

CAPSULE SUMMARY
107-109 Charles Street (AA-386)
Annapolis, Maryland

The modest building at 107-109 Charles Street, although reading as part of a row, was the second structure erected on the lots denoted as 101-109 Charles Street. The pair of wood frame dwellings was erected by separate property owners, Elmer E. Parkinson and William R. Shields, in the years between 1889 and 1891. Collectively owned by Shields, a barber, by 1893, the property was used as rental housing until 1936, when the dwellings were conveyed separately. The building at 107 Charles Street has been owned and leased by Anthony Maggio since 1942. The property at 109 Charles Street was leased by the Charles Taylor family until it was conveyed in 1979. Unaltered on the exterior, the twin building represents a phase in the development of Charles Street and the property historically associated with the Adams-Kilty House at 131-133 Charles Street.

The wood frame houses were constructed as a single structure on a shared brick foundation. The three bay wide facades of each dwelling are two-stories in height with a one-story porch. The rectangular form of the wood frame buildings is enlarged by two-story ells set on the corner bays of the rear elevation. The continuous shed roof is finished with an overhanging boxed cornice finished with plain modillions, end brackets, and beeded frieze.

The twin dwellings at 107-109 Charles Street were erected between 1889 and 1891 as speculative housing. The wood frame houses were constructed as a single structure on a shared brick foundation. The three bay wide facades of each dwelling are two-stories in height with a one-story porch. The rectangular forms are enlarged by two-story ellis set on the corner bays of the rear elevation. The continuous shed roof is finished with an overhanging boxed cornice finished with plain modillions, end brackets, and beaded frieze.

Exterior

The facade of the dwellings at 107-109 Charles Street are virtually identical, except for the minor alterations preformed by subsequent property owners. Facing southeast to Charles Street, the primarily elevation of the structure is six bays wide, with each dwelling consisting of three bays. The facade of 107 Charles Street is clad with German siding, while 109 Charles Street is clad with vinyl siding. The corners of the structure are marked by narrow corner boards. The first stories have a side entry set within the central bays. The narrow openings have one-light transoms and paneled wood doors. The door at 109 Charles Street has a single-light over multi-panels and appears to be original. The replacement door at 107 Charles Street has multiple lights over a single panel. The openings are flanked by two elongated 2/2 windows. Between the openings is a covered walkway that provides direct access from Charles Street to the rear of the property. The second story of the structure has three equally spaced 2/2 windows with louvered shutters. All of the openings have square-edged casings and wood sills. The projecting ogee-molded lintels seen at 107 Charles Street have been obscured at 109 Charles Street by the vinyl cladding. Additionally, louvered shutters have been applied to the first story openings at 109 Charles Street.

The central two bays of each dwelling are sheltered by a one-bay wide wood frame porch. Set upon rock-faced concrete blocks, the half-hipped roofs of the porches have slightly overhanging boxed cornices. They are supported by fancy-turned posts set on square posts and have square balusters.

The entablature, although identical when erected, has been altered by the application of vinyl siding at 109 Charles Street. The alterations include the obscuring or loss of the beaded frieze at the base of the entablature. This detail is extant at 107 Charles Street. The corners of the structure are finished with scrolled brackets, a detail that also visually divides the two dwellings at

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the center. The overhanging ogee-molded cornice, which is boxed and returns on the sides, is finished with modillions.

While the side elevation of 107 Charles Street abuts the turn of the 20th century building at 105 Charles Street, the northeast side elevation of 109 Charles Street fronts a fourteen-foot alleyway adjacent to 111 Charles Street. The exposed northeast elevation of 109 Charles Street, and the southwest elevation of the ell at 107 Charles Street, are clad in German siding and have no openings.

The northwest elevation of the main block is pierced at the central bays only, as the two-story ells project from the corner bays. Each story is pierced by 6/6 windows with wood sills and molded surrounds. The openings on the first story are elongated, while the second story openings are standard sized.

