

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**

**William H. Bellis Company Tailor Shop Building  
216 Main Street  
(AA-583)**

The William H. Bellis Company Tailor Shop Building, built ca. 1885, stands as a good example of Italianate architecture typical of the late 19th century architecture of commercial Main Street in Annapolis. It was built on land historically associated with the 18th-century Brooksby dwelling and, although altered extensively (1949-1954), it continues to contribute to the Annapolis Historic District.

Designed in the commercial Italianate style, this two-story, three-bay brick building is set upon a brick foundation and has six course bond walls. Its outstanding feature is a bold, overhanging molded wood cornice with four brackets that conceals the sloped standing seam metal roof. Between 1949 and 1954, a one-story storefront and side addition was added to the building, significantly altering its original appearance on this first story. The second story retains its original configuration of three, single, 2/2 windows with decorative brick hood moldings. The building's first floor is used for retail purposes, and the second floor houses residential space.

The Italianate style building located at 216 Main Street was constructed in circa 1885. Set on the northeast side of the street, the two-story, three-bay building is attached, one the southeastern side to a one-and-one-half-story building, erected in the mid-20th century. Historically used as a commercial store with domestic space on the second floor, the building was significantly altered in the period between 1949 and 1954 by a one-story side addition and a contemporary storefront. Despite this alteration, the structure stands as a good example of Italianate commercial architecture typical of the late 19th century architecture of commercial Annapolis.

The building is set upon a brick foundation with walls laid in six-course American bond brick. The flat roof, sloping to the rear of the structure, is covered with standing seam metal and is edged by a molded cornice. An interior brick chimney projects from the midpoint of the southeast elevation.

The original facade of the building is no longer present on the first floor as a contemporary storefront was constructed in the 20th century. The storefront, also encompassing the facade of the one-story side addition, consists of three separate entries divided by two large picture windows. The main body of the building has a double, recessed bay window entry that consists of two replacement doors of 9-lights over an X-panel, flanking the window. The bay window, set upon a brick foundation, contains 27 lights with wide, flat mullions. The storefront of the addition, identical in design to the storefront of the main body, has the same replacement door and an 18-light bay window. The entire first story is protected by a shed roof of standing seam metal with a boxed cornice and wide frieze. The second story of the building, which appears to be relatively unaltered, has three segmentally arched windows with 2/2 sash. The windows are finished with stone sills, single beaded surrounds, and are capped with brick hood moldings. The center window has louvered shutters that remain closed at all times. The main entablature, which returns around the corners of the building, consists of a cavetto-like cornice above ovolo molding that has pierced scroll-work, beaded molding, fluted brackets, and nebuly-like molding on the architrave.

The second story of the southeast elevation, visible above the one-story brick building located at 210-212 Main Street, has two 6/6 windows with wood lintels and single beaded surrounds. The second story of the northwest elevation, visible above the side addition, has five large 6/6 windows with jack-arched brick lintels, single

beaded surrounds, and wood sills. Both elevations are capped by an ogee molded cornice that extends from the cornice returns.

According to the 1885 Sanborn Maps of Annapolis, the brick building located at 216 Main Street was rectangular in plan with a one-story brick addition surrounding the east corner. Within six years the brick addition was enlarged to two-stories and a two-story wood addition was constructed on the north end of the elevation. A triangular-shaped addition was constructed on the eastern end of the southeast elevation. The plan of the building remained the same until the 1920s when a small one-story brick bay was constructed on the northwest elevation. By 1930, the bay was expanded, covering nearly all of the elevation. This addition was removed by 1949 and replaced by the present one-story brick addition that covers the entire side lot.

The interior of the building consists, on the first floor, of a large rectangular room, divided at the rear by square supporting columns. The ceiling is covered in pressed tin ornamented with a square-in-square design. No other historic elements remain on this floor. The second floor of the building was not surveyed.

Built in circa 1885, the building at 216 Main Street was constructed as a commercial building with domestic space on the upper floor. Set on the northeast side of Main Street, the Italianate building stands on property that was historically associated with the early 18th century Brooksby dwelling and was constructed by William H. Bellis. Although altered by a mid-20th century storefront and addition, the building stands as a good example of the late 19th century, Italianate-style commercial architecture of Main Street.

