Jane's House was constructed originally with one room down, one room up, and an enclosed staircase inside the east corner. The frame house measured 8'8" wide by 9'8" deep and faced southeast.

In 1928, a full-width front porch was added. In 1930, a rear kitchen/bath wing (1-story) was added at the north corner. In 1931, this rear north wing was balanced by the addition of a living room wing at the rear west corner. By 1936, the two rear wings were connected by a full-width screened porch. (See accompanying floor-plan sketch drawn c. 1936 by Reaney Kelly, occupant from c.1929-37.)*

One final addition (1-story) was made in 1969 at the east side, in front of the kitchen wing.

* J. Reaney Kelly was the author of several books of local history, including Quakers in the Founding of Anne Arundel County, Maryland.

Jane's House was built c.1896 by Mr. James Murray for Jane Ward and family. Jane was the black nurse hired to care for Mr. Murray's son Edmund Churchill who was born in May 1897. Mr. Murray built his own house "Creekside" in 1895 on a portion of the Cedar Park farm (AA-141) where he had grown up.


James Murray's parents, Dr. James Murray and Fanny Cheston Murray, had moved from Harwood, Md. to Warrenton, Va. during the Civil War in support of the Confederacy. Young James was born there in 1868. The Murray family returned to Md. in 1869 and settled at Cedar Park in Cumberland. Apparently they brought with them from Virginia some of their employees, including Henderson and Margaret Warner and 10-year old Jane Warner. Margaret may have been the nurse for young James as her daughter Jane would later be for James' son Edmund Churchill.

By the time of the 1880 Federal Census¹ Jane Warner had married Charles Ward, a Md. native, and they had an infant daughter² Sophia. Jane's parents the Warners were living with them. In the 1900 Census² Charles and Jane Ward's household, including Jane's father, was listed adjacent to the household of young James Murray, including his wife Susie and 3-year old son Edmund Churchill. This juxtaposition in the Census list indicates that the two families were immediate neighbors living, apparently, at "Jane's House" and "Creekside" respectively.

Beginning in 1928 Jane's House was occupied by a succession of Murray family members and friends. Today, one of Churchill Murray's daughters, Sally Murray Stotz, lives in Jane's House. Her brother, James, occupies the main residence at Creekside, now called "Land's End". Her late sister Marjorie Murray Bridgman's family occupies the Cedar Park residence.


