

# 214 WASHINGTON AVE.

This building is one of two identical structures in its block and one of Towson's relatively numerous duplexes. These structures are also distinctive for being among the few houses utilizing dark red sandstone in their construction. DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

# 214 Washington Ave. is a two story duplex with a finished attic and a longitudinal plan. It has a slate, gable-end roof with dormers. The building is four bays wide and six bays deep. The first story is of different sized red sandstone blocks laid with an attempt at coursing with beaded grouting. The upper stories are frame covered with brown wooden shingles.

The east facade, or main facade, contains a shed roofed porch supported by clusters of thin doric columns. This porch is enclosed by a railing with square balusters. The regular fenestration is a 1/1 sash, although the even number of bays is upset on the first level by the addition of an entrance on each outer-most bay. The windows have louvered shutters and architrave-like trim. The gable end has deep cornices, and deep eaves of tongue-and-groove soffit. This end is vented by two pairs of 1/1 sash windows clustered beneath a curvilinear swell.

The north facade is dominated by a pair of two large pedimented dormers which repeat the motif of the deeply corniced gables. Casement windows have been inset between these dormers. The regular fenestration is interrupted. Where one might expect an opening on the first level there is none, and directly above on the second level exists a window somewhat smaller than the others. There are also window wells.

The south facade repeats the appearance of this north facade.

The west end is a collection of geometric shapes. A pair of two story wings project and are nestled beneath the large gable-end of the main block. The continuous cornices, foundation, joists, etc., suggest these wings are original. The interior bays of the first level are enclosed as is the entire second level. An open porch gives access to entrances on each corner. The southwest entrance has a single pane glass door and a double light transom. The central bay provides an exterior entrance to a full basement below.

The full basement under each side of the house is constructed of long concrete blocks measuring 2 feet long, 8 inches in height and 7 inches thick. A solid masonry wall bisects the building and each side has an interior access. The circular sawn joists run transversely with a 14 inch spacing.

It is observed that the building is of four different types of masonry- block, poured concrete and rubble walls, brick, and sandstone.

The interior has been altered for commercial purposes. A hall runs along a bisecting wall connecting three rooms and a bathroom per floor on each side.

The upper level contains the most original fabric. Details include three-quarter round corner guards, plain mouldings, bulls eye corner blocks and interior doorways with transoms. Also observed are solid four-panel doors which vary with porcelain knobs and metal box locks or metal plated oval knobs with beads. Additional details include claw-footed tubs, early porcelain fixtures, and cast iron hot water radiators with embossed floral designs.




 and two on the east side of Courtland


