

**CAPSULE SUMMARY**  
**Harry R. England House**  
**203 Prince George Street**  
**(AA-662)**

The long and low-lying two-story brick building at 203 Prince George Street was erected between 1935 and 1947 on the site of a 19th-century structure. Based upon the site visit, none of the above-ground historic fabric was incorporated into the 20th century structure. Local tradition holds that the building historically was a carriage house associated with the John Brice, III House at 211 Prince George Street (erected 1766), and was eventually converted into a dwelling; however, no evidence for this, architectural or archival, can be found. The basement of the house was not available for investigation; therefore it was impossible to determine whether the house sits on a historic foundation. Historic maps show that the original building on the site was the same width as the present building, but not the same depth or height; thus, leading one to determine that the original building was razed and replaced with the present dwelling between 1935 and 1947, as evidenced by historic maps and tax assessments.

Located on the southwest side of the street between East Street and Maryland Avenue, the five-bay, central-entry dwelling presents a unique and uncharacteristic facade to the street. Although the building's overall form and massing cannot be directly associated with any given style, its exterior and interior detailing is strictly 20th century Colonial Revival. The brick building is laid in a seven-course American bond and is covered with a gable roof, clad with standing seam metal, and featuring two end chimneys. A two-story concrete block and brick wing is located to the side and rear of the dwelling on the southeast, giving the dwelling its L-shaped footprint.

The long and low-lying two-story brick building at 203 Prince George Street was erected between 1935 and 1947 on the site of a 19th century structure. Local tradition holds that the building historically was a stable associated with the building at 211 Prince George Street, and was eventually converted into a dwelling; however, no evidence for this, architectural or archival, can be found. The basement of the house was not available for investigation; therefore it was impossible to determine whether the house sits on a historic foundation. Historic maps show that the original building on the site was the same width as the present building, but not the same depth or height; thus, leading one to determine that the original building was razed and replaced with the present dwelling between 1935 and 1947, as evidenced by archival documentation.

Located on the southwest side of the street between East Street and Maryland Avenue, the five-bay, central-entry dwelling presents a unique and uncharacteristic facade to the street. Although the building's overall form and massing cannot be directly associated with any given style, its exterior and interior detailing is strictly 20th century Colonial Revival. The brick building is laid in a seven-course American bond and is covered with a gable roof, clad with standing seam metal, and featuring two end chimneys. A two-story concrete block and brick wing is located to the side and rear of the dwelling on the southeast, giving the dwelling its L-shaped footprint.

**EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION:**

The facade (northeast elevation) facing Prince George Street is divided into five equal bays, articulated by double-story brick pilasters separating each one, and somewhat reducing the heavy wall surface. A central entry door is flanked by two windows on the first story and five equally aligned, but shorter windows on the second story. The central entry has a six-panelled wood door with a leaded glass transom light above. The door is framed by a distinctly 20th century Colonial Revival-style, applied wood architrave surround with a pulvinated frieze supported by fluted pilasters. The windows on the first story have 6/6 double-hung sash with interior beaded surrounds and wood sills; the windows on the second story are three-light casements with similar surrounds. Above the second story windows is a corbelled brick entablature, consisting of a narrow architrave, a plain frieze, and a decorative

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cornice. The cornice is formed by a row of bricks laid in a row-lock-like manner, each one laid in an alternating receding and projecting rhythm.

The southeast elevation is defined primarily by its central chimney, laid flush with the wall surface and rising above the ridge of the roof to its corbelled cap. Single 6/6 windows are located on the first and second stories and a quarter-round casement window is in the attic level, in front of the central chimney.

The northwest elevation similarly features a central chimney with a corbelled cap rising above the ridge line of the roof. No windows are located on the first story of this elevation, while two 6/6 windows are located on either side of the chimney on the second story. The attic level has two, quarter-round casements flanking the central chimney. A shed-roof storage shed abuts the chimney on the first story of this elevation.

The southwest (rear) elevation includes the rear wall of the main block and its projecting wing. The rear wall is clad with weatherboard and has pairs of double-hung windows and a projecting bay windows on the first story. The wing has brick wall cladding (over concrete block) and has 6/6 windows on the side elevations and large, expansive double-hung windows on the rear wall.

**INTERIOR DESCRIPTION:**

The interior of the dwelling has a three-room plan in the main block of the structure, while one large open room fills the first floor of the two-story rear wing to the house. The plan is not a typical arrangement of space and does not present itself as a central-passage plan as the central entry would suggest. In fact, the front door opens directly into a receiving stair hall, where the stair is immediately to the left and the hall directly in front of the door. A door to the east of the stair, on the first landing, leads into the kitchen, and the hall opens into a living room. The living room has a fireplace centered on the northwest wall and features a Colonial Revival-style wood mantel with crosetting and a torus frieze. All of the interior trim, including chair rail, crown molding, baseboards and door and window trim is mid-20th century.

