Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

The John Lowman House is a good example of a relatively unaltered 19th century frame farmhouse.

Both the 1860 Martenet's Map and the 1868 Hopkins Atlas of Anne Arundel County indicate a J. Lowman as owner of this house. Pumphrey's saw and grist mill are noted on the 1860 Martenet's Map, just south of the house and north of severn Run, hence the name of Old Mill Road which runs east from Telegraph Road, just south of the house.

According to the present owner, Penrhyn Watts, Jr., his father, Penrhyn Watts, Sr., purchased the property from the Lowman family in 1922. Also, according to Mr. Watts, Jr., the late 19th century addition to the house was financed from the sale of the land for the W.B.&A. Electric Railroad right-of-way which cut through the eastern portion of the Lowman property.

The John Lowman House is a frame 19th century dwelling located north of Odenton on the east side of Telegraph Road, just north of the Severn Run. It faces west toward Telegraph Road.

This section was probably constructed in the second quarter of the 19th century. A late 19th century addition extends from the south elevation and measures 2 bays by 2 bays. It has a hip roof. Both sections form an L-shape plan in the final composition. A one-story wrap-around porch, supported by five Doric columns, extends across the facade of the house. This was probably added in the early 20th century. The house is covered with weatherboard siding.

The John Lowman House is a frame 19th century dwelling located north of Odenton on the east side of Telegraph Road, just north of the Severn Run. It faces west toward Telegraph Road.

This two-story house appears to have been built in two stages. The earlier section (north end) is based on a side-passage, double-pile plan and has a pyramidal shaped roof. This section was probably constructed in the second quarter of the 19th century. A late 19th century addition extends from the south elevation and measures 2 bays by 2 bays. It has a hip roof. Both sections form an L-shape plan in the final composition. A one-story wrap-around porch, supported by five Doric columns, extends across the facade of the house. This was probably added in the early 20th century.

The house is covered with weatherboard siding. A portion of the siding is missing in the northeast corner of the house, revealing hand-hewn corner posts in the original section. The original section rests on a brick foundation and the addition on a stone foundation. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles, and the porch roof with standing-seam metal. Three interior brick chimneys are located in the house: two at the north elevation and one at the south elevation. A 1-story hip-roof, screened-in porch covers two entrances at the rear (east elevation) of the house toward the south end. It is supported by 5 turned, wood posts. One entrance to the south leads into the late 19th century addition. The other entrance, consisting of a 4-panel door surmounted by a 3-pane transom, leads into the side passage of the original section of the house.

The main entrance to the house is located on the facade and opens into the side passage of the original section. The entrance consists of a 4-panel door surmounted by a 3-pane transom, flanked by 4-pane sidelights which rest on raised wooden panels. The entire entrance is flanked by flat wooden pilasters. Another entrance pierces the south elevation of the original section under the wrap-around porch. This leads into the side passage. Two other doorways pierce the north elevation of the house. These once provided access to a wing which has been removed.

The windows in the original section and the 2nd story of the rear elevation in the addition are 6/6 sash. The rest of the addition is lit by 2/2 sash windows. All windows have wooden, louvered shutters.

The interior of the house was not examined.

An historic photo, pictured in Catherine O'Malley's Odenton: The Town a Railroad Built, shows that the facade of the house once had a single-bay, 1-story, hip-roof portico covering the main entrance. It was supported by a pair of Doric columns at each corner.

A 1-story, hip-roof porch supported by turned posts is also pictured covering the facade of the addition. This photo also shows a portion of a smaller wing extending from the north elevation of the house. According to Catherine O'Malley, this was an early part of the house, possibly pre-dating the side-passage, double pile section.¹ The two doorways located on the north elevation more than likely provided access to this wing.

A small, frame outbuilding of unknown past use is located just east of the rear of the house. It is covered with German siding and the deteriorating gable roof is covered with wooden shingles.


