
Notable features:

In a list of the buildings which he said he designed, E. G. Lind, architect of the Peabody Institute, with Starkweather, architect of First Presbyterian Church, the Masonic Temple on Charles Street, claimed this as one of his works. It was a Methodist Episcopal church.

A congregation located there early sometime between 1847 and 1855, when, by the latter date, it had its fixed residence at this site. This appears to be a new facade (by Lind) on a meager earlier building; date of front is the late 1860's. Residence next to it (751) is about the same date as the original church, i.e., 1850-1855.


Environmental context:

Faces Lexington Terrace public housing. Fayette is a busy, one-way street.




Fayette Street Church (Fayette-Bennett Methodist Church, Fayette M.E. Church)
