

CAPSULE SUMMARY
90-92 Charles Street (AA-382)
Annapolis, Maryland

The building at 90-92 Charles Street was constructed between 1900 and 1903 as speculative development by Christian Dammeyer. Utilized as rental property, the dwellings were conveyed individually for the first time in 1949, albeit to Dammeyer family members. Three years later, in 1952, the property at 92 Charles Street was conveyed out of the Dammeyer family after sixty-six years of ownership. The turn of the 20th century construction of the twin dwellings, together with the adjacent twin buildings at 82-84 and 86-88 Charles Street, constituted the second phase of improvement on the southeastern end of Charles Street for Dammeyer. For a number of years in the first part of the 20th century, the seven dwellings at 82-92 Charles and 95 Charles Street were owned and occupied by members of the Dammeyer family.

The rectangular form of the wood frame structure is set upon a brick foundation, laid in all stretcher bond. The main block of the two-and-a-half-story building is clad at 90 Charles Street with square-butt wood shingles, and at 92 Charles Street with asbestos shingles. The side gable roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles has a late 20th century chimney at the center of 90 Charles Street. The four bay wide facade is divided at the basement level by an walkway to the rear of the property. The location of the opening at the center of the elevation, in addition to subsequent alterations performed in the latter part of the 20th century, divides the facade visually into two-bay wide dwellings. As originally erected, the structure was served by two-story ells on the outer bays of the rear elevation. The ells have been enlarged to the full width of the wall and, at 90 Charles Street, raised a full story to peek over the ridge of the gable roof on the main block.

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The pair of dwellings at 90-92 Charles Street was constructed as speculative housing sometime in the period between 1900 and 1903. The rectangular form of the wood frame structure is set upon a brick foundation, laid in all stretcher bond. The main block of the two-and-a-half-story building is clad at 90 Charles Street with square-butt wood shingles, and at 92 Charles Street with asbestos shingles. The side gable roof, sheathed with asphalt shingles has a late 20th century chimney at the center of 90 Charles Street. The four bay wide facade is divided at the basement level by an walkway to the rear of the property. The location of the opening at the center of the elevation, in addition to subsequent alterations preformed in the latter part of the 20th century, divides the facade visually into two-bay wide dwellings. As originally erected, the structure was served by two-story ells on the outer bays of the rear elevation. The ells have been enlarged to the full width of the wall and, at 90 Charles Street, raised a full story to peek over the ridge of the gable roof on the main block.

Exterior

The facade of the building, facing northwest on Charles Street, is symmetrically pierced with single and paired openings. Visible beyond the late 20th century alterations, the elevation is set upon a slightly raised brick foundation that has been painted at 92 Charles Street. The main entries, located in the center bays, are surrounded with narrow mitred casings with a backband and have two-light transoms. The opening at 90 Charles Street has a replacement wood panel door, while 92 Charles Street has a fifteen-light wood and glass door. The openings are partially separated by the open walkway, lined with bricks, to the rear of the property. The walls of the walkway, having no openings, are clad to the corresponding facades. The outer bays of the facade hold pairs of elongated 2/2 windows with wood sills and narrow casings. The second story of the facade has four 2/2 windows, two serving each dwelling. The wide openings have wood sills, backbanded surrounds, and projecting ogee-molded lintel caps. Those at 92 Charles Street have louvered shutters. The lintels on the second story abut the scrolled brackets of the boxed cornice. Widely spaced, the brackets and bed molding visually support the overhang. The porches on the facade of the building are an original element that has been substantially altered. Set upon raised brick foundations, the porches are accessed by side entry steps that have been added to the front of the porch structures. Wrought-iron rails border the stair and half-landing. Cut at the foundation because of the walkway between the dwellings, the porches share a

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shed roof sheathed with asphalt shingles and trimmed with an overhanging cornice. At 90 Charles Street, the Victorian-era porch detailing has been replaced by a solid balustrade clad with square-butt wood shingles. The turned supports are now square posts interspersed with jalousie windows. The entry at the western side of the porch has a wood door with louvered glass. The porch at 92 Charles Street presents square balusters, thin turned posts on square posts, a wide frieze, and spindled brackets.

