Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: (Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)

The Park Mill has been described as one of the best preserved mills of the Jones Falls valley (MHT B-1028). The one- to two-story rubblestone structure was built into the side of a hill above the falls, creating two stories on the east and one story on the west. A square tower topped with a pyramidal roof delineates the main entrance of the mill. Windows are large, 12/12 wood sashes with oak lintels. Minor alterations include a concrete block addition on the west side near the entrance. Several nineteenth-century additions, such as a brick office and shop additions to the north and east are evidence of the evolution of the mill. This mill, which manufactured seine twine, is representative of the thriving mill industry of the nineteenth century Jones Falls valley. It is recommended as individually eligible under criterion C. Park Mill would also contribute to an MPD of mills in the Jones Falls Valley.





Statement of Significance

Park Mill (c.1855) is the best preserved antebellum mill building in Hampden-Woodberry. It was not a cotton duck factory but did rely on the maritime trade for its market. It was built by Horatio Gambill to make fishing nets and seine twine. Gambill is said to have obtained the patents of a John McMullen who invented machinery for making seines, and the mill was built to take advantage of this fact. The two-story stone building with its pitched roof and bracketed eaves contains a timber roof truss with wrought iron tension members and a clear span of fifty feet. The building has undergone some alterations but it remains one of Baltimore's most picturesque stone mills.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

The Park Mill is a two-story stone building (283 ft. by 50 ft.) with a pitched roof and bracketed eaves. The 72 ft. by 50 ft. western addition (1875) is separated by a fire wall and served as a picker house. There is a small square stone tower with a pyramidal roof on the south side. The first floor of the main section of this mill is interrupted by a row of columns at midpoint while the second floor is a clear span of 50 ft. The former contained roping, while ring spinning, spooling, fly frames, slubbing, drawing and carding machinery occupied the second floor. The picker house section had a machine shop, pickers, and waster storage on the first floor; lappers, pickers, and offices on the second.

Connected to the main building is a 51 ft. by 28 ft. two-story stone, pitched-roof engine house. Attached to the engine house is the 28 ft. by 61 ft. boiler house, divided into two areas. This structure is also stone, one-story, with a pitched roof. In 1912 there were three boilers housed here. North of the center of the boiler house is a fre-standing smoke stack of relative recent construction.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Park Mill is the best preserved antebellum mill building in Hampden-Woodberry. It was not a cotton duck factory but did rely on the sailing ship and maritime trade for its market. It was built by Horatio Gambrill to make fishing nets and seine twine for other uses. Gambrill is said to have <sup>relied</sup> ~~relied~~ on the patents of a John McMullen who invented machinery for making seines, and the mill was built to take advantage of this fact.

Gambrill built this mill in about 1855 next to the earlier Woodberry Mills which was at that time making duck for sails. It is not known whether Park Mill was ever powered by water but a low dam was built across the Jones Falls at the point where the power house sits.

This mill contains a timber roof truss with wrought iron tension members and a clear span of fifty feet. The truss is of a strange design, comprised of timber chords with timber compression members sloped toward midpoint. A stair tower which once stood at the southwest end of the building was relocated to the east side some time before 1912. The original building was 211 ft. x 50 ft. but a separate picker house (72 ft. x 50 ft.) was added to the northern end, probably because of the growing concern over fires.
