

Capsule Summary of 133 Main Street (AA-548)

Constructed in the mid-19th century and altered 1880-1885, the building at 133-135 Main Street survives as a fine example of the commercial Italianate style of architecture. The building was renovated in 1973 by Historic Annapolis Foundation, Inc. and stands as an excellent example of historic preservation work in the city.

The building at 133-135 Main Street was originally constructed as a two-story brick building in the mid-19th century,¹ and raised in the period 1880-1885 to become a three-story brick building.

Located at the southwest side of Main Street, at the corner of Gorman Street, the building today stands as a three-story, three-bay detached building. Its brick walls (only visible at the third story level and therefore showing only the 1880-1885 construction phase) are laid in a six-course American bond and its roof is covered with a low-pitched gable with an end chimney. The 1880-1885 alterations to the building included the addition of a third story and of a new, all-stretcher, pressed brick facade with a wood bracketed cornice to reflect the "fashionable" Italianate style. In 1973, the building was renovated and enlarged by Historic Annapolis, Inc.

¹ A more precise date of construction for the original two-story brick building, mentioned in an 1880 deed (see Section 8), is difficult to determine as none of the original materials are visible on the exterior of the building. Furthermore, it is difficult to discern whether the original two-story building on the site is pictured in the 1858 Sachse Bird's Eye View of Annapolis; however, a building is clearly shown on the 1878 Hopkins Map.

The building at 133-135 Main Street was originally constructed as a two-story brick building in the mid-19th century,¹ and raised in the period 1880-1885 to become a three-story brick building. Located at the southwest side of Main Street, at the corner of Gorman Street, the building today stands as a three-story, three-bay detached building. Its brick walls (only visible at the third story level and therefore showing only the 1880-1885 construction phase) are laid in a six-course American bond and its roof is covered with a low-pitched gable with an end chimney. The 1880-1885 alterations to the building included the addition of a third story and of a new, all-stretcher, pressed brick facade with a wood bracketed cornice to reflect the "fashionable" Italianate style. In 1973, the building was renovated and enlarged by Historic Annapolis, Inc.

The northeast front elevation which faces Main Street consists of a first story storefront, reconstructed during the 1973 renovation, and side-passage entry. The second and third stories are divided into three bays of windows, while a projecting cornice is located at the roofline. The design of the replacement storefront, conducted by Historic Annapolis, Inc. was based upon historic research. It is of wood construction and is applied directly to the brick wall surface. Two four-light fixed windows raised upon wood panels flank the recessed entry to the store, while a double wood panelled door with a stone step and sill and a four-light transom occupies the far southeastern end bay. The store entry with its three-light transom above is reached by two stone steps and is recessed approximately two feet into the brick wall surface of the facade. A wood cornice with large end brackets separated by smaller wood brackets extends across the store entry and show windows and the side-passage entry. Narrow wood pilasters with fluting define the edges of both the store windows and the side-passage entry and provide visual support to the bracketed cornice.

The second story has three, long and narrow openings with 2/2 sash with bracketed hood moldings and stone sills. The third story 2/2 windows are shorter and lack the hood molding embellishments.

Instead, the window openings have jack-arched brick lintels and stone sills. Above the third story is the projecting bracketed wood cornice. This cornice features four large brackets separated by four wood modillions, all supporting the overhanging cornice with its coved profile.

The northwest elevation, which extends along Gorman Street, was totally remodelled in 1973. The first two stories of the brick wall surface have been stuccoed over, obscuring the brickwork on the original two-story building as well as ghosting from a 20th century building which abutted it. This stucco finish is painted with a geometric, postmodern pattern, apparently a rendition of the Baroque town plan of Annapolis. Two windows are located in all three stories of this elevational wall. These windows all have 2/2 replacement sash set within the wall surface.

The original two-story frame ell, which originally stood at the rear of the building was demolished during the construction of Noah Hillman Garage in 1973. A new, two-story masonry wing has been constructed in its place. This ell has a door and two 2/2 windows on the first story. A group of four windows is located on the second story, one of which is a pair of 2/2 windows, the other three of which are single 2/2 windows.