From the front of the building, the replacement stack of the interior brick chimney of 90 Charles Street is visible in the roof. Beyond that, to the southeast of the roof ridge, is the third story of the late 20th century addition to the ell of 90 Charles Street. The northwest wall of the addition is pierced by two widely spaced square openings holding metal louvers. The addition is clad with square-butt wood shingles.

The southwest elevation of 90 Charles Street fronts a four-foot wide yard to the rear of the property. Clad with square-butt wood shingles, the elevation has a single opening with louvered vents in the gable. The northeast elevation of 92 Charles Street fronts a one-foot opening between the main block of the building and the one-story garage of 25 Cathedral Street. The wall is finished with asbestos shingles and has no openings in the main block. The second story of the ell has a single 6/6 window set within the plane of the wall.

The rear of the property and the interiors of the dwellings were not accessible for survey.

The turn of the 20th century construction of the twin dwellings, together with the adjacent twin buildings at 82-84 and 86-88 Charles Street (AA-381 and AA-1727/1728), constituted a second phase of improvements on the southeastern end of Charles Street, west of Cathedral Street. For a number of years in the first part of the 20th century, the seven houses at 82-92 Charles and 95 Charles Street (AA-384) were owned and occupied by members of the Dammeyer family.

Site History: Lot 39

The property on which the building at 90-92 Charles Street stands was historically a portion of the much larger Lot 40 in Parcel 32. Documented in James Stoddert's survey notebook, Lots 39 and 40 were resurveyed in 1718 for William Bladen. Bladen retained ownership until his death, upon which his heirs were forced to convey the property in 1724 to Daniel Dulany. The sale included sixteen lots located throughout Annapolis. By 1781, the heirs of Dulany were also forced to convey the property, which included both Lots 39 and 40 on the southwestern end of Charles Street. The Commissioners of Confiscated Property sold Lot 39 to David Lynn. Lynn retained ownership of the undeveloped tract until 1794, transferring the title to John Davidson. Davidson was a merchant by trade, born in Inverness, Scotland about 1738. Davidson was a partner in the prominent merchant company of Wallace, Davidson, and Johnson. Previously, in 1770, he had purchased Lot 43 free of title for 80 pounds sterling.

Upon Davidson's death in 1794, and his wife Eleanor's in 1815, ownership of the property was presented to the Chancery Court, with the heirs requesting permission to sell the land in Lots 39 and 40 of Parcel 32 and Lot 43 of Parcel 31. Consequently, the property was advertised for sale in 1816, "two valuable lots No. 39 and 43 containing one acre each and adjoining the property of the heirs of the late Mr. Frederick Green [124 Charles Street]."¹ In 1810, Frederick Green conveyed Lots 40, 41, 42, and 54 with buildings, houses, edifices, buildings, and gardens to Richard H. Harwood for

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\$1,000. Title of the property on Charles Street was conveyed to William S. Green in 1815 by his father-in-law, Richard Harwood. Dr. William Green, a court clerk as well, married his second wife, Matilda Bowie, in 1832. The couple, raising six children, obtained a mortgage in 1839 from the Farmers Bank of Maryland. By February 1845, with the mortgage in default, the property was presented for sale at public auction. It was purchased by George Wells, Jr. on July 23, 1845.

Born in 1800, George Wells, Jr. was a prominent citizen of Annapolis, serving as president of the Farmers National Bank and in the Maryland Senate, as well as manager of the Annapolis & Elk Ridge Railroad. Wells had begun purchasing property, both improved and undeveloped, throughout Annapolis in the 1820s. By the 1840s, Wells had accumulated all of the parcels fronting Charles Street, which included the Adams-Kilty House at 133 Charles Street and the Jonas Green House at 124 Charles Street.

