DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

400 Main Street is a two storey frame dwelling five bays in length, facing the street to the east. Extending to the rear or west behind its north end is a two storey kitchen wing one long bay in length. This house dates from the period ca. 1875-1890.

The simple gabled roofs extend beyond the walls with wide plain eave and rake cornices. Single-flue brick chimneys rise within the north and west gables; a similar chimney formerly was within the south gable. Walls are covered with plain weatherboards. Windows are 2/2 with narrow beaded frames and louvred blinds. The principal entrance is centered in the east front, a single door with a transom. A two storey addition with a low-pitched shed roof fills the angle between the main house and the rear wing.

Within was a center hall containing an open staircase, a room on either side and one in the rear wing. Part of the partition between the hall and the north room is removed and the staircase is enclosed. The south room and the second floor are let separately, not accessible for inspection. The north room has a slate mantel painted in imitation of inlaid marble and the arched firebox has a cast-iron liner, the last remaining element of a Latrobe stove. Openings are trimmed with architraves having five beads with a sixth at the inner edge, meeting at the head with corner blocks. Doors have four panels. An enclosed secondary stair is in the northeast corner of the rear wing.

A cellar extends beneath the entire house. First floor joists are circular sawn.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The land originally part of John Reister's estate lying in Brotherly Love. On John Reister's death, Henry Wiest divided the tract into building sites, about a 1/4 acre. This lot was sold in 1805 to John Sumwalt. (WG89/85ff). Prosperous, Sumwalt owned considerable property in Reisterstown. He eventually acquired the Reister Inn and surrounding ground which gave him most of Reister's Desire on the west side of the turnpike. (Marks, op. cit., p. 55-56)

On Sumwalt's death, his estate was sold off by Samuel Tagart, Trustee. Lot #1, that which is under consideration here, was sold in 1860 to Emma Igo of Baltimore City for \$245.00. (GHC31/498ff). She resold the lot in 1874 to Anne E. Gore. (JB 9/164). Miss Gore is shown as owning the property in the 1877 Hopkins Atlas of Baltimore County. It was probably she who built the house which still stands today. She held the property until she died in 1887. In her will, she devised the property to her sister, Julia Elizabeth Gore, also unmarried. (BC Wills JP 8/160).

In 1896, Julia E. Gore sold the property to Mary McCoy for \$450.00. (LMB 216/513). Mrs. McCoy is shown on the 1898 Bromley Atlas of Baltimore County. She died intestate in 1897 and left the property to heirs. By 1929, the heirs were desirous of conveying all their interest. In 1929, Virginia C. McCoy, unmarried et al sold the property to Benjamin H. Wiley and his wife. (LMcLM 843/463).

In 1937 Benjamin Wiley sold the property to Lawrence E. Cole and his wife. (CWB 994/257).

Over thirty years later, Lawrence Cole, now a widower, sold the property to Sarah F. Beach, Dorothy F. Bradley, Joan Medlin and Mary Lou Urguhart in 1972. (OTG 4831/122 and OTG 5250/199). In 1977, the property was sold to Michael Lambros, the present owner.
