

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**  
**1 School Street (AA-647)**  
**Annapolis, Maryland**

The property at 1 School Street dates from circa 1870, replacing a late 18th century brick dwelling. The modest wood frame structure with its Italianate style detailing was specifically constructed as office space. In 1949, the commercial building was renovated for use as apartments. In 1983, together with the buildings at 23 State Circle and 5 School Street, the two-story wood frame building became the Robert Johnson House. The building is one of four historic properties maintained by Historic Inns of Annapolis.

The two-story, side-passage wood frame building was designed in the Italianate style. Sandwiched between the addition to the four-story Robert Johnson Hotel at 23 State Circle and a small, one-story wood frame infill structure at 3 School Street, the former law office is located right at the crook in the road where School Street joins State Circle. The building is set upon a raised masonry foundation, parged with a stucco finish and has German siding over the wood frame structure. The three bay wide building is covered with a low gable roof, clad with standing seam metal. The building is characterized by its bracketed wood cornice and Italianate-style window and door moldings.

The two-story, side-passage wood frame building at 1 School Street was built circa 1870 in the Italianate style. Sandwiched between the addition to the four-story Robert Johnson Hotel at 23 State Circle and a small, one-story wood frame infill structure at 3 School Street, the former law office is located right at the crook in the road where School Street joins State Circle. The building is set upon a raised masonry foundation, parged with a stucco finish and has German siding over the wood frame structure. The three bay wide building is covered with a low gable roof, clad with standing seam metal. Now serving as part of the Robert Johnson Hotel, the building is characterized by its bracketed wood cornice and Italianate-style window and door moldings.

Exterior

The north elevation, facing School Street and looking obliquely towards the State House, is clad with German siding and divided into three symmetrical bays. The first story consists of a side entry door and two segmentally arched 2/2 windows, while the second story features three segmentally arched 2/2 windows. The entry is reached by a set of modern wood steps with a contemporary iron rail. The door has two raised panels, is surmounted by a segmental-arched transom light, and surrounded by molded casings that culminate with a half-arch above the transom light. The windows, all of which are original, have wood trim with segmental-arched cornices and raised, diamond-shaped corner blocks. The cornice features pairs of brackets at either end and single brackets dividing the central bay. Four modillions are located between the brackets, and together support the overhanging boxed cornice. The raised basement, with a contemporary fire door, is located beneath the side-passage entry, down a set of granite steps surrounded by an iron railing.

Historically freestanding, the structure abuts the four-story brick addition erected circa 1921 on the west elevation of 23 State Circle. The west elevation of 1 School Street is partially visible above the circa 1930 wood frame structure at 3 School Street. The elevation, devoid of window openings, is clad in weatherboard with a single diamond-shaped vent in the gable end.

The interior of the building, which has been much altered to serve as part of the Robert Johnson Hotel, was not accessible for survey.

**Site History**

The land on which 1 School Street stands was historically associated with Lot 73, as seen on the Stoddert Map of 1718. The large triangular plot of land was owned in the early 1720s by Margaret and John Steele, who conveyed it to Robert Johnson in 1722. Johnson constructed a dwelling on the property, which was enlarged in 1745 by George Johnson. Throughout the 18th century, the property was devised and conveyed several times amongst the Johnson family. The 1798 Federal Direct Tax indicates that the property contained a wood frame house on Church Street (Main Street), assessed at \$400.00, and a brick house on School Street, assessed at \$800.00.<sup>1</sup>

By 1808, the lot was conveyed by order of the Chancery Court to Charles Wallace, a prominent merchant and builder of the State House. The deed of sale states that the Church Street dwelling was leased by Richard Harwood, while the brick dwelling on School Street was occupied by John Johnson.<sup>2</sup> Within a matter of days, the property fronting on Church Street was conveyed to Elizabeth Thompson for \$133.00. Just three years later, Thompson purchased the remained of the lot from John Johnson, who had relocated to Prince George's County.

