4. NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC no

110, 112, 114 Duke of Gloucester Street is an excellent example of the Georgian London town house transplanted in America. A straight forward, academic building in 3 parts with a pediment above the central portion, which is a slightly projecting pavillion. Building is symmetrical (note the 4 massive chimneys - superb!) except for present central doorway (probably changed). 110 and 114 have Palladian doorways with pilasters, pediments and semi-circular fanlights. All windows have splayed brick lintels and all are 6/6 except central 2nd (12/8) and 3rd (8/8) storeys. There are belt courses between floors and a simple wood cornice; 114 has granite steps, 110's are marble. Bond is flemish. Important architecturally - would be outstanding even in England. Perhaps earliest row houses in Annapolis.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This small frame outbuilding is located in the garden of 114 Duke of Gloucester Street, the northwesternmost of the three brick townhouses known as the Ridout Tenement Houses. The overall form and the framing system suggest the building was originally constructed to serve as a meat house. The absence of smoke blackening on the interior indicates that it was never used to smoke meat but served as a storehouse and possibly for sugar curing.

The building rests on a high brick foundation. It is square in form, with a pyramidal roof. The door is centered on the southeast wall, but has been altered in position. The original door was framed in above the sill, but the sill has been cut through, the foundation altered, and the door dropped to ground level. A simple lattice-work grill now fills the upper portion of the original door opening. Window openings have also been cut in to the left of the door and across the southwest wall. These are fitted with six-light sash mounted as casement windows. One sash has crude initials carved in the glass, dated in the 1880's. The sash

is mounted sideways, indicating that it has been reused from a previous location. The exterior of the building is covered with random-width horizontal boards set flush with a lapped joint. They are not beaded, and are secured with machine nails. The plain cornerboards and siding appear to be original. The roof is covered with wood shingles and was probably surmounted by a simple carved finial. The eaves are framed with light jack rafters scabbed on to the top plate, and are left exposed.

The interior of the building is quite plain. The framing is fully exposed and has never been sheathed or plastered. There is no evidence of the building ever having a wood floor, although it is possible one has been removed. The walls are framed with machine sawn timber in the "close-stud" framing pattern typical of meat houses. The corner posts are let into heavy sills with a mortise-and-tenon joint and are reinforced with two down-braces at each corner. The top plates are laid flat and are also secured with a pegged mortise-and-tenon joint. The studs are set on 15 inch centers and are let into the sills and top plates with mortise-and-tenon joints. Where the

down-braces interrupt the studs, the studs are mitred to fit and are nailed with machine-made nails. The ceiling joists are notched over the wall plates and do not support a secondary false plate. Instead, the roof rafters rest directly on the top plates, and the joists are mitred to fit in against the underside of the roof. There are eight primary rafters in the roof: one rising from each corner of the building and one from the center of each wall. These eight rafters are butted against a heavy octagonal block at the peak of the roof. Smaller jack rafters run from the plates up to the four corner rafters. The octagonal piece at the peak of the roof probably also served as the base for a carved pyramidal finial that projected up through the roof.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The small frame outbuilding at 114 Duke of Gloucester is a rare survival in downtown Annapolis. Few outbuildings have survived in the Historic District, and this example, constructed circa 1830-1850, is believed to be one of the earliest examples still standing. Although the southeast wall has suffered considerable damage from water and termites, the building remains largely intact and is scheduled for repair and rehabilitation.

Particular details of interest include the eave construction, in which the rafters rest directly on the top plate rather than a false plate, and the large octagonal block which serves as the structural keystone at the peak of the roof.
