
Notable features:

Scheduled for demolition to make space for a recreation center. These houses are largely vacant because they are being bought up by the City; only two are still occupied.

In 1860 this block was heavily populated by laborers and craftsmen; these small houses were built to serve them. The usefulness of these smaller dwellings to today's smaller families would suggest that the plan to demolish these houses should perhaps be reviewed.



Environmental context:
