Greenway Avenue Survey District #2 consists of a row of five dwellings, 12, 14, 16, 18, and 22 Greenway, NW, located on the northeast side of Greenway Avenue. At the southeast end of the row, 12 Greenway Avenue is a pedimented bungalow with rear additions and unique fenestration, consisting of paired six-over-one windows flanked by narrow one-light windows. Although 14 and 18 Greenway are front-gabled bungalows, the hip-roofed porch on the front of 14 Greenway has been enclosed, and that on the front of 18 Greenway has been removed and replaced with a hip-roofed vestibule and a projecting gabled bay. At the northwest end of the row, 22 Greenway is a side-gabled bungalow cottage that appears to retain its original wood-shingle cladding. The only building of the five that is not frame is 16 Greenway, which is constructed of concrete block. It has gabled dormers and a projecting gabled vestibule. All of the dwellings have small front yards, enclosed in wood-picket or chain-link fences. They also all have large back yards that extend back to a rear alley. All of the dwellings except for 22 Greenway Avenue have detached garages facing onto the alley.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

With the exception of 16 Greenway Avenue, which appears to have been built in the 1930s or 1940s, the four other dwellings are all shown on a 1931 Sanborn Map of Glen Burnie. A 1922 Sanborn Map shows vacant lots where these four stand, indicating that they were probably built during the 1920s. These middle-class dwellings were built near the center of town, facing the Annapolis and Baltimore Short Line Railroad tracks. Although they represent typical types of housing built during the first half of the twentieth century, they do not possess the historical or architectural significance for the National Register, and are recommended not eligible.