The land on which 216 Main Street is located originally occupied a portion of the triangular lot of ground that was resurveyed as Lot 73 on the Stoddert Map of 1718 for Margaret Mercier. In 1720, Margaret Mercier, and her husband John Steele, conveyed the southeast end of the lot to Cornelius Brooksby, a butcher.<sup>1</sup> The deed of sale indicates that the lot was vacant of buildings or improvements. The will of Brooksby, dated July 1723, bequeaths a dwelling to Cornelius and butcher shop to Mary, suggesting that a building was constructed on the site between 1720 and 1723.<sup>2</sup>

Following her marriage to shipwright Sewell Long in 1745, Mary Brooksby received full title to the property from her brother Cornelius Brooksby, Jr.<sup>3</sup> Although Mary died in 1751, Sewell Long and their four children remained in the dwelling until 1774, when Long died. Grandson David Long Sudler inherited the "lower portion of the lot on Church Street," while son David Long received the upper portion.<sup>4</sup>

By 1772, the Long family moved to the Eastern Shore of Maryland and leased the building to various tenants. According to listings in the *Maryland Gazette*, the property was leased to Thomas Price, who relocated his saddlery to the rear of the property.<sup>5</sup> In 1782, the *Maryland Gazette* stated that David Long and Thomas Sudler were

planning on selling the house and lot which was occupied by Thomas Price, in addition to the house and lot occupied by William Whetcroft.<sup>6</sup>

By 1784, David Long, having relocated to Queen Anne's County, finally conveyed 105-1/2 feet fronting on Church Street to John Shaw for L510.<sup>7</sup>

By the early 19th century, the property was conveyed by Trustee Nicholas Brewer, Jr. to John Johnson. The deed of sale stated that the property was where "George Johnson lived, then Thomas Franklin, then Brown."<sup>8</sup> Alexander Randall and Alexander Hagner were appointed Trustees to convey the property in 1864 for Johnson to Joshua Brown, who already resided on the site. Following a default in the mortgage, the property was confiscated by the Farmers Bank of Annapolis.

The property was purchased by William Henry Bellis. Bellis, born in June 1842, was a tailor on Main Street. It was during his ownership that the 18th-century dwelling/restaurant was demolished and replaced by the existing two-story brick building. Following the death of William in 1896, his son Joseph H. Bellis obtained ownership. Joseph Bellis, born in 1867, also worked as a tailor in the shop at 216 Main Street, in addition to serving as an alderman, sheriff, and state senator.<sup>9</sup>

According to the Sanborn Maps and city directory, the building continued to operate as a tailor shop, called the William H. Bellis Company Tailor Shop, until the mid-20th century. It was not until 1949, that the now vacant building was transferred out of the Bellis family to O. Bowie Duckett, Trustee. It was sold by Duckett to Karlton Francis Morris, the son of William F. Morris of Washington, D.C. Following his service in the United States Air Force, Morris operated a florist shop in the building at 216 Main

Street for many years.<sup>10</sup> Due to the 1949-1954 addition to the building, Morris was able to lease portions of the building to Clarence Remaley Real Estate and the Berlitz Language School in the late 1950s. The current owner of the building, Karlton F. Morris, presently leases it to Re/Max 100, a real estate office.




Good deep cornice with floralized dentils, jig sawn frieze and tall carved consoles, brick drip molds at second floor elliptical windows; first floor severely altered.



216 Main is a good example of Victorian commercial architecture. The ground floor extending to 218 has been gussied up with "colonial" doors, windows, and a hood, however, the rest of the building is original. There is a magnificent bracketed cornice with jig saw cut outs, floral dentils, and designed to include a band of brick 6 courses wide. Three 2nd storey windows are excellent period - 2/2 with rounded top and drip moldings formed by cabled bricks. Both sides of the building are exposed and add visually to the street and lead your eye toward rear of School St., State Circle, etc.




