

Capsule Summary of 109-111 Main Street (AA-539)

Built by Allen Quynn in the period between 1790 and 1798¹, 109-111 Main Street is sited on the southwest side of Main Street, approximately 50 yards from the corner of Green Street, on property leased from Nicholas Maccubbin Carroll. It survives as a good example of an intact federal-style building in Annapolis. Attached on both sides to Federal buildings, 109-111 is a 2-1/2 story, four-bay, brick block covered with a gable roof with a brick end chimney and two dormer windows.

The building was designed and constructed as a single structural unit; historically it has been treated as two distinct buildings separated by a centrally placed covered passage. Despite alterations, the building retains its original massing and roof form.

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The building at 109-111 Main Street was constructed in the last decades of the 18th century.¹ Located on the southwest side of Main Street, north of Green Street, 109-111 Main Street is a 2-1/2-story, four-bay, brick building covered with a gable roof with a brick end chimney and two dormer windows. Although the building was built as a single structural unit and is well integrated to appear as one large building, it has historically been divided into two separate buildings and is physically divided by a covered passage between the two buildings. It is designed in a vernacular Federal style and is attached on both sides to Federal buildings from the same period. Although it has suffered from alterations, the building retains its original massing and roof form.

The front elevation of 109-111 Main Street features an altered first floor with store entrances and a second story, divided into two groups of two window bays. The first story of the southern two bays of the building (109 Main) consists of a single, side-passage entry door with a window next to it and a narrow, covered opening leading between 109 and 111 Main Street. The side-passage entry, raised from the sidewalk by a single step, has a wood and 9-light glass replacement door with a four-light transom, all set within the original jack-arch opening. Next to the door is an altered 9/6 window.² The original jack-arched lintel is intact as is the beaded trim. A narrow opening between the buildings and originally leading to the rear yards is cut into the wall of 109 Main. This opening is closed by a metal gate and is surmounted by the original jack-arched lintel. The walls fronting the narrow opening are covered with wood boards. The second story of the southern half of the building has two original 9/6 windows with jack-arched lintels, wood sills and beaded trim.

The first story of the northern two bays of the building (111 Main Street) is currently part of Fran O'Brien's Restaurant primarily in the building next door at 113-115 Main Street. It has been extensively remodelled: brick piers have replaced the original brick wall surface and doors have been deeply recessed into the facade. A pent roof covered with standing seam metal, extending across the entire front of the restaurant from 111-115 Main Street,

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separates the first and second stories of this building. Like the second story of 109 Main, the second story of 111 Main has two, 6/6 windows with jack-arched lintels and wood sills.

Above the second story windows of both halves of the building is a continuous boxed cornice. The gable roof is covered with standing seam metal and features two gable dormers. The dormers have return cornices, shaped architraves, and hold 6/6 windows (the northern window has been altered and the bottom two panes are a single pane).

Following the sale of the property in 1971 and its subsequent renovations/restorations, Historic Annapolis, Inc. was conveyed a deed of easement over the building.

Neither the rear nor the interior of this building were accessible for this survey.

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Built in the period between 1790 and 1798,³ the building at 109-111 Main Street was constructed on the southwest side of Main Street, approximately 50 yards from the corner of Green Street. Constructed by Allen Quynn on property leased from Nicholas Maccubbin Carroll, the building survives as a good example of an intact federal-style building in Annapolis.

The land on which 109-111 Main Street is sited was historically part of Lot 28 on the Stoddert Plat of Annapolis and was owned for most of the 18th century by Charles Carroll the Barrister. The Carroll family purchased the property in 1735 from the heirs of Amos Garrett, the first Mayor of Annapolis.⁴ By 1745, Dr. Charles Carroll leased Lot 28 to Thomas Williamson for 21 years.⁵ The *Maryland Gazette* advertized from February through June 1752 the subdivision and leasing of Lot 28 on Green Street and Church Street. Dr. Charles Carroll, originally from Ireland, was married to Dorothy Blake. Carroll achieved his vast fortune through the acquisition of land in Annapolis. Together the Carroll's had two children, Mary Clare Carroll and Charles Carroll the Barrister. Mary Clare, together with her husband, Nicholas Maccubbin, had five children. Charles Carroll the Barrister, educated at Cambridge University in London, inherited his father's vast estate in 1754. Born in 1723, Carroll served as president of the Maryland Convention on May 8-25, 1776 and was a member of the first Maryland Senate. He married Margaret Tilghman, the daughter of Matthew Tilghman of Talbot.⁶

In 1759, Thomas Williamson sold the leases he had obtained in 1745 from Dr. Charles Carroll, deceased, back to Charles Carroll the Barrister.⁷ In 1781, Charles Carroll the Barrister, bequeathed his land holdings to his nephews, Nicholas Maccubbin, Jr. and James Maccubbin, provided they change their name to Carroll. The

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Maryland Gazette documented the official name change from Maccubbin to Carroll on June 5, 1783.

