LYMAN HUFF HOUSE - c. 1920 - 19119 Middletown Road, Rayville. Large, colonial revival house, 2-½ stories, with hip roof and dormers; red tin roofing. White aluminum siding. Excellent condition. Porch of Port Deposit granite. House built of pre-cut timber ordered from Sears-Roebuck, unchanged except for enclosure of back porch. Red barn, metal corn house, various outbuildings. Owner is a retired school principal, F. Lyman Huff.

ODD FELLOWS LODGE - 1870 - SW side of Middletown Road, 0.15 mile NW of Cotter Road, village of Eklo-Middletown. Two-story hall in functional style; gable roof of sheet metal; a tall, rectangular building. Central entrance porch. Date-stone in demi-lune set in gable under eaves. Founded as Middletown Lodge No. 92 in 1855. Building sold in 1941 to Trustees of Gunpowder Baptist Church. Now used as dwelling. Scharf gave dimensions as 28 x 55 feet and dates hall at 1859; some 500 Odd Fellows attended cornerstone ceremonies. Owner: Salvatore A. Scavone.

EKLO SCHOOL - c. 1859 - (NE side of) 20221 Middletown Road, 0.15 mile NW of Cotter Road. Brick schoolhouse in functional design, six bays wide, with center entrance; originally had three bays on ends. Gable roof. Good condition. Lot was acquired by School Commissioners in 1859 from Henry and Lydia Hoffman. This was School 3, District 6, and in 1884 was made a high school. The Rural Life Club of the Sixth District met here. In 1933, it was sold off to Jacob and Angeline Wilhelm. Now used as a residence. Owner: Charles W. Therit. "Eklo---the school commissioner --- erecting a two-room house... At present, school is held in the Grange Hall" - MD Journal, January 6, 1883.