The ells, clad with German siding and corner boards, are set upon brick foundations. At 107 Charles Street, the northwest elevation of the ell has paired 2/2 windows on the first story and two pairs of eight-light casement windows on the second story. The northwest elevation of the ell at 109 Charles Street has similar paired 2/2 windows on the first story and a single 1/1 replacement window on the second story. The northeast elevation of the ell at 107 Charles Street has a six-paneled wood door on the first story with two single 1/1 windows to the south. The entry is reached by side entry wood steps. The second story has a pair of eight-light casement windows, a smaller fixed opening, and a single 6/6 window. The southwest elevation of the ell at 109 Charles Street has a 2/2 window and a single entry opening reached by side entry wood steps. The second story has a single 6/6 window.

The interiors of the dwellings at 107-109 Charles Street were not accessible for survey.

The modest building at 107-109 Charles Street, although reading as part of a row, was the second structure erected on the lots designated as 101-109 Charles Street. The two unit wood frame building was constructed by separate property owners, Elmer E. Parkinson and William R. Shields, in the years between 1889 and 1891. Collectively owned by Shields, a barber, by 1893, the property was used as rental housing until 1936, when the houses were conveyed separately. The building at 107 Charles Street has been owned and leased by Anthony Maggio since 1942. The property at 109 Charles Street was leased by the Charles Taylor family until 1979. With few alterations to the facade, the twin building represents a major phase in the development of Charles Street and the property historically associated with the Adams-Kilty House at 131-133 Charles Street (AA-393).

Site History: Lot 53

The property on which the dwellings at 107-109 Charles Street now stand was historically owned and surveyed in 1718 for William Gresham. Residing in Kent County, Gresham owned Lots 52, 53, and 55 along Charles Street in Annapolis. The property was conveyed to planter William Adams of Somerset County in two separate deeds of sale dating from December 1772 and May 1773. Chancery Records document that Thomas Gresham, then owner of the lots, died prior to the completion of the sales. Consequently, the conveyance was not decreed until November 1789.

Documentary evidence indicates that the property remained unimproved through most of the 18th century, particularly while under the ownership of the Gresham family. A lease made by Adams to Thomas Brooke Hodgkins of Annapolis documents that a building did stand on the property by 1786, when the twelve year lease was filed. Denoted now as 131-133 Charles Street, documentary and physical evidence suggests the building was erected by William Adams sometime between 1772 and 1786. With the death of Adams in 1795, title was devised to his wife and children. Adams' brother, however, contended the will, prompting the court to order the entire parcel to be sold. In 1797, all three lots plus the brick dwelling were assessed at 1125 pounds. One year later, with the estate still unsettled, the property was re-evaluated at 900 pounds. While the estate was being reviewed, General John Davidson occupied the dwelling, and later served as trustee for the sale of the property.

On November 14, 1799, William Kilty purchased the land with its improvements for 775 pounds. Kilty, who later served as Chancellor

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of Maryland, lived in the dwelling for nineteen years. By 1818, Kilty had conveyed the three lots to Francis Hollingsworth for \$3,150. Hollingsworth, in turn, sold Lots 52, 53, and 55 to Thomas H. Bowie. Bowie died prior to the completion of the sale and the courts appointed title back to Hollingsworth. In 1824, Hollingsworth sold the two lots along with the building at 131-133 Charles Street to George Wells for \$3,025.

Born in 1800, George Wells, Jr. was a prominent citizen of Annapolis, serving as president of the Farmers National Bank and in the Maryland Senate, as well as manager of the Annapolis & Elk Ridge Railroad. Wells had begun purchasing property, both improved and undeveloped, throughout Annapolis in the 1820s. By the 1840s, Wells had accumulated all of the parcels fronting Charles Street, which included the Adams-Kilty House at 133 Charles Street and the Jonas Green House at 124 Charles Street.

