The small two story plus attic, two bay wide brick houses built along this side of Churchill St. (114, 118, and 120 Churchill St.) were built in the 1840's by the owners of the lots to the rear facing on Montgomery St. 126-128 Churchill St. is a three story, shed-roofed former warehouse building now converted to residences, each two bays wide. The building was constructed in the 1870's by William Armstrong and John Denny to serve as storage space for their cabinetmaking and undertaking business located at the north-east corner of Light and Montgomery Streets (now 717 Light St.)

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This two story with attic, brick house with gable roof is one of the tiny alley houses that once served as homes for the servants of the more well-to-do inhabitants of Montgomery and William Streets.

The house is two and one half stories in height, about 15' wide, and occupies a lot 55' deep. The house is two rooms deep and there is a two story high, two bay deep rear addition. There is also an added one story high, two bay deep modern frame addition extending back further to the rear. The house is constructed in common bond. A simple, two tier brick cornice extends across the facade. A double hooded chimney is located at the peak of the roof along the eastern side of the house. There is also a hooded rear end chimney located at the north-west end of the rear addition.

The door and window openings of the first two floors have flat wood lintels and wood sills. The attic story windows have no lintels but do have wood sills. The first floor window opening is filled with new 9/6 sash; the second floor windows have new 6/6 sash; and the attic story windows have new 3/3 sash. A modern six panel door is set beneath a three-light transom. The house sits on a very low basement (if there is a basement at all), the entrance being reached directly from the sidewalk.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is quite interesting as being an example of the type of small alley house built to house either working class tenants or the servants of families who lived in larger houses along Montgomery St. or Warren Ave. The house follows the two story plus attic plan of typical working class housing of this period.

The house seems to have been built by Robert Culley, who built the house at 113 Montgomery St., on the rear of whose lot this house is built. This house belonged to the owner of 113 Montgomery St. until recent years when these alley houses along Churchill St. became desirable residences and were separated off from the original lots and renovated.
