

Notable features:

Current appearance is terrible with formstoning, condition of the theater, etc. All need visual attention. The theater building's bulk is out of scale with the other buildings. This building could be removed, depending upon the total plan, or the lobby area could be demolished, leaving the hall behind and a small off-the-street garden in front facing the street. Handling of upper floors as at 1122/24, Evelyn Dresses, is detrimental.

Environmental context:

Baltimore Street commercial, both sides; most buildings are converted residential scale. Street is two-way with constant traffic but not as high-speed and noisy as Lombard and Fayette. Street needs a complete redesign. More residential use on upper floors and possibly entire buildings might be considered.





Newton Academy, Baltimore Street and Carrollton Avenue, Thomas Lester, Principal.— This educational institution will long rank among the leading ones of Maryland, not only on account of its many local advantages, its healthful position and the superior comforts it possesses for students, but for its high state of organization and perfection of its training system of the youth submitted to its care. The general groundwork of a sound commercial and mathematical education is laid for boys and young men, and students are fitted for any business position in life, according to the tastes evinced in their study. The Newton Academy is a fine three-story brick building, specially erected for a school, and has few superiors in point of location in the city of Baltimore, being well elevated and easily accessible by street cars from all parts of the



city and from the chief railroad stations. The building is warmed by hot water and is well ventilated. Its study hall is on the second floor, has lofty ceiling, is nicely furnished and carpeted, single desks and revolving chairs, and the light is well arranged from the rear. A fine gymnasium is provided within the building. The exercises of Newton Academy are generally resumed about the second Tuesday in September. Professor Lester, the principal, is a gentleman of vast experience as an educator and trainer of youth, and is ably assisted in the various branches of the classes by thoroughly qualified masters. The prosperity of the Academy within the last few years has been marked by untoward success, which is at once the best test of its solid utility. The terms of the school have been placed at the most moderate rates, being only \$80 for each session of forty weeks, payable half in November and the balance in March, and \$10 extra for Latin, German and Drawing.