In 1789, Nicholas Maccubbin Carroll granted a 99 year lease to Allen Quynn for L24 in currency per year for a portion of Lot 28 fronting 48 feet on Church Street. The leased property ran from the end of William Biggs' leased lot at the corner of Church and Green Streets to the dividing line between Lots 27 and 28. Quynn agreed to keep in repair the "messuage or tenement now standing."⁸ John Allen Quynn was born in Frederick County, Maryland about 1726. He worked as a merchant on Church Street and served as the city coroner and as a delegate in the legislature from 1778 to 1803.⁹

The Federal Direct Tax of 1798 charged Quynn with a two-story brick dwelling on Church Street, measuring 23' x 30' assessed at \$400.00 with a L24 ground rent from tenant, Gideon White.¹⁰ The 1805 inventory for Quynn includes the lease of one house and lot with L24 ground rent and Gideon White as tenant.¹¹ White, a prominent leader in the Methodist Church, was appointed a justice of the peace for Anne Arundel County and in 1822 became a member of the county's Orphans' Court. He held both positions until his death in 1836, having been made Chief Justice of the Orphans' Court in 1831 after a year's hiatus.¹² He was married to Hannah Barber in 1798.¹³ White inherited both lands and personal property from his father, Joseph White in 1796.¹⁴

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document that Gideon White occupied the two-story brick house where he had begun a business selling groceries, dry goods, and patent medicines.¹⁵ In 1819, White was assessed for one dwelling and one lot in Annapolis valued at \$1,500.00. In 1821 the improvements were valued at \$2,000.00 and he owned one slave and 23 oz. of plate.¹⁶

Upon the death of Nicholas Carroll, all the land holdings were devised to his wife, Ann Jennings, and their five children. After the death of Ann Jennings in 1815, the holdings were devised equally five ways. Ann Mason's share included "all the land, houses, lots and ground rents and part of a wharf in the City of Annapolis," valued at \$5,900.00. Gideon White purchased the property from Ann Mason and her husband, William T.T. Mason in 1820 for \$1,500.00.¹⁷

Gideon White owed \$1,232.00 to his father-in-law, George Barber, which existed in the form of a mortgage on the property located on Church Street.¹⁸ White defaulted on the mortgage in 1832 and the Chancery Court ordered the property to be sold at a public auction. The *Maryland Gazette* advertized the sale of a "...three-story house and lot...now occupied by Gideon White...described in a deed from William T.T. Mason...the lower story is filled up for a store and is believed to be among the best stands in the city for business." The property was sold to John T. and Gustavus Barber for \$1,700.00.¹⁹

The Barbers sold Lot 28 containing a three-story brick house to William and Isabella Reany in 1836. There was no actual deed of conveyance recorded when the Reany's purchased the property, therefore when William and Isabella Reany conveyed it to Daniel T. Hyde in 1845, John and Gustavus Barber were also listed as the

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grantors.²⁰

Daniel Thomas Hyde, born about 1797, was a merchant in Annapolis. conveyed part of Lot 28, containing the three-story brick dwelling, to his daughter-in-law, Frances Ann Hyde in 1865 for \$1,000.00.²¹ Elias Hyde, born in January 1826, had married Frances Ann Ridgely in 1861.²² In 1875, Daniel T. Hyde got \$2,000.00 mortgage from Mary Hays of Baltimore. The mortgage included Daniel T. Hyde, Elias Hyde and his wife, Frances Ann Hyde, as grantees. It covered "all that lot of land on which stands a large three-and-a-half-story brick house and stone building, now designated as #21, with 50' frontage on Main Street which had been conveyed from Daniel Hyde to Frances Hyde in 1865; also that other lot of ground adjoining the above on the east on which stands two two-and-a-half-story dwelling houses now known as #15 and 17, with 30' frontage on Main Street; also two houses on Compromise Street."²³

Daniel T. Hyde defaulted on the mortgage within a year and the Chancery Court order the sale of the property. The three-and-a-half-story brick dwelling mentioned above as #21 was conveyed back to Frances Hyde, while the building located at 109-111 Main Street was sold at a public auction.²⁴ N. Rufus Gill was appointed by Mary Hay to sell the property to Sarah E. Mountz in 1876.²⁵ According to the census records for 1880, the building was occupied by Jacob Frederick, a merchant, and his wife Isabella. Sarah E. Mountz conveyed the two-and-a-half-story house at 109-111 Main Street to Mary Moss in 1890.²⁶

The census records for 1900 indicate that the building at 109 Main Street was leased to Jacob Popham, a tailor, and his family, while

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111 Main Street was leased by Phillip and Ida Gingham.

Due to poor health, Mary Moss and her husband, George W. Moss, conveyed the property in 1901 to their three children, M. Blanche, G. Abram, and Robert.²⁷ George and Mary Moss requested the return of the property in 1902 as they were "now restored to health and wished to manage their own property."²⁸ The release of power was conveyed in 1903.²⁹ The Sanborn Maps show that the single family dwelling was renovated into two separate dwellings between 1897 and 1903.

Following the death of George and Mary Moss, the three children regained interest in the building and lot located at 109-111 Main Street. The 1930 Sanborn Maps shows that the dwelling located at 109 Main Street had been converted into a store. The building was sold in 1939 to Lee Kim and Lee Poo and eventually devised in 1957 to Ning Lee.³⁰ The city directory for 1949 specifically state that 109 Main Street was the Crystal Laundry and 111 Main Street was John's Shop. The updated 1954 Sanborn Maps show that 111 Main Street was converted into a restaurant, called the Sanitary Restaurant as indicated in the 1954 city directory.

Ning Lee conveyed the building in 1968 to the Nicholson Corporation, who retained it until 1971 when it was purchased by G. Norman and Kathryn Jean Penwell.³¹ Upon purchasing the building, the Penwells provided Historic Annapolis, Inc. with a deed of easement. Five years later it was conveyed to Sike and Nancy J. Sharigan, who currently leases the building at 109 Main Street to Anna Politan's Gallerie. The portion of the building known as 111 Main Street has been renovated on the interior to provide additional space for the restaurant at 113-115 Main Street, known as Fran O'Brien's.





These two identical buildings share a party wall and were probably built at the same time. They are both good examples of Federal town structures; both have door plus window on 1st floor, two windows on the 2nd, and a dormer on the 3rd. Both have splayed brick lintels, however, 109 retains 6/6 windows on 2nd floor and on dormer. This handsome pair is right scale and exterior restoration would demand only window mullions and period doorways. There is a passageway to the rear between the buildings.
