Description: The structure at 210-212 E. Lombard Street is an eight bay wide, four story high, brick structure with terra cotta trim. The first story has been altered with awnings above all the windows. Dividing the first and second story is a simple cornice with dentils and the 1st American Bank sign on the cornice. All the windows on the upper stories are simple, one over one windows with granite ledges and brick lintels above. Simple square projecting brick patterns embellish the front facade between each floor. There is a simple cornice along the roofline and there are three elaborate consoles decorated with cartouches under the cornice but not attached to the cornice. These details appear as if they support a large cornice but instead they are just decoration. The building borders an alley, Water and East Lombard Streets. The north elevation has the same architectural details as the front facade.



This building was designed in 1905 by Charles E. Cassell & Son and Charles L. Stockhausen was the builder. Architecturally, the building features geometric brick lintels. Overall, the building is in good condition and it makes a contribution to the historic character of the area.
