

606 BALTIMORE AVE.

A two story frame residence that stands with ten or more 19th century and early 20th century houses on either side of the six-hundred block of Baltimore Ave. Individually and as a group these buildings say much about lifestyles in a rural town and they provide relief in an environment that has yielded its human scale to a myriad of mid-rise and high-rise commercial structures.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This structure is a two story frame and clapboard structure with a slightly irregular rectangular shape plan and a stone foundation. This style of structure was common to the area as a rural dwelling in the mid-nineteenth century. Among the architectural details that can be seen on the east (main) facade are a centrally located brick chimney, a gable roof with asbestos shingles, centrally located entrance with sidelights and transom and large 6/6 sash windows with functional louvered shutters. Also present is a full porch covering the lower story which is supported by square columns with chamfers. The porch ceiling is composed of tongue-and-groove paneling and has hardware available for hanging porch furniture. A curious feature of the window arrangement of the east facade is that the first story is three bays wide and the second story is four bays wide. All other houses of this style on the block are four bays wide on both stories.

On the north or widest side of the structure it is four bays wide. Also, the house has a westward projection that appears to be newer than the main portion of the house. It exhibits different window construction, a hipped roof and a centrally located brick chimney.

Among this house's unique features are the differences in bays between the two stories on the main facade, its unusually large 6/6 sash windows which have rippled and bubbled glass, and a very large cedar tree which is situated in the front yard of the property.

An interior description of the structure could not be obtained.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

A case for preservation of this house can be formed by viewing this structure first in isolation as a typical example of rural architecture, and second in its relation to other buildings on the block which together form a relatively unaltered 19th century streetscape.

Taken in isolation, this structure represents a style of rural architecture prevalent in the local area which was constructed during the nineteenth century. Although simple in appearance, this frame house with its gable-end roof and even number of bays has a quality character which associates it with a life-style that was quite different from our own.

Viewed with the homes that surround it, this home is one of several structures on the block which represent mid-nineteenth century rural architecture. These homes offer a human scale to an area which has its share of high rise complexes. The entire block is free of any large buildings which further emphasizes a quiet residential quality to the pedestrian. These old homes offer a point of contrast to the structures on surrounding blocks which range from turn of the century homes to modern high rise office buildings.





