It later became the home of Philip Kahn and Company, overcoat manufacturers; The Kramer Company, makers of ladies blouses; and A. Schreter, tie makers, who still use the premises. Today the building is the home of a medical clinic.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Originally the Hamburger Brothers clothing factory, this commercial building was renovated for its present use in 1973. The building is five stories high, nine bays wide, and 13 bays deep. It is classically detailed and exterior walls are of orange Roman brick and brownstone.

On the front, granite pedestals support four brick piers which rise as pilasters to the cornice. Iron lintels with cast acanthus detail stretching from pier to pier provide openings at the first floor level, which are now filled with brown brick. The recessed entrance is reached by a flight of brick steps at the right end. The entranceway is filled with an aluminum and plate glass double door. A course of brownstone adorned with carved dentils and egg and dart detail runs at the second floor level, supported on minor capitals of the piers. The capitals are of brownstone with leaf and vine carvings.

Above this course of stone, each of the three bays is broken by three verticals of fenestration, separated by a minor order of piers. All windows are flat arched with high fanned brick lintels and stone sills. All are double hung with one-over-one lights. Recessed rectangular brick panels divide the windows between floors. The minor piers have leaf-carved brownstone capitals which support the round brick arches which mark each column of fenestration at the fifth floor level. The major piers have large brownstone capitals carved with grotesques and leaf motifs.

A row of corbelled brick brackets runs between the major capitals at the line of the parapet. The cornice has been removed. The parapet is of brick and is broken by recessed panels. A water tower rests on the flat roof at the northeast corner of the building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Since 1893 the building at 16-20 South Eutaw has been actively associated with Baltimore's needle trades. The first of several large projects in the loft district by developers Joseph Cove and Henry Jones, it originally housed Hamburger Brothers clothing factory. It later became the home of Philip Kahn & Company, overcoat manufacturers; The Kramer Company, makers of ladies blouses; and A. Schreter, tie makers, who still use the premises. Today the building is the home of a medical clinic.

Historical Significance:

When Hamburger Brothers and Company moved into the new building at 16-20 South Eutaw, it was already a well established manufacturer of men's and boy's clothing. The Eutaw Street building included the latest designs and equipment for manufacturing. Two boilers produced steam for heat and two main electric generators for lights and machinery. Shipping and receiving was conducted from the basement. The ground floor contained the offices and was the place where the cut cloth was sent out to be sewn and then returned and examined. The second floor housed the cutting room. Finished goods were stored on the third and fourth floors, while the top floor was where cloth was examined and prepared for the manufacturing process. Hamburger Brothers furnished employment for between eight and nine hundred people including seven traveling salesmen.

Philip Kahn & Company later occupied the premises for several years in 1926. This company, founded in 1901, was known as the "Overcoat King" and distributed 15 products under the name "Pecan Brand". The name was changed to Katzenstein Brothers late in the 1920's and then continued to operate from several locations until after World War II.

In more recent times two important companies occupied the building: The Kramer Company, who until 1972 made blouses on the first four corner floors, and A. Schreter. The Kramer Company was founded in 1909 by Louis Kramer and became one of the most important manufacturers of blouses.

They operated from the Eutaw Street building for many years until they went out of business in 1972. They used four floors and from the beginning all operations were directly supervised by the firm rather than using contractors. In later years they operated a factory in Aero Acres, Maryland. In 1959 Kramer Company employed 500 at its factories and sold several million dollars worth of their "Pilot" label blouses. The company was part of L'Arglon Apparel, Inc. from 1960.

A. Schreter and Sons has occupied the fifth floor of 16 South Eutaw since the world War II era. In 1924 they were located at 2-4 South Hanover where they made ties for many American stores. Abraham Schreter, a Hungarian immigrant, founded the firm in 1894. In 1954, at the age of 76, Schreter invented the buttondown, the feature for which the company is well known throughout the world. He was also originator of the popular 1920's "Gold Bows", and helped popularize the seersucker tie during the Depression.

The Company's products are distributed throughout the world and have been accepted for use by all branches of the United States Armed Services. In 1960 Schreter began an extensive overseas selling campaign and were very well received. Today much of their business is in specialty ties for colleges, businesses, and organizations who want special designs on ties. The University of Maryland, 4-H Clubs and The American Legion, to name a few, have all placed orders for Schreter's special products.

The building was purchased in 1973 by Central Medical Center who have renovated the ground floor for use as a health clinic. The middle three floors are now used by a clothing manufacturer and a uniform company.



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

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Central Medical Center is a recent example of adaptive re-use for Baltimore's large, old but sound commercial structures. Contemporary with the Classic Building to the north, it is similarly but more finely detailed and exhibits an impressive display of Roman brickwork.
