4. NOTABLE FEATURES, HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE AND DESCRIPTION OPEN TO PUBLIC **yes**

The Court of Appeals Building was built in 1901 by the architects of the west section of the State House (1902) and originally housed most of the state offices. A strictly Neo-Classic structure, the Appeals Building could be straight <sup>for</sup> a plate of Palladio, a more likely Palladio as interpreted by Inigo Jones, for this building is very much like Jones' Banqueting House at Whitehall. It has a projecting pavillion with 5 unfluted Ionic columns. The 1st storey windows are especially Italianate with their triangular pediments; cornice and other details are also classical. Well built, and though unabashedly eclectic, adds to Annapolis.
