The eastern end of the north side of Poultny St. was the first section of the block to be developed residentially, the western side being the site of a cooperage business until the 1870's. 40-46 Poultny St. are all two story plus attic, two bay wide brick houses, built between 1850 and 1857. Only 46 Poultny St. retains its original gable roof, the roof lines of 40-44 Poultny St. having been remodeled to resemble shed roofs and bracketed cornices added. 38 Poultny St. was built in 1857 as a three story, two bay wide brick gable-roofed house, but it too now has a shed roof and bracketed cornice. At the western end of the block, the group of two story, two bay wide brick houses with shed roofs and original bracketed cornices (now gone) at 10-22 Poultny St. was built in the early 1880's by two different local builders. 24-26 and 34-36 Poultny St. are pairs of two story, gable-roofed houses built in the 1870's; 28-32 Poultny St. is a group of two story, two bay wide brick houses with shed roofs and a continuous bracketed cornice, built in 1870.

This two story plus attic brick house with gable roof was built in the 1850's and formed part of a group of such houses extending along this side of Poultney St. between 38 and 46 Poultney St. of the house has been hidden by a later

The house is two and a half stories in height, 13' wide, and occupies a lot about 61' deep. The house is two rooms deep and there is a one story high, two bay deep rear addition, followed by a one story high, one bay deep frame addition. The house is constructed in running bond. The low-pitched gable roof has a two-tier brick cornice. There is a double covered chimney located along the west side of the rear gable roof.

The first and second floor window openings have splayed brick lintels; the attic story windows have no lintels. All of the sills are wood. All of the window openings are filled with 1/1 double hung sash. A panel door with upper lights is set beneath a single light transom, both slightly recessed from the facade, thereby forming a shallow entryway. The house sits on a fairly low basement, the entrance being reached by three stone steps. A square-shaped coal opening with metal cover is located to the left of the steps.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is important as representing the original appearance of the row of houses built adjoining this house to the west, at 38-44 Poultney St. For further details see under 38 Poultney St.

The house was built by Andrew Miskimmon, a machinist, on land leased to him by Samuel and Ellen Poultney in 1850.¹


