All but one of the houses along this side of Montgomery St. were built originally as two and a half story houses in the early decades of the nineteenth century. 102-104, 110, 118, 124, and 126-128 E. Montgomery St. still retain their original two and a half story form, each brick house being two bays wide (except for 118 E. Montgomery St. which is three bays wide) and with a steeply pitched gable roof with dormer window. 106, 112, and 114-116 E. Montgomery St. were enlarged and remodeled after the Civil War and are now three stories in height, two bays wide, with shed roofs and Italianate-style bracketed cornices. 108 E. Montgomery St., also a three story, shed-roofed house, was not built until after the Civil War. 130 E. Montgomery St. is the only surviving frame house in this section of Federal Hill. The two story high, three bay wide house (with new exterior clapboarding) was originally one of a row of three such houses located at the eastern end of the block. The similar house at 126-128 E. Montgomery St. was replaced in 1840 by a pair of two and a half story, two bay wide brick houses with Greek Revival-influenced bull's-eye exterior door and window lintels.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This three story, two bay house with shed roof was the first structure to occupy this site, being built between 1870 and 1875 by the owner of 106 E. Montgomery St., which was probably modernized at the time this house was built. It is currently covered with formstone.

The house is a full three stories in height, 17' wide, and occupies a lot 73' deep. An alleyway runs back to the rear of the lot under the westernmost 3' of the house. There is a two bay deep, two story addition to the rear of the main structure. The original brickwork has been covered with formstone. The shed roof has no decorative cornice, the original cornice probably being hidden beneath the formstone. There is a single rectangular chimney located along the west end wall of the house.

The door and window openings were apparently originally surmounted by segmentally arched brick lintels with scroll-sawed tympanums. The scroll-sawed panels remain on the first floor openings; they have been replaced by late, solid wood panels on all of the other openings. The window openings are filled with new 6/6 sash. The tall, narrow doorway is filled with a modern six panel door surmounted by a new three-light transom. The house sits on a high basement, the entrance being reached by a flight of four marble steps, with a modern iron railing. A rectangular coal openings is located to the left of the steps.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is significant as being one of a fairly small group of large, Victorian-style houses built in the Federal Hill area. The houses were built in the 1870's to accommodate the rising number of middle-class residents in the area who had prospered at local trades and businesses to the point where they could afford a large house with definite stylistic pretensions. Apart from the fashionable shed roof and bracketed cornice, the houses were essentially the same as their gable-roofed predecessors, both in plan and facade details.

The house was built by William Trumblinson, who had a shipyard, and steam marine railway located at the foot of Montgomery St. on a vacant lot purchased by him along with the neighboring house at 106 E. Montgomery St. in 1867.¹




