The Thomas Sands House 61 East Street was erected in the mid-19th century (by 1877) on land, which during the 18th century, was part of a large parcel owned by Charles Carroll of Carrollton. The property was purchased in 1837 by Thomas Sands, a carpenter, who built the house on the site and lived there until about 1880. Despite its loss of original materials, the dwelling stands as a good example of the late Federal vernacular dwelling form found on East Street in the Annapolis Historic District.

The dwelling at 61 East Street consists of two parts, including the two-story, two-bay main block of the house and its two-story, two-bay wing attached to the east end. The main block of the house is covered with a gable roof and features a brick end chimney; the side wing has a sloped roof and no chimney. The entire house, of frame construction, is clad with red asphalt shingles. Wood weatherboard walls are visible under these shingles.

According to the 1880 U. S. census records Thomas Sands, together with his wife Sarah and daughter Mary J., resided in the dwelling at 61 East Street. Between 1880 and 1886, the property fell out of the Sands family. During the late 19th and 20th centuries, the property passed through numerous hands and generally served as rental property, catering to the working-class African-American community.

The two-story frame dwelling at 61 East Street¹ was erected in the mid-19th century (by 1877) and added to in the last decade of the 19th century.² Despite its loss of original materials, the building's two-bay, side-entry configuration, steeply pitched gable roof and brick end chimney give the dwelling a form that is representative of the late Federal vernacular buildings on East Street.

EXTERIOR:

The dwelling at 61 East Street consists of two parts, including the two-story, two-bay main block of the house and its two-story, two-bay wing attached to the east end. The main block of the house is covered with a gable roof and features a brick end chimney; the side wing has a sloped roof and no chimney. The entire house, of frame construction, is clad with red asphalt shingles. Wood weatherboard walls are visible under these shingles.

The facade (north) elevation facing East Street consists of the two-bay elevation of the main block of the house and the two-bay wing. The main block has a side entry door and window on the first story and two windows on the second story. The entry is defined by a parged brick or concrete stoop and is fitted with a 4-panel, six-light wood door. The wing has two windows on both the first and second stories. All of the windows are fitted with 1/1 replacement sash and feature identical wood trim with an interior bead. The gable roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles, is located above the second story of the main block of the house and features a parged brick chimney originally on the east end wall of the house and now located between the main block of the house and its wing. The wing has a sloped roof, clearly setting it off as an addition to the main block.

The east (side) elevation includes the east side wall of the attached wing. This wall, clad with asphalt shingles, has a

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single, 1/1 window on the second story.

The south (rear) elevation of the main block of the dwelling has two 6/1 windows on the first story with square-edged casing and a single entry door.

The interior of the dwelling was not accessible for survey.

SITE HISTORY

The portion of property where 61 East Street stands was once part of a large parcel owned in the 1780s by Charles Carroll of Carrollton. In 1772, Carroll leased this portion of his property for forty years to Charles Bryan, a shoemaker and innkeeper. When Bryan died in 1775, the executors of his estate sold the lease, valued at 80 pounds, to jeweller William Whetcroft.³ Whetcroft immediately subleased the property to John Reas for seven years at an annual fee of 40 pounds. Two years after Reas' death, Whetcroft leased the "lot and dwelling houses" to Joseph Stevens, a storekeeper in partnership with Nielson⁴ on Duke of Gloucester Street. Stevens apparently rented the house to a William Johnson before 1782, for on March 28, 1782, Stevens took out an ad in *The Maryland Gazette* warning vandals against damaging his house "where Johnson lives" or the adjacent gardens Stevens tended.⁵

Stevens sold the lease "including tenements" to Allen Quynn in 1784.⁶ The following years, Quynn officially leased the property for 99 years directly from Charles Carroll.⁷ Carroll sued Quynn in 1787 for failure to pay ground rents for two years prior.⁸ By 1798, Quynn sold the lease to Thomas O'Conner with the agreement that O'Conner would pay the 20 pounds annual rent, rendering Quynn

"harmless from prosecution for the rent." The agreement was dissolved by 1801, forcing the estate of Quynn to pay 160 pounds in back rent and surrender the lease to Carroll.⁹

