738 and 722 S. Charles St. (the two corner houses) are the oldest houses on this side of the 700 block of S. Charles St., having been built in the period between 1810 and 1825, or perhaps earlier. 738 S. Charles St. is two and a half stories in height, four bays wide on S. Charles St. and two bays wide on W. Montgomery St., with a dormer window facing both streets. The first floor area most recently served as a local grocery and there is a late, corner storefront entrance set diagonally to the corner of S. Charles and Montgomery Streets. 722 S. Charles St. is a two and a half story, two bay wide brick house built by a local house carpenter, Thomas Hollingsworth, that shows the one room deep floor plan used in the earliest Federal-style houses built in the area. The remaining houses on the street are all three stories in height and two bays wide. All were originally built with gable roofs, like the present-day 734, 732, 730, 726, and 724 S. Charles St., but 728 and 736 S. Charles St. were remodeled after the Civil War in the currently fashionable Italianate style and now have shed roofs and bracketed cornices. This group of three story houses was built in 1850-1851 to serve as combination storefront/residences for the increasing number of small shopkeepers moving into the area to meet the needs of the growing population.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This three story, shed roof structure with bracketed cornice is a remodeling of the original gable roofed structure on this site, part of a group of similar houses extending along this side of Charles St.

The building is a full three stories in height, is 14' wide and runs back on its lot about . It is constructed in running bond. The shed roof is surmounted by a cornice of Italianate design consisting of a deeply projecting crown molding with a scroll sawed design of vine motifs across its two lower panels. Three carved wooden brackets connect the cornice to a lower molding strip. The brick freize thereby defined is punctuated by two scroll sawed ventilating panels. The window openings of the second and third floors have flat stone lintels and wood sills. No original sash remains and the openings are boarded.

The original first floor store front has been completely plastered over, but the bracketed, Italianate style cornice that extends across the entire width of the projecting shop front remains. It consists of a deeply projecting crown molding supported by carved wooden brackets.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is representative of a fairly large number of houses in the Federal Hill area that were originally built in the 1840's and 1850's as gable roofed houses but which were remodeled after the Civil War in the currently fashionable Italianate style, with shed roof and bracketed cornice. The house was built, along with its neighbors, to serve as a combination residential/commercial structure. The first floor area served as a store-front and the family lived on the two floors above. Buildings of this type were designed to meet the needs of the influx of small shopkeepers who were moving into the area to service the growing community. The first occupant of the house, Christopher Scherer, operated variously as a cabinetmaker, a wagoner, and a dealer in flour barrels from this location.¹ The second occupant of the house, Emanuel Rapp, operated a tailor shop at the remodeled house in the late 1860's.²

The house was built by William Wight as part of a row of such houses extending from 724 to 730 S. Charles St. The house has recently been sold by the City to a private owner and will hopefully soon be restored.