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The building at 203 Prince George Street was constructed between 1935 and 1947 on the site of a 19th century structure associated with the John Brice, III House at 211 Prince George Street. Designed in the Colonial Revival style, the two-story brick building was constructed for Harry R. England as rental property and contributes to the streetscape of Prince George Street.

**SITE HISTORY**

The property on which the building at 203 Prince George Street is sited historically was associated with Dr. Charles Carroll. Designated as Lot 84 in the Stoddert Survey of Annapolis, the property was bequeathed to Charles Carroll, the Barrister. By 1763, the entire lot, including the pew at St. Anne's Church, were purchased by John Brice, Jr. Brice was a city alderman, vestryman at St. Anne's Church, member of the Council of the Province of Maryland, and one of the Judges of Assize for the Western Shore. He died while on the circuit in Charles County in September 1766.

The property on Prince George Street, however, had been sold "with love and affection" to John Brice, III in May of 1766, just four months prior to Brice, Jr.'s death. Captain of the Militia in the Revolutionary War, Brice, III served as Mayor of Annapolis in 1780. During the ownership of John Brice, III, the property was improved by the construction of a two-and-a-half-story brick dwelling and a brick kitchen building. The Federal Direct Tax of 1798 charged Brice, III for the buildings, valued at \$200, and leased by Ruth Davis. For many years, this building had erroneously been referred to as the Major Edward Dorsey House, who hosted the first assembly meeting in his house in 1695. Documentation has proven that Dorsey never owned or occupied the property at 211 Prince George Street, but in fact lived at the corner of North Street and College Avenue.

John Brice, III died in 1820, bequeathing all of his property in Annapolis to his daughter Mary C. Smith, the wife of Clement Smith of Georgetown. Seventeen years later, in 1837, the Smiths sold all of Lot 84 and part of Lot 85 to George Brewer for \$1,700. A prominent merchant in Annapolis, Brewer conveyed the property in 1852 to Henry M. and Maria S. Steele. Henry Maynadier Steele was born in 1799 in Dorchester County, and married Maria Lloyd Key in 1823. Maria Lloyd Key was born in Bladensburg in 1805 to Nancy Tayloe Lloyd and Francis Scott Key, who wrote the *Star Spangled Banner* in 1814. The building at 248 King George Street (AA-531) was constructed by Henry Steele between 1852 and 1858, directly across from Ogle Hall at 247 King George Street, which his family

had previously owned.

Steele resided with his family in the dwelling while overseeing the construction of the imposing brick dwelling at 248 King George. Once the new dwelling was completed, the Steele family relocated and 211 Prince George Street was sold. It was purchased for \$4,000 by Alexander Hagner. Alexander Burton Hagner, born in 1826, was a prominent attorney in Annapolis. In 1860, Hagner was charged with one unimproved lot on College Avenue, one office on West Street, and one house on Prince George Street. Relocating to Washington, D.C. to serve as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court for the District, Hagner sold the property on Prince George Street in 1880 to Dr. Charles Leiberman of Washington, D.C.

The Sanborn maps from 1885, the year Leiberman conveyed the property to Francis T. Marchant, through 1897 document that the one-story brick building at 203 Prince George Street, historically believed to have served as a carriage house for the imposing brick building at 211 Prince George Street, served as a "locker." By 1903, the maps state the building was used for "storage."

In 1935, the entire parcel was conveyed to Harry R. England. According to the deed of conveyance, the property contained the large brick dwelling at 211 Prince George Street and a one-story brick structure. Tax assessments for 1947 record that the large dwelling has been converted into apartments and the original building at 203 Prince George Street had been replaced by the present two-story brick dwelling.

During the middle part of the 20th century, both buildings were conveyed together several times. By 1971, however, the contemporary brick dwelling at 203 Prince George Street was transferred separately by Hunting Davis, who had purchased the entire parcel in 1950. In 1986, the 203 Prince George Street Limited Partnership was created, utilizing the building as rental property. Eventually dissolved, the partnership sold the building along with its extensive rear lot to Peter L. and J. Stephen Fitzgerald. As the current owners, the Fitzgeralds lease the building to officers of the U.S. Naval Academy.





4. NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC

The Dorsey Carriage House, though located next to such a magnificent house, is an architectural gem in itself. It is a temple form dwelling built with the side facing the street. The "front and rear" of the temple have thin end chimneys extending halfway out from the wall. The street facade has 5 recessed panels set between 6 pilasters with simple brick capitals. Windows are proportional; 1st floor are 6/6, 2nd storey are French windows. The central doorway is very fine Empire-Greek with a beaded transom. Aesthetically house is extremely pleasing and Annapolis should save what little Greek that it has.


