

### Capsule Summary of 185 Main Street (AA-571)

The commercial building located at 185 Main Street was constructed in the period between 1903 and 1908. Constructed by the Burton Randall family, the building originally served as a bowling alley and barber shop. By the early 1910s, the building also functioned as a moving picture theater. Although the interior of the building has been renovated, it stands as an example of changing functions and adaptive uses of historic buildings.

Built between 1903 and 1908, the 1-1/2-story building at 185 Main Street has undergone a series of changes to accommodate a variety of uses. Appearing on historic maps as a bowling alley and barber shop from 1903 to 1908, the building is shown in 1921 as a moving picture garden theater, and is currently occupied by a French restaurant. The building is located on the southwest side of Main Street between Church Circle and Conduit Street and is attached to buildings on either sides. It is constructed of hollow tile, clad with stucco and is covered with a flat roof. Show windows are located on the first story, while three groups of windows are located in the half-story above. The building culminates at the roofline with a metal-clad cornice.<sup>1</sup>

Built between 1903 and 1908, the 1-1/2-story building at 185 Main Street has undergone a series of changes to accommodate a variety of uses. Appearing on historic maps as a bowling alley and barber shop from 1903 to 1908, the building is shown in 1921 as a moving picture garden theater, and is currently occupied by a French restaurant. The building is located on the southwest side of Main Street between Church Circle and Conduit Street and is attached to buildings on either sides. It is constructed of hollow tile, clad with stucco and is covered with a flat roof. Show windows are located on the first story, while three groups of windows are located in the half-story above. The building culminates at the roofline with a metal-clad cornice.<sup>1</sup>

The northeast elevation faces Main Street and is the only elevation of the building visible. The first story consists of a central, recessed entry flanked by canted, projecting show windows. The entry features double, all-glass doors with wood frames and narrow sidelights. The show windows, set upon a base clad with copper, have plateglass windows with metal frames. The ceiling or soffit of the entry vestibule is clad with beaded boards. An awning separates the first story from the half-story above.

The half-story of the building is articulated by three bays of windows. The center bay of windows is paired, while the two flanking windows are grouped in threes. All of the windows are 9-light wood casements with wood stiles separating the individual windows from the others in the group. They are all recessed slightly into the wall and have wood sills and no surrounds. The two end groups of windows feature wooden flower boxes.

The cornice rises directly above the half-story windows. It has a cyma reversa profile above a frieze and box cornice. No other elevations of the building are visible.

The interior of the building was first renovated in 1978 and again in 1990 when the current occupant leased the building. The first floor of the building is finished with exposed beams and joists. A double-L stair, located at the northern corner of the room, has a square newel and chamfered blasters. The second floor of the building was not surveyed.

The commercial building located at 185 Main Street was constructed in the period between 1903 and 1908. Constructed by the Burton Randall family, the building originally served as a bowling alley and barber shop. By the early 1910s, the building also functioned as a moving picture theater. Although the interior of the building has been renovated, it stands as an example of changing functions and adaptive uses of historic buildings.

The building at 185 Main Street was erected on property that was designated as Lot 47 on the 1718 Stoddert Map of Annapolis. Inherited by Thomas Bladen from William Bladen, the entire lot was conveyed to Dr. Charles Carroll for L50 in sterling in 1723. The lot was described in the deed as "...Post House Lot on Southeast Street and Church Street adjoining Philemon Lloyd's lot."<sup>2</sup> Dr. Charles Carroll, born in Ireland about 1691, conveyed Lot 47 including buildings in 1746 to Benjamin Young for L600 currency.<sup>3</sup>

Within three days, Young conveyed the property to Nicholas Maccubbin for a loss of L50 in currency. Maccubbin was the son-in-law of Dr. Charles Carroll and owner of a vast amount of property on Church Street near the docks. Upon the death of Maccubbin in 1784, Lot 47 was devised to his son James Maccubbin Carroll.<sup>4</sup>

James Carroll began to subdivide and lease the lot in 1788. According to the Federal Direct Tax of 1798, Carroll was charged with a two-story frame and brick dwelling house in the form of a T on Church Street. Listed as tenant was Frederick Green, said to have been born "just as the guns were firing on account of the birth of his Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales" on January 20, 1750. In addition to his postmaster duties, Green published the *Gazette* in 1775 with his brother Samuel.<sup>5</sup>

By the early 19th century, the property at 185 Main Street was conveyed by a trustee to Richard W. Gill. Gill, the son of John Gill of Alexandria, Virginia, was born about 1793. Schooled as a lawyer, Gill served as clerk for the Court of Appeals.<sup>6</sup> Upon the death of Gill in January 1852, the Main Street property was devised to his wife, Ann Elizabeth Deale Gill. Rights to the property were conveyed by Ann Gill to Daniel Sprogle in 1867, who within a year conveyed the rights to Burton Randall. Ann Gill officially conveyed the property in 1869 to Burton Randall.