By the third quarter of the 19th century, Wells had overextended himself financially. Consequently, he mortgaged his landholdings to the Farmers Bank of Maryland in 1877. Wells immediately defaulted on the loans and was forced to sell his property on Charles Street, Duke of Gloucester Street, Market Street, South Street, Cathedral Street, Carroll Street, North West Street, and Bladens Street. Alexander Randall was appointed trustee of the estate, and charged with overseeing the subdivision and sale of the land. The property along Charles Street, which included Parcels 28, 30, 31, and 32, was subdivided to create 25 individual lots to be sold at public auction. The sale, completed by 1881, yielded \$16,563 for Wells to pay his creditors.

Building History

The portion of the plot where the building at 90-92 Charles Street was later erected was one of the last portions of George Wells' Charles Street property to be sold. With the death of Alexander Randall, James Revele was appointed to oversee the transaction in October 1886. John L. White, who purchased adjacent lots along Charles Street, bought Lot 0, which consisted of 60 feet fronting Charles Street. Two days after the purchase, White subdivided the lot and conveyed a portion of the unimproved property for \$500 to Christian Dammeyer. The deed also included the vacant property at 86-88 Charles Street. Dammeyer was born in Salzgitter, Hanover, Germany in 1852. A musician, Dammeyer owned a saloon at 196-202 Main Street in the early part of the 20th century.

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Upon buying the property, Dammeyer had the twin dwellings at 86-88 Charles Street erected as speculative housing in the years between 1886 and 1891. With the completion of this first project, Dammeyer began the 1900-1903 construction of the twin dwellings at 90-92 Charles Street. The 1910 census records show that Dammeyer leased the property. William B. McCreedy, a watchman at the State Capital, leased 90 Charles Street. A steward and the United States Naval Academy hospital, Roscoe C. Rowe of Indiana lived at 92 Charles Street. Rowe was married to Dammeyer's daughter, Regina Catharine Dammeyer. Rowe, a graduate of the University of Maryland Law School, retired as a lieutenant commander in the Navy and served from 1949 to 1952 as mayor of Annapolis.

The 1920 census records have Herbert Orsinger, a printer, leasing 90 Charles Street. Dammeyer's daughter, Amanda Theodora Henriette and her husband, George G. Neumann, lived at 92 Charles Street. Born in Virginia, Neumann was a lieutenant in the United States Navy. He received full title to both properties from Dammeyer in 1923. Between that time, and 1945, Neumann leased the dwellings. In 1929, K.E. Barber lived at 90 Charles Street and W.H. Bradford lived at 92 Charles Street.

In October 1945, J. George Neumann was granted ownership of the property from his parents. Four years later, in June 1949, Neumann divided ownership of the dwellings when he conveyed 90 Charles Street to Anne and Erwin Bueneman for \$2,500. One year later, in July 1950, Neumann transferred ownership of 92 Charles Street to his daughter, Georgia Wernz.

Based on the genealogical information provided in Robert McIntire's Annapolis Maryland Families, it appears that 92 Charles Street was sold out of the Dammeyer family as early as 1952. It was purchased by Edward A. and Nita Byrne, who conveyed it one year later to Donald and Betty Ann Dawson. Having occupied the dwelling, the Dawsons sold it in 1960 to Clayton and Mary Randall. The Randalls lived in the single-family dwelling until selling it in 1974 to Kathleen Liebe. The property was conveyed again in 1988 and in 1995 before the present owner, Stephen L. Root, purchased it in September 1996.

Samuel P. Callahan, who seems to be a Dammeyer heir, sold 90 Charles Street in 1976 to Merle and Barbara Maffei, who use the building as rental property. Thus, for the first time since its construction in 1900-1903, the property at 90 Charles Street was not owned by heirs of Christian Dammeyer.