By the middle part of the 19th century, Wells had overextended himself financially. Consequently, he mortgaged his landholdings to the Farmers Bank of Maryland in 1877. Wells immediately defaulted on the loans and was forced to sell his property on Charles Street, Duke of Gloucester Street, Market Street, South Street, Cathedral Street, Carroll Street, North West Street, and Bladens Street. Alexander Randall was appointed trustee of the estate, and charged with overseeing the subdivision and sale of the land. The property along Charles Street, which included Parcels 28, 30, 31, and 32, was subdivided to create 25 individual lots to be sold at public auction. The sale, completed by 1881, yielded \$16,563 for Wells to pay his creditors. Lot 53 in Parcel 30 was divided into eight smaller plots, which were sold individually.

Building History

One of the last of the Charles Street lots to be conveyed, the property extending northeast from Cathedral Street included what is now designated as 101-109 Charles Street. The corner lot measured 111 feet on Cathedral Street and 76 feet on Charles Street. Charles I. Murphy purchased the property from George Wells' trustees in 1880. Murphy immediately subdivided the lot into five smaller building lots. The lot numbered 107-109 Charles Street was conveyed in December 1880 to Charles A. Johnson for \$180. Johnson retained ownership of the lot at 107 Charles Street until 1889, selling it to William R. Shields for \$200. Johnson conveyed the lot at 109 Charles Street to Elmer E. Parkinson.

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107-109 Charles Street
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In the period between 1889 and 1891, as recorded by the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps, the property was improved by the construction of two single-family dwellings. Identical in form and massing, the buildings were detailed with Italianate style ornamentation. Based on a 1893 deed of sale, Parkinson was responsible for the construction of the dwelling at 109 Charles Street, while Shields had the attached building at 107 Charles Street erected. Both Parkinson and Shields were charged in 1892 with frame dwellings, each valued at \$700.

In 1893, for a cost of \$1000, Shields purchased 109 Charles Street. The only child of Mary C. and Henry Lynde, William R. Shields lived at the adjacent dwelling at 111 Charles Street (AA-387), which his father had purchased in 1882 from carpenter Isaac N. Morehouse. Shields was a barber, born in 1862.

Under the ownership of Shields, the houses at 107-109 Charles Street were leased individually, while Shields continued to live at 111 Charles Street. Thomas Johnson leased 107 Charles Street as noted by the 1900 census. In 1910, Harry S. Kenchington of England, who was a painter, leased 107 Charles Street. By 1920, George W. Jones, a bookstore proprietor, lived with his family at 107 Charles Street. Jones, born in 1861, was a cousin of William Shields. The property was leased in 1929 to nurse Lila E. Seago and A.E. Jones, also cousins of Shields.

In 1900, Eliga L. Rackhold occupied 109 Charles Street. The retired Rackhold, born in 1827, lived in the building with his wife of nine years and his four adult children from a previous marriage. Railroad blacksmith Joseph McGraw, born in New York in 1847, leased the dwelling in 1910. The 1920 census records that it was then occupied by bookkeeper Zachary and Harriet Childs. The document notes that Childs owned the property, although no deed of conveyance supports this. In 1929, the property was occupied by M.T. Townsend.

With the death of William Shields in July 1935, ownership of the property was disputed. Shields had never married, had no children or siblings, and neglected to prepare a last will and testament for the division of his landholdings. Consequently, a number of cousins, aunts, and uncles laid claim to the property on Charles Street. The court ordered the sale of the land and improvements, an order greatly supported by Shields' relatives.

In November of 1936, trustee Roscoe C. Rowe sold 107 Charles Street

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to Raymond G. and Edith Garner. With the death of her husband, Edith Garner sold the building to present owner, Anthony J. Maggio, Jr. The dwelling is currently used as rental property by Maggio, who resides at 116 Charles Street (AA-389).

In October 1936, Rowe conveyed 109 Charles Street for \$2300 to Charles and Augusta Taylor. The couple occupied the dwelling until 1966, when, following the death of Augusta Taylor, title was transferred to Leta S. Peret, James Owen Taylor, and Charles C. Taylor, Jr. The children of Charles Taylor retained joint ownership until 1979, selling it for \$67,000 to Michael Mayhew. Throughout the 1980s, the property, which primarily served as rental housing, was conveyed numerous times. It was purchased by the present owner, Pierre Phoudhon Property of Arnold, Maryland in 1988. The building is currently leased.