Following the death of Elizabeth Thompson in 1823, the entire parcel, containing the frame dwelling on Church Street and the brick dwelling on School Street, was bequeathed to her son, Henry Thompson. The elder Thompson's will specifically stated "my house on and fronting Stadt house hill where Rousby Bower lives." Ultimately subdivided from the Church Street tract, the property fronting School Street was eventually owned by William and Jane Ann

Thompson, who purchased the site from Henry Thompson for \$350 in 1848. The deed of conveyance records that lawyer, Frank H. Stockett, maintained his offices in a building at 1 School Street during this period.

**Building History**

William H. Thompson, born in 1818, was a graduate of St. Johns College (1838) who worked as a professor at the college and the U.S. Naval Academy Preparatory School. The real property assessments document that the dwelling at 1 School Street was one of four dwellings on School Street in 1860. William Thompson, who also maintained a dwelling on Church Street, was assessed in 1860 for two dwellings, jointly valued at \$1,700. The documentation does not however indicate whether the 18th century brick building was extant at this time, or had been replaced by the present wood frame structure.

In 1872, the Thompsons sold the dwelling at 1 School Street to James Howison for \$1,000. Alexander Randall was appointed trustee to sell the property upon the death of Howison in 1877. It was purchased by Julia Lockwood, the wife of John Alexander Lockwood, who held a \$4,000 mortgage on the property. The courts order that the estate of Howison convey title to Lockwood in 1877 for \$1,930. Born in Newcastle, Delaware, Julia McLane Lockwood leased the property at 1 School Street as law offices. During the building's tenure in the Lockwood family, it continued to function as office space. Julia Lockwood's 1880 will referred to the building as Howison's Office, and noted the rent was \$350 yearly. The building's wood frame construction by the latter part of the 19th century is substantiated by the 1885 Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps.

In September 1920, the building at 1 School Street, along with 5 School Street (AA-648), was purchased by Maud Bellis Morrow from the Lockwood heirs. Morrow and her sister, Eva Bellis Sternhagen, had obtained ownership of adjacent property on State Circle in 1896 from their father, William Bellis. Originally a single-family dwelling, the brick building at 23 State Circle (AA-690) was renovated at the turn of the 20th century to serve as a boarding house, commonly known as Morrow Apartments. The wood frame buildings at 1 School Street and 5 School Street continued to be leased by Morrow as office space.

Following the 1948 death of Maud Morrow, the family continued to own and maintain the rental property on School Street and State

Circle. By 1949, both 1 and 5 School Street had been renovated to serve as apartments, collectively known as Morrow Apartments. The imposing wood frame 5 School Street now provided a basement apartment and four individual apartments on the upper two stories. The modest store at 3 School Street was leased to R. L. Sears, public stenographer. The wood frame building at 1 School Street was subdivided to provide two apartments, one on each of the two floors.

In 1978, the Morrow heirs conveyed 23 State Circle, 1 School Street, and 3-5 School Street to E. Jefferson Crum and Knut Aarsand. Three years later, the properties were conveyed jointly to the Chesapeake Land Title Company, which two years later sold them to Historic Inns of Annapolis, Limited Partnership. The transfer in ownership resulted in a transfer of use, with the Morrow Apartments being renovated to serve as the Robert Johnson House. The hotel complex includes thirty guest rooms under the direction of Historic Inns of Annapolis. Historic Inns of Annapolis was the project of developer Paul Pearson, who successfully renovated and restored a number of the city's most significant buildings, including Reynold's Tavern on Church Circle, the Governor Calvert Inn on State Circle, and the Maryland Inn on Main Street. Johannes-Greco of Annapolis served as the building contractor for the renovation of the Robert Johnson Inn, with Cochran, Stephenson and Donkervoet of Baltimore as architects.<sup>3</sup> With the end of investment tax credits for adaptive use, Historic Inns of Annapolis was renamed in 1996 as Annapolis MD Hotels, Limited Partnership.




