition, except for an addition to the rear and interior alterations that have occurred over the years.

Constructed in the vernacular commercial mode, the building at 61 Maryland Avenue is wood frame with rough cut stone blocks on the facade. The flat roof has a two-and-a-half-foot parapet covered with metal sheets. The building is set upon a cut stone foundation, with a projecting round concrete foundation directly under the store window. The front elevation, measuring 15-feet in width, is two bays wide and features a slightly bowed multi-light window and a recessed entry. The overhanging cornice, projecting approximately three-feet, is ornamented by three hollow metal brackets. Between 1930 and 1954, a rectangular one-story addition was constructed on the rear of the building, housing the kitchen space for the restaurant.

The facade consists of single recessed entry and a slightly bowed store window. The large entry opening contains a single door with nine-lights and an X-panel. To the left of the door is a narrow wood insert ornamented with a projecting panel over a recessed panel. Loose-pin butt hinges are located on either side of the large entry opening, indicating that the opening had double doors at one time. A large bowed window, set upon a projecting cut stone

sill, has 36-lights with wood muntins.

Above the entry door and window are two deeply recessed transom windows. The windows contain three-lights with X-muntins. Approximately one-foot above the transom windows is a projecting metal cornice. The cavetto cornice is supported by three hollow metal brackets with a scroll motif.

The rear of the building was not visible and not included in the survey. The interior of the building was connected to the Little Campus Restaurant located at 63 Maryland Avenue between the years 1921 and 1930. The interior was not accessible and therefore not included in the survey.

Designated as part of lot 82 and all of lot 81 on the Stoddert Map of 1718, the Smith property originally was bounded by Maryland Avenue, State Circle and Prince George Street. After the death of John Smith in 1737, the property was owned by his daughter, Sarah Smith. That same year Sarah Smith married John Ramsay. In 1772, the daughter of Sarah and John Ramsay married Vachel Stevens. Vachel Stevens leased the property to the Knowles family. Documentation states that in 1782, Edward Knowles received a liquor license and operated a saloon on the property.<sup>1</sup> By 1787, John Welsh opened a tavern in a house that was formerly occupied by the Knowles family. In 1788, the tax assessment records document that John Welsh was living on the lots at L40 rent in an "L-shaped dwelling with a 30x18 wing and a 24x18 wing; 16x26 kitchen, both out of repair. A 10x20 old smokehouse and an almost new stable, 20x20."<sup>2</sup>

When Vachel Stevens died in 1787, his sons John Mercer Stevens and John Ramsay Stevens acquired the land. In 1790, John Mercer Stevens was assessed with one frame dwelling and an outhouse. Upon his death in 1803, his daughter, Sarah Stevens received a dwelling, kitchen and an outhouse. In 1821, Sarah Stevens, now Anderson, conveyed the property to Baruch Fowler who reconveyed it back to Stevens immediately.<sup>3</sup> Two years later, Sarah Anderson and her

husband, Theodore, conveyed the property to Jacob Williams. Lot 81 and part of lot 82 contained several houses at the time of the sale in 1823.<sup>4</sup>

In 1848, the heirs of Jacob Williams conveyed the property to Daniel M. Sprogle.<sup>5</sup> Sprogle was born in Maryland on September 30, 1822 and died in 1889. In 1848, Daniel Sprogle was employed to lay the brickwork for the First Presbyterian Church on Duke of Gloucester Street. He was a Trustee for the Church between 1862 and 1868. He was listed in the 1850 Census Records as a white male, 27 years old with a land worth of \$1,500. He operated a lumber mill and was listed on the 1880 Census Records as a builder. Daniel married Rebecca Catherine Welch. The couple had four children, Hester Katherine Culver, J.H. Sprogle, Daniel Stansbury Sprogle, and Rizpah Welch Ladd.<sup>6</sup> Sprogle owned a majority of the property on the southern side of Maryland Avenue and was responsible for the subdivision and sale of 41-43 Maryland Avenue westward to 77 Maryland Avenue.

Within months of purchasing the property, Daniel Sprogle sold it to Thomas Ireland.<sup>7</sup> The 1880 Census Records indicate that Owen M. Taylor, born in 1820 in Maryland, lived with his wife Mary Ireland Taylor and their six children in the dwelling located at 55-57 Maryland Avenue. Mary Ireland Taylor was the granddaughter of Thomas Ireland and obtained the property, with a small one-story office building, upon the death of her grandfather, and father, Irving Ireland.

Mary Ireland Taylor sold the property just prior to her death in 1900. It was purchased by the Trustees of the Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church. Unable to maintain the property, the

Chapel sold it to William Childs.<sup>8</sup> By 1902, Childs sold the now vacant building and the adjacent property to Frederick W. Kipper.<sup>9</sup> It was during the ownership of Kipper that the present building was constructed on the site located at 61 Maryland Avenue.<sup>10</sup>

In 1919, the building was sold to Philip and Selda V. Miller for \$15,000.00.<sup>11</sup> The Sanborn Maps of 1921 indicate the office building was leased as a jewelry store. According to the City Directories of 1928-1929, the building was used as the Biscayne Restaurant, while the 1949 City Directories stated the building was used by the State Department of Employment Security as office space. Miller sold the buildings located at 61-63 Maryland Avenue to Theodore and Anna Nichols, and John J. and Eletherea Lewnes in 1948.<sup>12</sup> Following the death of John J. and Eletherea Lewnes, in 1987, the Nichols obtained full ownership of the property.<sup>13</sup>

The building located at 63 Maryland Avenue has operated as the Little Campus Restaurant since 1923.<sup>14</sup> The small building at 61 Maryland Avenue was incorporated into the restaurant between 1921 and 1930, and currently contains the cocktail lounge/bar and the kitchen addition for the Little Campus Restaurant.