Burton Randall, born April 7, 1805, attended the University of Pennsylvania Medical School. He married Mary Virginia Taylor, the daughter of John Gibson and Elizabeth (Lee) Taylor, and the niece of Zachary Taylor (President of the United States, 1849-1850). Randall served in the Seminole, Creek, Mexican, and Civil Wars as an assistant surgeon. He retired in 1869 as a Lieutenant Colonel. Following the death of Burton Randall in 1886 and the death of Mary Taylor Randall in 1906, the property was inherited by their children, Alexander B. Randall and Margaret Taylor (Randall) Worthington.<sup>7</sup>

According to the Sanborn Maps, the property at 185 Main Street was vacant from 1885 to 1908. It appears, therefore, that it was during the ownership of Burton Randall's heirs that the current structure was erected on the site between the years 1903 and 1908 for commercial use. The heirs conveyed the site in 1908 to Oscar F. Frederick. The deed of conveyance specifically stated that "no liquor was to be sold" on the property.<sup>8</sup>

At the time Frederick purchased the building from the Randalls, it functioned as a bowling alley and barber shop. Oscar F. Frederick immediately conveyed the property to Ridgely P. Melvin, who conveyed it to Ferdinand Frederick in 1909. The 1909 mortgage agreement stated that should the mortgage be defaulted, Ridgely P. Melvin would be empowered to sell the property. By 1912, the Frederick estate was involved in Equity Case 3612, due to a default

in the mortgage and Melvin sold the property containing "a valuable new brick and concrete building used for movies, bowling, and pool" to the Annapolis Banking and Trust Company.<sup>9</sup> By 1913, the property was sold by the Bank to F. Loomis Landon and George F. Fishel. According to the deed of conveyance the property was known as the Palace Theater, formerly the Magnet Theater.

Landon and Fishel owned the property until 1916 when they sold it to J. Norman Smith, who immediately reconveyed it to Jacob and Katie Ebling. Jacob P. Ebling, born about 1858, owned a saloon on Holland Street and was the manager of the Lyric Theater on Market Space. When the Eblings sold the land and the building at 185 Main Street to Philip Miller in 1918, the deed also conveyed "390 opera chairs, an old organ, a piano, 15 cues, 2 sets of balls, 2 pool tables, 4 benches, and balls for 4 bowling alleys."<sup>10</sup>

After numerous conveyances in the 1910s and 1920s, the Palace Theater, now known as the Garden Theater, was purchased by Solomon and Jennie Fink and William Finklestein. The Garden Theater stood to the southwest of the recently constructed Republican Theater, which also offered "moving pictures." By 1923, Lillian and George Jones bought the Garden Theater and renovated the interior. George W. Jones, born in 1860, operated a stationary and bookstore at 185 Main Street along with his second wife, Lillian Maud (Purdy) Jones.<sup>11</sup> James Munroe was appointed trustee to sell the property in 1929, due to a defaulted mortgage. The Farmers National Bank of Annapolis became the new owners of the bookstore. According to the Sanborn Maps for 1930, the frame building, now operating as a store, had been united with the Republican Theater at 187 Main Street by the addition of a brick facade.

In 1942 David S. and Mildred M. Jenkins purchased the property, measuring 28 x 115 feet, from the Farmers National Bank of Annapolis. David S. Jenkins, born in Pennsylvania in 1898, served as the County Superintendent of Schools and operated Jenkins

Stationary Store in the building at 185 Main Street.<sup>12</sup> Following the death of his first wife, Mildred (Fessler) Jenkins in 1977, David Jenkins sold the property to the Maryland Bankers Association.

Although the Republican Theater at 187-189 Main Street, also known as the Playhouse Theater, was demolished in the late 20th century, the building at 185 Main Street remains standing. Under the ownership of the Maryland Bankers Association, the building operates as a restaurant called the Cafe Normandie.




