

CAPSULE SUMMARY
202-206 West Street, Annapolis (AA-2008)

The buildings at 202-206 West Street were constructed for speculative developer John H. White as rental housing in 1899. The wood frame structure, clad in brick, consisted of a row of five dwellings anchored by a grocery at the corner of West Street and Madison Place. Sold by White's heirs in 1922, the three dwellings remained united under a single owner despite numerous conveyances, and varying uses. Owner and occupant Rebecca Levy ran Levy's Grocery in the first floor of 206 West Street during most of the 20th century. Under the direction of the Levy heirs, the facades of the three separate buildings, which had maintained separate commercial storefronts, were united by a modern storefront. The use of the former dwellings was generally independent, until the 1983 renovations.

The building consists of three attached dwellings within a larger row of six modest-sized two-story rowhouses. The row is set upon a low brick foundation, and is covered with a continuous gable roof, clad with standing seam metal. The two bay-wide buildings are constructed of wood frame clad with pressed brick facades laid in stretcher bond with random rows of headers. Each of the three dwellings is characterized by segmental arched window openings with 2/2 windows. A continuous box, wood cornice extends across the row of six buildings. Several of the individual buildings have projecting storefront additions, while others retain their original flat-fronted facades with side entry doors. Some of the buildings retain their brick chimneys, located on center of the roof. The building at 202-206 West Street consists of three attached dwellings within a larger row of six modest-sized two-story rowhouses. Typical of late 19th and early 20th century speculative building forms, the building was constructed in 1899 on the north side of West Street, facing south. The row is set upon a low brick foundation, and is covered with a continuous gable roof, clad with standing seam metal. The two bay-wide buildings are constructed of wood frame clad with pressed brick facades laid in stretcher bond with random rows of headers. Each of the three dwellings is characterized by segmental arched window openings with 2/2 windows. A continuous box, wood cornice extends across the row of six buildings. Several of the individual buildings have projecting storefront additions, while others retain their original flat-fronted facades with side entry doors. Some of the buildings retain their brick chimneys, located on center of the roof. The group of buildings at 202-206 West Street was altered in 1983 by the construction of a new storefront addition spanning the facade. A two-story brick ell projects from the rear of the building.

Exterior Description:

Encompassing the three end dwellings at 202-206 West Street, the building is nine bays long (three bays in each building). It is defined by a continuous, contemporary storefront addition spanning the first story and the original segmental-arched windows on the second story. The storefront addition (1983) is set upon a brick foundation and features large panes of vertical glazing separated by wide wood stiles. A wide, wood paneled frieze surmounts the show windows. The original entry doors are no longer intact, having been replaced by two single entries – one on center of the storefront extending across the two end buildings, and the other in the side entry of the storefront across the third building.

All of the nine, second-story openings are segmentally arched, defined by double rows of soldier course brick lintels, and feature 2/2 sash and wood sills.

The west side elevation is clad in brick laid in six-course American bond. It is three bays deep in the main, gable-roofed block, and three bays deep in the rear ell. The main block originally had two windows located in the end bays of the first story (now bricked up, but segmental-arched, soldier course lintels still intact). On the second story there are three single windows with 2/2 sash and segmental-arched, soldier-course lintels. An attic-level window in the gable end has been bricked up.

The rear ell of the building at 206 West Street extends three bays deep. It consists of two single doors and a window on the first story and three single windows on the second story. The two first-story entries have replacement doors set within an original segmental-arched brick lintel, as is the first-story, 2/2 window. On the second story, the window openings are square-headed with jack-arched lintels.

The north elevation of the three buildings at 202-206 West Street includes the rear wall of a four-bay ell extending across the rear elevations of 202 and 204 West Street, and the end wall of a two-bay brick ell,

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spanning the end building of the row (206 West). The north elevation of 206 West Street is clad in brick laid in six-course American bond, as is the west side wall. This elevation is two bays wide with two bricked-in windows on the first story and two 2/2 windows on the second story. The two first-story openings have no brick lintels above the opening. In contrast, the second-story windows feature a brick, jack arch over the rectangular opening. The east side wall of this building no windows, and is clad with wood shingles.

The north elevation of 204-206 West Street is a four-bay-wide, wood shingles ell wall with a one-story concrete block addition attached to it. The rear ell features four, second-story windows, with period replacement 2/2 windows intact.

The interior of the building, which was significantly altered in 1983, was not accessible at the time of survey.

The buildings at 202-206 West Street were constructed for speculative developer John H. White as rental housing in 1899. The wood frame structure, clad in brick, consisted of a row of five dwellings anchored by a grocery at the corner of West Street and Madison Place. Sold by White's heirs in 1922, the three dwellings remained united under a single owner despite numerous conveyances, and varying uses. Owner and occupant Rebecca Levy ran Levy's Grocery in the first floor of 206 West Street during most of the 20th century. Under the direction of the Levy heirs, the facades of the three separate buildings, which had maintained separate commercial storefronts, were united by a modern storefront. The use of the former dwellings was generally independent, until the 1983 renovations.

Site History

In the middle part of the 19th century, Nicholas Brewer, Jr. owned the property where the row of six attached buildings denoted as 196 through 206 West Street now stand. Born in 1795, Brewer was a graduate of St. John's College (class of 1811). During his career as an attorney, Brewer served as Judge of the Second Judicial Circuit from 1851 to 1864. Brewer, who died in 1864, had devised his holdings amongst his eight surviving children. The property along West Street remained largely unimproved during its ownership by the Brewer heirs.

