St. Paul's A.M.E. Chapel was demolished in 1980. It was a small (20' wide by 26' long) white frame building. The building had been vandalized many times and the presiding A.M.E. bishop (Bishop Murph, Washington, D.C.) gave permission to the last remaining vestryman of the church, Mr. Frank Tounge of Shady Side, to tear it down. The Chapel was built in 1883. The last time I was in the Chapel, it was deteriorated and the home of a large colony of honey bees.

There were originally three African Methodist Episcopal congregations in southern Anne Arundel County: Ebenezer, Galilee and St. Paul's. Ebenezer was founded in Galesville in 1870 and is the only remaining A.M.E. congregation in the area. Galilee was situated on Wayson Road and ceased to exist in the early 1900's. St. Paul's, founded by the McKail Family in Shady Side, functioned as a congregation from 1878 until 1976. In it's last years, the congregation had only eight members, and they moved to Ebenezer Church.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Paul's A.M.E. Chapel is a small (20' wide by 26' long) white frame building. The clapboard covers 3/4" vertical siding (oak). The vertical siding is exposed on the East side of the building. At one time the vertical siding must have served as the exterior walls because the wood is painted blue in certain places. The doorway is situated in the center of the south gabled end of the building. The Chapel rests on four (4) brick piers. The cornerstone is on the left corner of the building (South) and reads: "St. Paul's AME Chapel 1883". The roof has a double covering of asbestos shingles on the left side and wooden shake shingles on the right.

The interior has been badly damaged by fire. There is wainscoting around all four (4) walls. The chapel was plastered but a lot of plaster has fallen exposing the lathe and chinking. The sanctuary is small 7 1/4' wide and 4 1/2' deep alcove on the north end of the building. There are three (3) four (4') foot windows on the East side and three (3) four (4') windows on the West side of the Chapel. These windows are oblong and the glass is missing from the frames.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There were originally three African Methodist Episcopal congregations in southern Anne Arundel County: Ebenezer, Galilee and St. Paul's. Ebenezer was founded in Galesville in 1870 and is the only remaining AME congregation in the area. Galilee was situated on Wayson Road and ceased to exist in the early 1900's. St. Paul's founded by the McKail family in Shady Side, functioned as a congregation from 1878 until 1976. In its last years the congregation had only eight members and they moved to Ebenezer Church. The cemetery at St. Paul's is maintained but the presiding AME Bishop (Bishop Murph-Washington D.C.) has given permission to the Vestrymen to tear the Chapel down.

St. Paul's A.M.E. Chapel is the oldest AME structure in southern Anne Arundel county. It was built by ex-slaves and freemen less than twenty years after the Civil War. It was a Church built by blacks for a black dominated religion. Most black Methodists belonged and still belong to the Methodist Episcopal or Methodist Protestant Churches (now both United Methodist) in this region. St. Paul's remains, even in its deteriorated condition, a symbol of the freedman's struggle to build his own institutions and to worship in a religion where he was an equal among peers.
