The Pabst bottling plant at S. Charles and Wells Streets was built to take advantage of Baltimore's excellent rail connection to the Midwest. Built adjacent to the Baltimore and Ohio's Locust Point line, the plant received beer in bulk and bottled it for local consumption.

The plant is divided into a fanciful two-story office building connected at the rear to a one-story bottling building. The office facade faces east. It is of brick masonry construction with limestone ornamentation. A stone veneer sheathes the first five feet of the facade, forming the sills of the windows. The lintels on these windows and over the door are also stone, including the finials and gorgons' heads of the door surround. On the second floor, the three central bays have recessed windows with brick segmental arched lintels. The windows of the two end bays are surmounted by Pabst medallions, badly faded. The most prominent feature of the building is its castellated parapet wall that ends in a tower on the southeast corner. The two tower facades which face the street have a pair of narrow rounded arch windows.

The bottling plant is a high one-story brick structure with a flat roof and parapet wall. Brick corbelling at the top simulates the castellation of the office building. Several of the segmentally arched lintels have been altered but the building remains essentially intact. A concrete block addition has been added at the west end for truck loading and storage, replacing an earlier wooden shipping shed.

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The Maryland Glass and Mirror Company building was built as a branch of the Milwaukee-based Pabst Brewing Company in the 1890's. It was used as a bottling and distribution center. The fanciful design of the castle-like building was similar to late nineteenth century Germanic breweries. With the advent of Prohibition in 1920, the brewery branch closed.

The Maryland Glass and Mirror Company, which had been opened in 1912 on E. Saratoga Street, moved to the Pabst building in 1922, where they have been manufacturers and jobbers of mirrors and plate glass, windshield glass, glass push plates, and polished edge furniture tops. The company is still in operation at the S. Charles Street location.