West Street, a primary transportation corridor into the state capital since the 18th century, had developed as a mixed residential and commercial route. As development moved west to the outskirts of the colonial city by the latter part of the 19th century, the residential nature of the street was dominant with an abundance of freestanding and attached single-family dwellings typically occupied by European immigrants and African Americans. The dwellings on the south side of West Street obscured the commercial enterprises located on the rear of the lots. This included a significant number of livery stables and wagon sheds, particularly between Lafayette Avenue and Southgate Avenue. On the north side of the street, the dwellings fronted unimproved land, as improvements on this portion of West Street west of Lafayette Street were generally sited along the road. In the last decades of the 19th century, new neighborhoods were beginning to develop around this part of West Street – Murray Hill was located to the south of West Street, to the east of Southgate Avenue, and

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Presidents Hill was established to the northwest of West Street, between Madison Place and Jefferson Place. By 1930, the area directly north of the buildings at 196-206 West Street was improved by the construction of freestanding single-family dwellings when Munroe Court was created.

Building History

In June 1891, the Brewer family sold the single unimproved lot on West Street, east of Madison Place, to John H. White for \$800. The sale also included property to the east, which was already improved by the construction of two attached single-family dwellings and a corner grocery with housing above. White, born in August 1838, was a bricklayer and speculative developer. The purchase of the unimproved property along one of Annapolis' primary transportation routes on the outskirts of the growing capital was clearly intentional on the part of White in 1891. He proceeded to subdivide the corner site into six deep rectangular lots. As indicated by the census records and *Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps*, the lots were improved in 1899 with the construction of row of attached dwellings. These dwellings were integrated into the three existing buildings erected during the ownership of the Brewer family, creating a row of nine attached dwellings. Like the anchoring building on the east side of the now enlarged structure, the corner building at 206 West Street included a grocery on the first story and a dwelling on the second story. The two-story buildings were constructed of wood frame with a two-story rear ell. The facades were clad with a brick facing that wrapped around the side elevation of the corner building at 206 West Street. A row of attached wood frame garages, standing one story in height, stood at the rear of the property. The entire row of garages was razed by 1954.

White used the new buildings as rental property, leasing them initially to European immigrants and African Americans. The tax assessments show that White, who was charged \$3,600 in 1899 for the six new buildings at 196-206 West Street, was also responsible for building a number of wood frame and brick single-family dwellings along West Street and Madison Place in the 1890s. Upon his death in June 1912, the property was devised among his children. The heirs divided and subdivided the holdings until daughter Mary Ellen White had gained title to the buildings. A teacher, Mary Ellen White had married printer Lemuel C. Baldwin in 1888. Retaining the buildings at 196-200 West Street, Baldwin transferred the buildings at 202-206 West Street to Bessie M and Sylvio J. Vaillancourt. Bessie Vaillancourt, born about 1878, was the younger sister of Mary Baldwin.

Between 1903 and 1908, a one-story wood frame porch was added to the façade of 206 West Street. This structure was removed by 1913. By 1921, as noted on the *Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps*, the wood frame of the buildings was gradually reclad with brick facing. This refacing began at 206 West Street, and moved eastward to 196 West Street by 1930.

Vaillancourt retained title to her father's property until 1922, when she conveyed it to Louis and Rebecca Levy. The Levys sold the property within a matter of days to Regina C. and Isidore Cohen. It was sold one year later

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to Solomon and Stesia Rueben. Despite the sales, Rebecca Levy operated a grocery in the commercial portion of 206 West Street. The city directory for 1929 indicates Levy and her family lived in the residential portion of this building. T.H. Basil and George Clark occupied the adjacent dwellings at 202 and 204 West Street, respectively, in 1929. Levy, born in Lithuania about 1895, purchased the building again in 1930.

By 1954, Levy's Groceries had been moved to 202 West Street and Charles P. Boyer, and Hobson S. Lewis occupied the building known as 204 West Street. The relocation of Levy's Groceries prompted the application of a commercial style storefront on the building at 202 West Street. Capitol Drugs had moved into the commercial space at 206 West Street by this time. In 1961, the Levy Grocery was still located at 202 West Street, with Mrs. Pauline Lilly residing above. Ralph Alexander lived at 204 West Street, and the Capitol Drugs remained at 202 West Street. By 1965, the drug store had expanded to encompass 202-204 West Street, leaving property owner Rebecca Levy with 202 West Street.

Following Rebecca Levy's death in January 1968, the grocery continued to operate under the guidance of her children. In 1971, the city directory listed the entire building collectively as 206 West Street, occupied by Levy's Grocery and Capitol Drugs. By 1981, however, the grocery had closed. The building at 202 West Street was then leased to Capitol Liquors, which was owned and maintained by Capitol Drugs at 206 West Street. It was during this period when a new storefront was constructed, uniting the buildings on the exterior as well as the interior.

In April 1987, the Levy family sold the property to 206 West General Partnership, Inc., which immediately leased the building. Three years after the sale, the partnership sold the building to Annapolis Area Ministries, Inc., the present occupants.