PROPERTY HISTORY

At the time that Carroll was subdividing and leasing his large tract of land, East Street existed only in part. A segment of the street ran from State Circle to its approximate intersection with Fleet Street. The street resumed after Prince George Street and ran to King George Street. By 1820, the City of Annapolis decreed an "Act to Open and Extend East Street...and to close up that part of said street leading to Prince George Street." The property owners for that segment, Charles Carroll and Delilah Holland, were awarded damages for the confiscation of their unimproved property to extend East Street through to Prince George Street.¹⁰

According to the 1831 Real Property Assessments, Charles Carroll of Carrollton had four unimproved lots assessed at \$800 and three improved lots assessed at \$5,500 in the City of Annapolis. About that same time, Carroll sold a portion of his land corresponding with the properties designated 59-63 East Street today, to Washington Sands. By 1837, Washington Sands conveyed the property to his brother Thomas Sands.

BUILDING HISTORY

Thomas Sands (1808-1883), a carpenter who owned the property at least until 1880, built the dwelling on the site sometime before 1877, when it appears on Gray's *New Map of Annapolis*, 1877. Based upon the architecture of the building and Sands age, it is likely that the house was built closer to ca. 1860 when Sands would have been in his 40s or early 50s, rather than as late as 1877. The two-story, two-bay dwelling, with its side-entry, gable roof and end chimney follows a vernacular Federal residential building form common to the period and found in the East and Fleet street

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neighborhood. According to the 1880 U. S. census records Sands, together with his wife Sarah and daughter Mary J., resided in the dwelling at 61 East Street.

Between 1880 and 1886, the property fell out of the Sands' family hands. John H. and Maggie Johnson, who owned the property by 1886, sold it in 1888 to Edward and Ann Powers. Within months, the Powers sold the property to Hugh McCasker. McCasker leased the building to Edward Norwood, a laborer born in 1867. During his ownership of the building, Hugh McCasker enlarged a one-story wing attached to the east end of the dwelling to two stories and added a one-story addition to the rear of it.¹¹ When McCasker died intestate in April 1907, his daughter, Mary A. McCasker received ownership of the property (59-63 East Street). In 1909, Mary McCasker sold it to Ellen McCasker Smith, who sold it one year later to John J. McCasker and Elizabeth Quinn.

On June 18, 1910, the property was referred to the Circuit Court. Proper division of Hugh McCasker's estate could not be achieved and by August the buildings were sold to Pasquale Tarantino at a public auction for \$1,925. Tarantino retained ownership until 1912, when he sold the buildings to Henry and Bernice Ciccarone. Born in Chieti, Italy in 1884, Enrico Henry Ciccarone was a tailor for the United States Naval Academy. The 1920 census records indicate that Henry Ciccarone immigrated to the United States in 1903 and was not an American citizen.

The Ciccarone's retained 63 East Street as their residence, but sold, in 1919, the dwelling and its addition at 59-61 East Street to Fidele and Aimee Leclercq. Fidele Leclercq immigrated to the United States from Belgium in 1889. Becoming an American citizen in 1895, Leclercq was a musician at the United States Naval Academy.

In 1930, the widowed Fidele Leclercq sold the dwelling to Joseph and Amelia Tomanio. Born in Italy, Joseph Tomanio worked as a tailor for the United States Naval Academy. Relocating to California, the Tomanios sold 61 East Street to Madge Tanner in 1944. Madge Tanner, who married Andrew Gautreaux, sold the building in 1945 to Edward J. and Sophie Kramer.

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The city directories show that Edward Kramer leased the building to Robert L. and Margaret Griffith, who purchased the property in 1953. Robert Louis Griffith (1899-1969) was a highway foreman. Several months after the death of Robert Griffith in 1969, Margaret Griffith sold the dwelling to William E. and Maureen T. Lamb. Maureen T. Lamb, a former member of the Anne Arundel County Council, currently owns and leases 95 East Street and 36 Fleet Street. Although Margaret Griffith had sold the building to the Lambs, she continued to occupy the dwelling.

In 1970, the property was purchased by Rudolph S. and Ann M. Stewart. Within one year, the building was owned by Herbert L. Zorn, Jr, who immediately conveyed it to William P. and Hilda S. Stephens. The building is currently owned by Hilda S. Stephens and her son John D. Stephens, who received partial ownership from William P. Stephens in 1990.






