Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Daniel's House II was probably constructed early-to-mid 19th cen. (The 1846 Coast and Geodetic Survey Topographic Map shows a large occupied structure just east of the main residence at Ivy Neck. This may be the carriage house complex including Daniel's House II.)

Daniel II has much in common with Ivy Neck Tenant House #1 whose estimated construction date is c.1840-1870. Both are 1½-story frame side-gabled houses. Both have a large downstairs room approximately 16½ ft. deep with board-and-batten entrance doors in two opposite walls, an enclosed winding staircase in one corner, low ceiling heights (6'6½" and 6'8"), plaster-covered walls and ceilings over machine-cut lathes, and 4 over 4 windows. Both are constructed with hewn framing timbers.

But Daniel's House II is probably the earlier of the two. It does not extend into a second room on the first floor as does Ivy Neck #1. It has very wide weatherboard siding on three walls and German siding on the lower half of the fourth (north) wall. (Ivy Neck #1 has German siding all around.) It has 1-foot-deep roof overhangs above the gable end walls. And it has the unique feature of a mantelpiece, located on the north wall in the first floor room. The mantle has a plain wooden shelf (6'6" wide) atop a plain wooden surround (4'6" high x 5'10" wide). But there is no firebox or stovepipe-opening within the frame, only plaster wall. The narrow brick stove chimney standing to the right of it is probably not original. There probably was an open fireplace when the house was first built, and perhaps the chimney and firebox were later removed when the north wall of the house was connected to the south wall of the carriage house by an intermediate shed. This would explain why there is German siding on the lower half of the north wall of Daniel II, and also why the second floor window in the north wall is shifted eastward, off-center (to make room for a chimney), while the second floor window in the south wall is centered.

Daniel's House I (AA-233) at Ivy Neck Farm is believed to have housed a German cabinetmaker c.1860. We might speculate that the construction of Ivy Neck Tenant House #1 and the re-siding of the lower north wall of Daniel's House II, both using German siding, coincided with this artisan's presence at Ivy Neck in the mid-19th century. He is supposed to have constructed the east section of Daniel I during his tenancy there.

Daniel's House II was the home of Daniel Boston from 1944 to the 1950's. "It was the front end of the old carriage house", according to Sam Neal, tenant farmer at Ivy Neck from 1918 until 1937. "Used to call it the carriage house, that's what the' used to call it."(1)

"Daniel Boston was the cook"(at Ivy Neck), according to Sam's wife Jessie. "He lived quite awhile in that house we call Mr. Forbes' house (Daniel's House I, AA-233). He was a nice old man. He was a very nice man. We liked to tease him. I was 18 when (1932) ... After the big house burned (1944) Mr. Forbes Colhoun fixed up [Daniel's Hse.I] and moved in ... Daniel Boston moved to [Daniel's Hse.II] ... He was still living there after 1947 when we moved to Parkhurst."(1)

Daniel Boston continued to live in this house until his death sometime after 1950.





