DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

408 MAIN STREET is a two story brick house, three bays in length, closely oriented to the street, facing east. Extending west behind its north end is a lower two-story two-bay brick wing, now with a low-pitched shed-roof falling to the west; originally it fell to the south. The original house (including the wing) dates from the 1840-1855 period. There is no joint between the house and its wing. Walls are of common bond, every sixth course headers. In the twentieth century, the rear wing was lengthened one bay toward the west and widened toward the south, the latter addition possibly replacing an original porch. Both additions are of frame. A modern small square porch shelters the principal entrance in the southerly bay of the east front and the two first story windows to the north have been opened together as a "picture window" with a separate entrance into the front room within. Original windows elsewhere are 6/6 and louvred blinds remain on the front. Exposed wooden lintels support the masonry above the front windows while brick jack arches are above the windows of the north side. The cornice is of simple corbeled brick. A brick chimney rises flush above the north gable.

Within, a hall extends through the southerly bay, containing an open stair which rises to the second floor; the round rail is supported by turned newels in the form of a Doric column, and rectangular balusters. A single room is north of the hall in each story. Some original detailing remains including doors with two tall panels, corner-block architraves and some hardware. Rooms of the rear wing were altered and refinished when the roof was raised. (First floor rooms, the cellar and the attic were inaccessible for inspection.)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The land on which this house stands was part of Brotherly Love, owned by John Reister. On January 12, 1793, the property, consisting of two acres, was deeded by Reister to his daughter, Catherine Mayberry. Catherine, by this date, was twice a widow, having married Roland Smith, Jr. in 1772; and, after his death in 1781, she married Francis Mayberry who must have died prior to the 1790 Census. Both her husbands were store-keepers and Catherine continued in this tradition as a widow. Her father deeded her the land "in Consideration of the natural love and affection and good will which I do have and bear unto my well beloved Daughter Catherine Maybury(sic) and her children". It contained the land on which the Mayberry shop stood. (BC Deeds WG LL:216) (Marks op.cit., p. 53-55) The present structure was not built until much later.

Upon Catherine's death, the property was to be divided among her three daughters, 1/3 to Mary Smith, 1/3 to Margaret Smith, and 1/3 to Elizabeth Maybury. This occurred in 1841. It is in Mary Smith's portion (the southern-most) that we are most interested as this eventually became the site of #408.

Mary Smith married Jacob Weist and, eventually moved west. In 1842, the Weists of Preble Co., Ohio deeded this land to Solomon Choate. (TK 320/254) It was Choate who had the present house built. The acreage on which it stood was .21 of an acre. When he died in 1861, he left this property (among others) to his daughter Maria R. Choate, (BC Wills JLR 2/137) "Which said Maria R. Chaote afterwards married James H. Berryman (1863) and died interstate in the year 1910, leaving surviving as her sole heirs at law, her husband, the said James H. Berryman who is since deceased (1918) and three children, the said Bettie M. Berryman, J. Edgar Berryman and Anne S. Berryman in whom the title to said property is now vested". (WPC 513/89)

In 1922, Bettie Berryman deeded the property to George W. Baker and wife. (WPC 549/587)

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Significance, continued

The Bakers sold it to Lewis Bihy and wife in the same year. (WPC 560/356)

The Bihys sold the property in 1929 to Lillian Russell, widow (WHM 816/272). She ran a general store there.

In 1941, Lillian Russell sold to John Bruehl and his wife (CWB Jr 1170/399).

In 1942, John Bruehl sold to George L. Gill and wife Jane (CHK 1217/531).

The house was finally sold by Mrs. Gill to Birger E. Johansson in 1976 (EHK, Jr 5648/54).