The southwest elevation has a single door opening at the far southern end on the first story and two single, 2/2 windows on the second story. A wood canopy shelters the first story door, while a projecting roof overhang, or wall, tops this rear elevation. It appears that the roof of the rear ell has been adapted for deck space and is reached from the third story of the main block of the building. A crude wooden railing has been built around the edges of the roof of the rear ell.

The first floor of the building was renovated in 1979 when the building's use was converted from office space to commercial store space. The second floor, presently containing offices, suffered damage from fire in 1980 and has been renovated.

Constructed in the mid-19th century and altered 1880-1885, the building at 133-135 Main Street survives as a fine example of the commercial Italianate style of architecture. The building was renovated in 1973 by Historic Annapolis Foundation, Inc. and stands as an excellent example of historic preservation work in the city.

The building at 133-135 was originally part of Stoddert Lot 27, which included the buildings currently designated 133-141 Main Street. During the 18th and early 19th centuries, this lot passed through various hands.² By 1829, a large lot of land, with no given dimensions or angles, but which included the property at 135 Main Street was sold by Jeremiah Hughes to Phoebe Lively for \$4,100.00. The conveyance of land mentions the parcel of land "containing houses."³ Based upon the architecture of the building and the six-course American bond brickwork, the building on the site currently does not date from that time.

In 1880, Dennis Claude et al, Trustees in Equity for Phoebe Ann Lively in 1873, sold the property to James Monroe. At that time, the lot had a 37-foot frontage on Main Street and a two-story brick house. The existence of a building on the site at that time is confirmed by the 1878 Hopkins Map. By 1894 when the property was again sold, by James Monroe to Samuel C. and Willie R. Hanlon, it contained a three-story brick house and a two-story frame back building. According to the Sanborn Maps, a three-story brick building occupied the site in 1885. It seems, therefore, that between 1829 and 1878, when a building appears on the Hopkins Map, Phoebe Ann Lively built a two-story brick dwelling. Between 1880 and 1885 James Monroe enlarged it to three stories. It would follow, therefore, that in enlarging the house, James Monroe added the third story and the all-stretcher brick veneer to cover the change in brickwork and make the building appear as a "stylish" and uniform new structure.

In 1885, the building is listed on the Sanborn Maps as being vacant. The two-story brick building next door (now demolished) is shown as a tailor shop. In 1891, 135 Main Street is then shown as

the tailor shop with its neighbor shown as a barber. From 1897 until 1921, the building is shown as a dwelling and in 1925, was sold by Willie R. Hanlon, widow, to Louis and Lena Kotzin. In 1927, the property was sold by Nicholas H. Green, attorney in Equity, for defaulted mortgage. Charles W. Smith bought the property and, according to the 1930 Sanborn Map, used the building as a store. The property changed hands one more time, before 1971 when it was purchased by the City of Annapolis for the construction of Noah Hillman Garage. At that time, the building stood vacant and the one-story frame addition at its rear was demolished to make way for the parking garage. The vacant building was used for storage until the property was purchased in 1973 by Historic Annapolis Foundation, using money from their Revolving Fund. Historic Annapolis then renovated the building, providing working drawings and specifications based upon research conducted by Russell Wright, who also supervised the restoration. A two-story rear section was added to the building; 19th century paint colors were selected for the modern stucco (or dry-vit) finish.

The building stands in excellent condition and is a good example of preservation work in the city. Currently the building contains office space and a commercial store known as Peppers.

133-135 Main Street is sort of a mate to No. 131 in size and in decoration. Ralph's place has a fine bracketed cornice, drip moldings on the 2nd storey windows, and a bracketed, ornate architrave on the door of 133. The building is possibly older as shape of roof, and brick work are not wholly Victorian. Building would appear to be a Greek Revival building with Victorian embellishments. Regardless of age, the building is important to street scape, and as Victorian piece, needs little restoration.



